### Rain ..... and Roads!

Rain received in the last few weeks has been wonderful for the district; let's hope the favourable season continues. Many tolerable roads have been turned into something less desirable until they have dried out again, high-lighting the ongoing urgency of identifying appropriate sources of gravel within the Shire to assist with much needed re-sheeting.

### Community Strategic Planning Workshops

Thank you to members of our community able to participate and provide valuable input toward the recent strategic planning workshops.

### South East Avon Regional Transition Group

The Regional Business Plan – Current State is almost complete. A lengthy RTG meeting was recently held in Beverley with presentations from the consultants collating the information from each member Council into the one document. A Regional Business Plan – Future State will be prepared so communities can be informed in their decision making regarding any potential amalgamation. Preparation of Asset Management Plans, Financial Plans and Community Strategic Planning has been invaluable and is now required regardless of the RTG process. These plans have been produced from State Government funding rather than Shire financial resources.

### Avondale Community Update

The National Trust has identified a programme of major works for its regional heritage places over the next four years which focuses on nine properties across seven Development Commission regions. The National Trust Board has supported Avondale as being phase one of this programme, for which a large funding application is currently underway to Royalties for Regions. Without a major injection of capital to revitalize the rundown state of the property's facilities and create opportunity for it to become self supporting it will be extremely challenging to retain this magnificent State asset in our district.

### **Councillor Corrie Egberts' Resignation**

I would like to thank Councillor Corrie Egberts for his valued contribution and active role as an elected member within the Shire of Beverley. Council will be requesting that this position remain vacant until the forthcoming local government elections.

### Local Government Elections – 15th October 2011

Local Government elections will be held on 15<sup>th</sup> October with the nomination period open for 8 days in early September. If you are interested in becoming involved on behalf of your community please keep an eye out during August for relevant advertising or contact the Department of Local Government, or WA Local Government Association for more information.

### 2011 Census: For a Brighter Future for Our Community

Census night is Tuesday 9 August.

Your local Census Collector has already begun dropping off forms and eCensus passwords to every household and dwelling in the area.

If they haven't made it to your house yet, they'll be knocking on your door soon.

They're easy to spot as they carry large yellow Census bags and will be wearing an identification tag.

Census data will be used by decision makers to plan for a brighter future for our community, so it's important that you complete the form fully and accurately.

You can either fill out the paper form and your Census Collector will come back and collect it, or you can complete the eCensus online.

A free Census Inquiry Service line is open now and you can call 1300 338 776 if you need additional forms or any assistance whatsoever with the Census.

It's important that you complete the Census form with details of everyone who spends Census night at your house.

It doesn't matter if they are only visiting as there's a question that asks where they usually live. The Census is a snapshot of everyone in Australia on Census night.

If you're travelling on 9 August, Census forms will be handed out at the hotel, motel, caravan park, camping ground, or wherever you're staying.

If you're travelling in the outback, you can pick up a Census form from the nearest Police Station, or any Tourist Information Centre will be able to point you in the right direction.

Getting an accurate Census count means the community will receive the funding it's entitled to and will allow for the planning of services and facilities that the community needs.

So on Tuesday 9 August, make sure you fill out a Census form wherever you are in Australia. Your community is counting on you.

# SEA CONTAINERS Planning Requirements

It has come to the Shire of Beverley Council's attention that sea containers are being used as outbuildings (sheds) on various properties throughout the townsite. The use of sea containers as sheds either temporary or permanently requires the planning approval under the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2.

### The use of sea containers as sheds without planning approval is a breach of Town Planning Scheme No. 2 and may leave the occupier/landowner open to a substantial monetary penalty.

If you are using a sea container for a shed and want to apply for planning approval you can obtain a Planning Application pack from the Shire. Please note when an application is made for planning approval it is assessed against Council's Outbuilding Policy which is contained in the Town Planning Scheme Policy Manual.

Hello Beverley,

There have been reports of vehicles in Beverley, driving in excess of the speed limit and in a manner that is deemed to be hoon behaviour. Please be aware that any person observed driving in such a manner will be prosecuted and have their vehicle seized for a period of 7days, upon each additional offence the amount of time the car is seized becomes longer and longer.

Members of the community who witness such behaviour on the roads are urged to contact police with this information. Please take particular notice of the time of day, the date, the registration number, the type and colour of the vehicle and if you are really keen, a description of the driver even male or female is helpful. We acknowledge that there have been some reports made recently regarding hoon behaviour and all efforts are being made to ensure adequate policing of this situation is provided.

I would like to remind members of our community that by making a statement to police with regards to your information, this is generally enough for police to go ahead and prosecute the offending party. Police do not necessarily need to catch the person or people in the act. A statement to police does mean that you are prepared to tell your observations to a magistrate in court (this doesn't happen in every instance), but you must be prepared and willing to do this in order for police to go ahead and charge a person based on your observations. If you have any further questions with regards to this matter, please do not hesitate to contact the Beverley Police Station on Ph: 9646 3333 or come and see us.

Whilst off duty we are noticing a few people growing complacent again with not wearing seatbelts, (We know you are only going down the road), you must wear the belt at all times. Remember that just because we are off duty doesn't mean you are immune to a ticket. \$500 and 4 demerit points is the penalty, so we strongly suggest you wear it. Tickets will be handed out in every instance. Regardless of the monetary fine, it may save your life. Drivers; you are responsible for your passengers in the vehicle, you as the driver will be fined as well as your adult passenger. So be vigilant.

On another note, be sure to use your hands free when talking on your mobile phone whilst driving. I understand that a lot of people conduct business in their vehicles and need their phones; however it is important that you are not holding the phone whilst driving. There are sooooo many options when it comes to hands free and they are affordable, so there is no excuse. Local police are concentrating on these offences in our area, all those caught without a seatbelt or using their mobile phone whilst driving will be issued with an infringement notice. Using you mobile phone whilst driving is a fine of \$250 and 3 demerit points. That's an expensive day in the office if you ask me.

I know, this month was very official, it's just that sometimes these things need to be communicated, so that the community can make educated decisions before taking a risk.

## Harry helps celebrate Naidoc Week at Christ Church

The land, its colours and the jabiru were the inspiration behind a painting by Harry McDonald (13), which is currently on show as part of a Naidoc Week art exhibition at Christ Church Grammar School in Perth.

Harry, who boards at the Claremont school, was invited to join 16 boys from the school's Indigenous Student Program, to participate in a series of art workshops to create his painting. The Year 8 student, who is a keen artist, was asked to be involved due to his special interest in Aboriginal dot painting.

Harry said he was honoured to be invited. "My painting represents the land and its colours," he said.

"In the middle of the painting you can see the sun and the jabiru, a bird that has the colours of the people that live there.

"The dots on the bottom half of the painting signify the land and its colours, while the upper half of the painting signify the sea, the sky and the water holes and rivers that are scattered throughout the land."

"When I saw them playing the didge, I thought it was something I'd like to try," Harry said.

While Harry is mainly self-taught, he enlisted indigenous student Lawrence Evans, from Kununurra, to help him with his circular breathing. Together, the pair performed a song on the didgeridoo at the Naidoc Week-themed school assembly.

Harry said it was exciting to have his work displayed alongside the indigenous students' paintings in the exhibition.

"The whole week was really fun and interesting and great to be involved," he said.

Senior art teacher Gisela Züchner-Mogall and indigenous liaison officer Jamie Foster, who led the project, hoped the exhibition and presentation was a significant contribution to bringing a small part of the boys' rich indigenous culture a little closer to the Christ Church community.

The exhibition runs until Friday 12 August, in the Old Boys' Gallery, at Christ Church Grammar School, Claremont.

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### View from the Shed Look after your Mates

In our modern world and with the rapid transmission of information globally, we are often required to make instant decisions on matters that we would be better off to consider for a while (to weigh up the implications) before we commit one way or the other.

How often do you get a phone message or email that requires this type of action? Alternatively we see a reporter put a microphone or camera in front of a politician, accident victim or disaster victim's face wanting an instant comment.

Although some of this instantaneous access to information has advantages we should also consider the downside consequences of inappropriate reactive responses. We see a person cornered and desperate when confronted.

One of the worrying things about the trouble we are experiencing at present with the cattle trade and now the questions about mining in the Mid-West is that we can find ourselves losing our cool and not taking time to clarify the issues. Situations like this need clear heads and well thought out resolutions.

On a personal level the mental stress is phenomenal. Men in particular are very focused on solving the immediate problem, seldom giving consideration to the peripheral issues ie. impact on families, communities, or the long term implications. If we are in this place, no matter what the problem, it is normal to search around for alternative solutions or options. These options are usually random, and at this stage, in no particular order.

Research tells us that while we are in this state one proposition that will more than likely come into our thinking is suicide (it is estimated that as many as 80% of the population will think this way). It is also true that the vast majority will also put the thought aside very quickly. We realise this is not a good option, life is too precious, and no matter how bad the problem this isn't the solution. The problem is that a small percentage of us won't be able to get past the thought.

It is really important in times of distress and difficulty to keep asking our friends and loved ones "Are you OK?" and if you feel it is necessary ask " are you having suicidal thoughts?". We know from research that talking about these things won't make it any worse and if a person is having dark thoughts they will feel relieved that someone has had the courage to ask "Are you OK mate?"

In many ways this is similar to first aid. With first aid we are taught to stabilise people, reassure them and get them to professional help.

Often people need professional help with their problems, as a first aider get people in contact with that help, but be assured that by you taking the trouble to be a mate who cares can save a life. We all need this support and taking the time to do it in our busy world is really important.

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### **Sprouting Seeds**

In part one and two I have discussed the benefits of sprouts and methods of sprouting. I am not suggesting eating only sprouts; however, I know that sprouts can provide us with high quality building blocks for good health. If a person is able to grow all, or part of their own food, then living foods are easy to provide. However, in times of drought and water restrictions, with increased costs of water, many people may be limited in what food they can grow in their backyards. Sprouts growing in the kitchen will provide some food, over which there is quality control. Be generous to your cells. Lavish them with live foods. Cells can't speak; however, when we feed them living sprouts, I am sure they vibrate with happiness. Health is like a bank account, the more we put into it, the more we get out of it.

The most valuable benefit for me is that the seed transforms from an acid food to become, in a few hours later when germinated, an alkaline food. Acidity in the body can cause many illnesses. This extra acidity created by a poor diet has the body systems overwhelmed with a backlog of acids. The results of too much acidity can lead to diseases such as osteoporosis, cancers, arthritis. inflammatory diseases, depression anxiety, overall weakness, and obesity, and many more. When a body is acidic, it creates a welcoming environment for viruses and bacteria to come in and begin to flourish. Sprouting is a great way to bring the body into balance. This is a remarkable phenomena and an immeasurable asset. It is a tremendous gift for every person, who wants optimum health.

After the soak period, take the piece of net or gauze and place it over the jar opening and hold it in place with the rubber band. Drain off the soak water (the net acts like a sieve), and rinse the seeds with cold water 1-2 times. It is advisable not to use tap water because of all the additives in the water. Many of these can literally kill your sprouts. Rain water would be great or filtered water will do too. The drained water is not advisable to drink as the latest research has shown that the water may have taken up anti-nutrients or trypsin inhibitors when sprouting. This water may cause flatulence. The only exception is the drained water from fenugreek seeds. I will go into this at a later stage when I am writing about fenugreek. I am aware that the soak water from grains such as wheat used for making rejuvelac does require 2-3 days of soaking, which takes it to a stage of fermentation, with enzymes activated, that are beneficial to health; however, this fermentation is entirely different to just several hours of soaking used to make sprouts. This fermentation procedure will also be covered at a later stage.

To hull or not to hull ... hulling is a term used to physically remove the seed jacket (also called a shell) from sprouts. Many seed varieties, when given moisture, quickly absorb moisture and swell, and the hull can no longer contain the expanding seeds. They are then pushed off the unfolding sprouts. They are then dead matter, which can have a potential to decay and spoil the sprouts, particularly during hot weather. Some seeds will readily discard their hulls and drop inside the jar. Hulls can be eaten and are the most fibrous part of the seed and therefore are useful roughage in our diet. When the sprouts have grown to your required length they can be plunged in a bowl of cool water and the hulls will either float on top to be scooped up or sink to the bottom of the bowl.

The life expectancy of sprouts once grown to the length you wish to use, can usually be as long as the time it took to grow them, that is if they are kept in cold storage, which means they may be crisp for 3-7 days. They can be kept longer though but it is with all fresh food, the longer fresh food is kept, the less nutrition it will contain. It is therefore advisable to eat sprouts within 1 week.

# Purchasing and storing seeds for sprouting.

Whenever possible purchase organic or biodynamic seeds, as this is preferable for health, and the environment. Sprouts may be available from health food shops, or from mail order companies; they are definitely available in organic shops. It is not advisable to buy seeds in large quantities when starting to grow

sprouts. As you become efficient at sprouting, and use them regularly, then purchasing seeds in larger quantities would be economical. Dried seeds are valuable to store for survival foods. Well-stored seeds provide highly nutritious food for emergencies. All the life-giving elements are contained in the seeds... they have the pro-creative power necessary for the continuation of all life. This is the reason the Creator has given to us, every herb bearing seed and every tree that vields seeds, to provide us with food for life and health. Genesis 1:29 -Then God said, 'Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is on the surface of all the earth, and every tree which has fruit yielding seed; it shall be food for you'.

With this I will end this month's information. Next month I will write about the most used sprouts.

### UPDATE AND PROGRESS REPORT FROM BEVERLEY COMMUNITY PARA-LEGAL REFERRAL SERVICES (BCS)

### Personal Level:

As most of our Beverley residents may be aware, I was diagnosed with Leukemia (blood cancer) in January 2011 and was then given the death sentence of 1 month to live by the Leukemia specialist. In February 2011 I collapsed and went into a coma and the four treating doctors told my family that I would not live. I was in a coma for four days (clinically dead). Like Lazarus, I also arose from the dead and am back on deck at BCS. I have defied the odds and here I am in Beverley.

### BCS Report:

I have been making home visits to other terminally ill patients, diagnosed with cancer and have provided information, support, Centerlink matters, witnessing of legal documents etc. Matters dealt with in house (office) related to Centrelink problems, and information on a wide range of community concerns. Once again it should be stressed here that BCS does not offer legal advice. In this context our local Barrister at Law is much sought after and referrals are made to him or the Citizens These matters Advice Bureau. usually relate to wills, powers of attorney, civil proceedings and such.

Clarification: even though I do not provide legal advice, there are quite a number of residents who do have legal representation from eminent law firms after bringing papers and other legal documents to seek my comments and help to fill in the questionnaires and other paperwork, especially in estate matters that drag on for 3 to 4 years. For all such cases I do request that they do inform the law firm that I am assisting them on a pro bono basis as part of my advisory work. The extent of the trust that these residents portray makes me feel humbled and honoured, need I say more.

<u>Ministerial Intervention</u>: there are times in my line of work, on all matters of urgency and in seeking justice for the not so fortunate and able, I have had to take this line of approach. In the last few months, on matters relating to: energy (Synergy), housing, transport and compensation, I had to make written contact and the outcomes have been successful, baring one case pending.

Working poor, starvation wages, financial hardship and who qualifies for help: In my line of work, I often come across these terminologies. One may very well ask 'what does all this mean to the "average citizen?" The answer is not a simple one. Charitable and welfare agencies apply their own criteria, eg. On the 24 and 25 December 2010 one of the leading charities stated on TV channels that 30% of professionals are amongst the needy and working poor who were seeking help from them in 2010.

In a real life situation, one couple with two children living in Perth in a Homeswest unit on Centrelink benefits. All have concession cards, telephone, Synergy etc After rent they are left with \$20,000 nett.

A similar young family with one bread winner and two 10/12 year old children live and work in Karratha, earn \$130,000 take home pay, private rental at \$104,000 pa, no concessions. After allowing for children's school fees, car h.p., maintenance. full fees for doctor and medicines, phone and electric bills. totaling around \$15,000 (min) \$11,000 is left to feed and clothe two adults and two children. One can easily come to the conclusion that this family is on starvation wages. For years there have been heated debates, forceful arguments, discrimination, threats and so on. In my office at odd times the question that one puts to me: 'Mal, there are many workers who earn big money up north, yet when they find living costs so high, unless they earn over \$200,000 pa one would be battling.' The answer is a matter of choice. It is not my role to pass judgment on any matters.

### <u>Criteria for food parcel/financial</u> <u>assistance</u>

- A)One must be in receipt of a full pension/Centrelink recipient
- B)Prove financial hardship. Eg vendor bank statement, Synergy bills, Telstra bills, behind in rental payments (have no money to buy food) or a Statutory Declaration to that affect. For the record, it does go without saying it is not my role

to ask questions as to how these situations arose. My duty is to help the needy not judge the needy.

Finally in closing I thank all the Shire staff and the many residents of Beverley for cards, phone calls and kind get well wishes during my recent illness. I also thank Darrell from the local police for keeping an eye on my house.

## Heng's Crispy skin Pork entree

### INGREDIENTS for roast pork

One kilo Belly of Pork (choose a nice even layer of meat and fat.) Not too thick. (For a large party you will need 2 kilos). Make sure it is meat from a female pig (ask the butcher to assure you of this. Meat from a male pig gives a bad odour).
Chinese five spice powder (Hiong Fun)

• Cooking salt

### EQUIPMENT

Fan forced oven but for best results still, Turbo broiler - circular glass cooker with electric fan heater on top.

### METHOD

Punch lots of holes with a sharp carving knife on skin. Even strokes all through the skin. Keep skin dry. Spread and rub salt all over skin . Turn around and spread salt at the bottom (the meat side). Spread Chinese five spice on the meat side. Do not spread five spice on skin. Glad wrap and put piece of pork overnight in fridge. Next day get kitchen tissue or a piece of cloth and wipe off sweat from skin. Use a carving knife and punch more holes. Rub some more salt on skin. Set oven or turbo broiler to maximum temperature 250 C. Cook for 35 mins skin up.(I sometimes even go to 40 mins) You will see some crackle appearing. (Very high heat initially is important to form good crackle.) Then roast for another 25 minutes at 175C. Finally if crackle is not formed properly roast at maximum temperature of 250C for another 25 mins.

Let meat cool down before cutting into cubes for entrée. Use an electric knife for neat, clean cuts.

ENTRÉE presentation (see photo):

Cut pickled gherkins into slices and decorate like a fan as seen. Arrange pickled ginger into rose flower form. (Pickled ginger may only be obtained from Chinese grocery stores in Perth. Contact Heng if you wish to get some.)

Use sweet plum sauce or sweet sour sauce (obtainable from IGA) mixed with a bit of Thai sweet chilli sauce and drizzle over plate to form pattern.

Add a cherry tomato for colour.
