POTENTIAL AMALGAMATION PROPOSAL FACT SHEET

"Your Future - Your Choice"

Who is involved in the Amalgamation Business Case Process?	The Shires of Beverley, Cunderdin, Quairading, Tammin and York have formed the South East Avon Regional Transition Group (SEARTG) to prepare a business case that will examine the potential benefits of amalgamating.
What is involved in the RTG Business Case Process?	The Business Case will consider the Current and Future State of local government in the SEARTG.
	The Current State involves examining all of the operations of the 5 local governments to provide a snapshot of the current way each Shire does its business.
	The Future State will examine a new service delivery model and structure for the proposed new local government. The Future State will then be assessed in terms of potential benefits in improvement in services and whether there are any potential savings or additional costs in the proposed new service delivery model and structure.
Why is amalgamation being looked at?	It is believed that there are a number of potential benefits that may result from amalgamation. Such benefits may include improved service delivery across the region, more flexibility in adapting services to meet changing customer needs, greater capacity as a single local government to deliver larger infrastructure projects, and potential reduction of duplication in services and facilities.
What will happen if the local governments support amalgamation?	The completed business case will provide a recommendation on whether there are enough potential benefits to proceed with amalgamation. The completed report will be referred to the 5 SEARTG member local governments to consider the recommendation.
	If the recommendation is supported by the 5 SEARTG member local governments, the business case along with the supporting resolutions of the 5 local governments will be referred to the Local Government Advisory Board for review and to make a recommendation to the Minister.
	The Minister will then consider the recommendation from the Local Government Advisory Board and make a decision on whether the amalgamation should proceed.
Where will I access services if amalgamation occurs?	The proposed amalgamation model is based on a Place Management approach with local area service centres being retained in each main town. The Shire administration centre and customer services will be maintained under the Place Management model.
Where will staff work if amalgamation occurs?	One of the key principles that has been agreed to by the 5 SEARTG member local governments is minimal displacement of the existing workforce. The future structure of the organisation is currently being determined, but will take into account retaining staff in their current locations, wherever possible.
When will amalgamation occur?	If supported, amalgamation could occur as early as 1 July 2013.

health, education, business, industry, community and entertainment from this initiative, if it comes to fruition, are exciting, and Regional Development Australia Wheatbelt (federal) and the Wheatbelt Development Commission (state) are working toward developing a Wheatbelt Digital Action Plan to help prepare our region for the NBN.

RTG

Work preparing the Regional Transition Group Business Plan - Future State continues. Key topics of discussion at a recent workshop related to the proposed Organisational Structure and Executive Team responsibilities in a merged entity and how the important aspect of Community Representation and Advisory Committees would be addressed.

Independent Living Units

With progress being made on the construction of the first two ILU's, Council will be undertaking a review of their plans for advertising, occupancy and the next stage of building.

Official Farewell for Retiring CEO

An official farewell was recently held for retiring CEO Mr Keith Byers, attended by current and past Beverley Shire Councillors and neighbouring Shire Presidents and CEOs. Keith and Di have relocated to Mandurah and Council is in the process of advertising the substantive CEO position.


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PLC Cambodia Service Tour

On the 1st of October 2011, Dad and I went on a two week school service tour to Cambodia with Presbyterian Ladies' College. Our group consisted of 19 fifteen year old girls, 12 Dads, seven Mums and three teachers. We went to build houses in a remote village in a province in Cambodia.

Collectively over the last year we raised enough money to build 35 houses at a cost of \$1500 each. The Beverley community helped Dad and I to raise \$1500 to build a house. Thanks to all the generous donations and all the people who supported us with our cake stall in July.

We were able to complete the construction all 35 houses. The people in the village were very thankful and appreciative.

The house building component of our tour was organized by the Tabitha Foundation in Cambodia. This organization is founded by a Canadian woman, Janne Ritskes; she has been running Tabitha for 17 years. Tabitha also helps in other places in the world such as the United States, the Philippines and Kenya. Tabitha Cambodia works to give the poorest of the poor a sustainable life.

The house building was not the only service projects we took part in while on tour. We did work with Free the Bears, who look after protected animals, mainly bears. They have centres in Laos, India, Vietnam, Thailand, Indonesia and Cambodia and they have a total of 801 bears that have been rescued and are now cared for in one of the various locations.

We visited the Cambodia, Free the Bears and saw their 156 bears. We scrubbed the bear cages, picked up their poo, and made them lunch. We watched them rip apart bamboo to get their food that was concealed inside. When we had finished with the bears we got to see an elephant that had one of its legs blown off by a landmine and now it walks with a prosthetic leg.

Also we worked with an organization called <u>Transform</u>. Two businessmen from Perth who wanted to give back to society founded this incredible organization. Their aim is to get kids off the street and give them an education. They have 14 centres around the capital Phom Penh and each Centre has 50 kids from families that can not afford to have their kids in school. <u>Transform</u> pays the kid's school fees and each month give a bag of rice to the families and that bag can sustain them for food for that month.

Children in Cambodia only go to school for half a day and the children in <u>Transform</u> go to these centres for the other half of the day. We spent a day in one of the centres with kids aged five-six. It was incredible because as soon as we got off the bus they ran out and started to hug our legs and arms and pulled us in to show us what they have been doing.

We also did some additional activities such as visiting and helping out at orphanages and presenting families in communities with water filters.

Going on the tour was an incredible experience. Dad and I would like to thank the Beverley community again for their very generous support of our service tour to Cambodia.

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Back Pain

Most adults with low back pain can be effectively managed with simple treatments delivered Treatment of the pain well. should begin with advice to keep moving and take simple painkillers, according to Professor Chris Maher and associates from the George Institute for Global Health and the University of Sydney, writing in the October 2011 edition Australian Prescriber.

Patients should be encouraged to remain as active as possible, avoid bed rest, and take simple painkillers such as paracetamol, with a review by their doctor after a week or two.

"Low back pain is a common and costly condition in Australia, and approximately 25% of Australians suffer from low back pain," write the authors.

"The majority of patients with a short duration of symptoms will recover. An Australian study showed that half of all patients who were given advice by their doctor to keep active and take painkillers were pain-free within two weeks."

If this initial approach doesn't provide enough pain relief, more complex treatments including stronger painkillers and referral for physical structured therapies like exercise programs might be recommended by health professional.

The authors suggest that investigations such as scans should not be a routine part of managing low back pain. "Routine x-rays or scans are not needed for most people who have low back pain of less than six weeks' duration," say the authors.

FIRE BREAK ORDER

BUSH FIRE ACT 1954



All owners and occupiers of land are required on or before 15 November every year to provide and thereafter maintain free of all inflammable material until 15 April of the following year, firebreaks as stipulated in the manner described in the following schedule.

SCHEDULE

RURAL LAND

Buildings and Haystacks

A firebreak of at least 4 metres wide and not more than 60 metres from the perimeter of all buildings (including temporary dwellings e.g. caravans) and/or haystacks or groups of buildings and/or haystacks so as to completely surround the buildings, haystacks and/or fuel dumps.

Bulldozed Bush

A firebreak 20 metres wide shall be maintained immediately inside the external boundaries of all land which has been bulldozed, chained or prepared in any similar manner for clearing by burning (whether it is intended to burn the bush or not).

Stationary Pumps/Motors

A firebreak 4 metres wide shall be cleared and maintained around all stationary pumps and motors.

Harvesting Operations

During the period when harvesting operations are being conducted, there shall be provided in the same paddock or within 400 metres of that paddock an operational independent mobile fire-fighting unit having a water capacity of not less than 650 litres. The tank of the unit shall be kept full of water at all times during the harvest operations. The responsibility to supply the unit, being that of the landowner.

Operation of Plant and Machinery

During the restricted and prohibited burning times, all harvesters and trucks carting grain shall not be operated on rural land unless fitted with a fire extinguisher. On days of HARVEST BANDS there shall be no movement of any vehicles within paddocks.

Paddock Burns

At any time throughout the year, where a landowner intends to burn paddocks, the following must be provided to prevent escape of fire:

- 1. A firebreak 2.2 metres wide clear of all inflammable material completely surrounding the area to be burnt.
- 2. An operational fire-fighting unit having a capacity of not less than 650 litres.
- 3. Permits to burn may be required. Contact your Fire Control Officer for details.

TOWN SITE LAND

All lots with an area of 2.024 ha (5 acres) or less, shall be clear of all inflammable material or have grass mown to a height no greater than 15cm.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Fuel Dumps

You shall remove all flammable materials or material likely to become flammable during summer from land occupied by bulk storage tanks and/or drums used for storage of liquid fuel whether the bulk storage tanks and/or drums contain liquid or not. This includes the land on which ramps for holding the drums are constructed. The flammable free ground must be maintained to a distance of at least 4 metres outside the perimeter of any drum, stack of drums or drum ramp or bulk storage tank.

Variations to Requirements By the Order.

For permission to provide firebreaks in alternative positions or by alternative date or to take alternative action to abate fire hazards on the land, an application must be made no later than 14 days prior to the date firebreaks are required. If permission is not granted by the Shire or its duly authorized officer, you shall comply with the requirements of this notice.

Penalty for Failure to Comply

The penalty for failing to comply with this notice is a fine of up to \$1000. If the owner or occupier fails to carry out the works required by this Firebreak Order the Shire of Beverley may enter the land and prepare the firebreaks at the cost of the owner or occupier.

Burning

If the requirements of this notice are carried out by burning, such burning must be in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Bush Fire Act 1954.

On another note, I would like to acknowledge the fact that Beverley has been the target of a handful of burglaries and stealing offences in the past month. I would like to ask that all community members begin to lock their vehicles and their homes, ensuring security is a key factor in your daily lives. It is great to see that more and more local businesses are installing surveillance camera's and alarm systems. It is unfortunate that we have to think of these things in our lovely little town, however we are no longer immune to people passing through and committing these offences. I am currently beginning to

apply for funding from the Office of Crime Prevention to have surveillance cameras installed along the main street of Beverley, this will further protect the businesses and hopefully deter would be thieves. It will also assist police to identify those responsible for committing further crimes. If you are in support of this initiative, please do not hesitate to have your say by way of letters of support that can be included in the funding application, and drop those into the police station or the post office.


MOTORBIKES: It is unacceptable to ride off-road (unregistered) motorbikes in the vicinity of the Beverley townsite. You are not allowed to ride motorbikes on the BMX track or through the bushland that runs from the town oval to the golf course. Riding along the railway tracks is also prohibited. Beverley has its very own scramble track and it is time that the locals wishing to ride their dirt bikes, join the track and enjoy themselves in this environment. Dirtbikes can be ridden on private property, however it is essential that if you have neighbours, you are courteous and keep the noise in RIDING ON THE GOLF mind. COURSE IS NOT ACCEPTABLE; RESPONSIBLE THOSE RIPPING UP THE GREENS WILL BE DEALT WITH. If you continue to disobey these rules, your bikes will be seized and you will face charges in a court. The ranger has been notified of this activity and will also be conducting increased patrols of the area.

With harvest just around the corner, motorists should be ready for increased heavy freight traffic on Wheatbelt roads

Be alert and don't assume that since there is usually no traffic that there will be none today. **Expect more heavy traffic on roads that normally have little traffic.**

Expect trucks, utes and farm machinery to be on the roads, crossing roads and exiting in unusual places. Many of these will be oversize vehicles, and they will need some or even all of your side of the road. **Give them room to pass safely.**

Don't travel in the left lane just near the truck cabin, this is usually the worst spot for the truck driver's vision and in wet weather this can be even worse.

If you are travelling next to a truck and the indicator comes on, **don't just stay there**, move either forward or backwards out of the contact area. The truck driver is giving you a warning he is about to make a position change, and if you are in the blind spot and have not moved into his vision, it could be easy for him to think there is no traffic in the danger area.

If a truck has slowed and pulled over to the left, indicating right, **don't assume he is letting you through.** He is most likely turning right.

Be sure to give a truck room to make a turn. At some intersections a truck requires more than one lane to make the turn. When a car approaches an intersection and pulls up to the road markings where a truck is waiting to make a turn, there is no room for the truck to turn and he will have to wait for the car to clear before proceeding

Dry conditions in summer mean dust on country roads that will affect your vision of tail lights if you are following a truck, and the dust will also prevent you from seeing oncoming traffic should you choose to pass a truck. **Don't overtake if you cannot see ahead through dust**

Remember that it is illegal to break the posted speed limit, even when overtaking!

Be patient and choose a safe place to overtake, allowing for the speed of the truck. It is common to see motorists overtaking on double white lines and hooking back in quickly, just in front of the roo bar of the truck. At 100 km/h this is not a safe place to be!

Trucks on our roads over the harvest period may be 27.5 to 36.5 metres in length, and usually weigh between 80 and 90 tonnes loaded. This is more than 45 times the weight of a car and between 6 and 10 times the length.


Motorists should always pay special attention to trucks, not because they are dangerous in their action, but because of their size they are not as reactive to sudden changes in direction or speed as a smaller vehicle. This obviously means if you get in their way the driver may not be able to stop or avoid you.



SEAVROC Young Farmers Participate in World Congress

A group of 16 young farmers have recently returned from the World Congress on Conservation Agriculture held in Brisbane from September 25 to October 3.

The group, from Brookton, Cunderdin, Quairading and York mixed with international visitors from over 70 countries, who came together to discuss world trends in conservation agriculture. Scientists and farmers presented papers on precision agriculture, soil technology, integrated crop residue and weed management and the design of resilient farming systems in the face of changing climate, markets, technologies and policies.

A common theme of the Congress was the importance of food security and the need for developing countries to implement conservation agriculture techniques commonly used in Australia to meet the demands of an expanding world population, predicted to reach 9 billion people by 2050.

A post-Congress tour took the group to various farms and research stations in the South West and Darling Downs regions of Queensland to experience first-hand controlled traffic techniques used in grain, cotton, vegetable and sugar cane production.

The tour was run through SEAVROC Environmental Services, based at the Shire of Quairading and was supported by the Australian Government Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry under Australia's Farming Future. The group have been sharing stories and knowledge gained from the trip with their communities through farmer and landcare groups within their Shires.

Beverley Historical Society 2011 Annual Report

The Society had 18 members this financial year and we had 10 General Meetings. We farewelled foundation member Joyce Oliver who moved away. Joyce's copious knowledge of Beverley's history is much missed.

The main activities of the Society in the past year include: managing the Dead Finish Museum; historical research and writing; guest speakers and field trips; and community support and displays.

Of these the majority of time is spent managing the Dead Finish Museum. The Museum closed over summer, was cleaned (extra difficult because of the ferocious Jan 29 storm), rejuvenated, then opened every Sunday from March to November. This year we experimented with opening Saturday afternoons which has had a mixed response, but will continue next year. We also opened on other days for individuals and bus tours, which this year included people from SEC Retirees Perth, Toodyay Silver Chain, Northam Probus, and Brookton Seniors. The 2010 Year Twos from Beverley DHS had their 'hands on' Olden Days visit in November. Altogether we had about 600 visitors.

We received many **donations** of historical artefacts mostly from the citizens of the Beverley District. Among these two painted family portraits, a 1924 wedding dress, an Edwardian lap desk and memorabilia of Beverley's Swan Bottling Co are of special interest.

Ongoing maintenance of the building included the re-varnishing of the veranda posts, installing some period lampshades, the provision of a ramp for wheelchairs, and hard work in our beautiful well-regarded

garden.

Activities related to historical research and writing included responding to many requests for family history and the awarding of Certificates of Appreciation to authors of local history publications: Anne Fisher On The Dale; Fred Bremner Beverley & Beyond: A Memoir; and Beth Hutchinson Childhood Memories. We also collected speeches made at the opening of the Station Theatre and on Anzac Day

We had two guest speakers this year: Anne Fisher and Fred Bremner gave us insights into the research and writing of their books. Our two field trips were both to the Gwambygine area. In July, we went to the remarkable Gwambygine Caves, first recorded by Ensign Dale, a centre of local Aboriginal culture from way before pioneer settlement. In September an interesting and enjoyable afternoon was spent at the recently restored Gwambygine Homestead. Some members also attended the Royal WA Historical Society's Annual Conference in York where we learned about the history of the Sandalwood Industry, York Town Hall, the Marwick family and the Boulder earthquake.

Working with the community involved displays, meetings and signs. The first occasion was a display of quilts and a mini-market in the museum and garden at Easter both of which were well-patronised. A Bus Tour of Beverley commentary was supplied on Easter Saturday. In August we prepared a display for the Beverley Show on the theme Bouncing Back in Time where we featured information relating to good and bad seasons in the district.

Meetings attended concerned the restored Police Cottages, tourist town walks, Shire Strategic Plan,

Avondale, the future advent of the Wheatbelt Heritage Train and CRANA Aboriginal Corporation.


Also for the community benefit we have been successful, thanks to the Shire, in having brown **tourist signs** put by two historic sites: Haisthorpe Church and North Beverley School.





Seniors groups praise new help centre

- Housing and living arrangements advice for those approaching retirement
- Independent, free advice available

Commerce Minister Simon O'Brien today officially opened the new Seniors' Housing Centre, which will provide vital, free advice to West Australians looking to change their living arrangements as they move towards retirement and beyond.

Mr O'Brien said Consumer Protection had responded to feedback from people who said they had nowhere to go for independent advice when thinking about moving into retirement villages or residential parks.

"As people get older, many look to change their housing arrangements to better suit their lifestyle. Such decisions can prove stressful and this centre is intended to furnish people with the facts they need to make informed decisions," he said.

Chairman of the National Policy Advisory Group at National Seniors Australia David Carvosso applauded the move and said the centre would assist seniors contemplating a change in their housing situations by giving them the necessary information to make an informed decision.

"We are also supportive of the buyer beware message because retirement village residents are often nervous about the future should their retirement village ownership change. The Seniors' Housing Centre will allay this fear," he said.

State History Conference York 2011

Celebrating The Centenary Of The York Town Hall 1911-2011

A day full of history was a rewarding experience for four members of the Beverley Historical Society on Saturday 17th September 2011 at Church of Christ Hall, Avon Terrace, York.

The day began with a witty and humorous welcome by Sir William Heseltine, former Private Secretary to Queen Elizabeth II and now resident of York.

The first research paper was presented in a lively fashion by Pamela Statham-Drew on *Sandal-wood, Avon Valley's Past and Present Saviour.* We learned about the different species of sandalwood and the many products derived from its fragrant wood. The cutting and export of sandalwood brought economic benefit to the region in the 19th Century. This led to overproduction that caused prices to fluctuate and led to Government regulation. At present only 2000

tonnes of sandalwood can be taken from WA government reserves per year. An interesting response to the paper came from a Conference Delegate from Kalgoorlie whose son and daughter-in-law are sandalwood farmers in the Goldfields and export about 200 tonne per annum.

The second paper addressed the theme of the Conference: Origins of the York Town Hall was researched and written by local historian Tony Clack. We learned how the idea for a Town Hall was first mooted in 1861; however a more expedient compromise resulted in the construction of a Mechanics' Institute in 1863. But 1910 saw the Council take over the Institute with the intention of building the long-awaited Town Hall. Not much time was wasted. Tenders for a design were called in September 1910, the Mechanics' Institute demolished in April 1911, the foundation stone for the new building laid in May and the York Town Hall was officially opened by Premier Scadden on 29 November 1911. The style was known as 'Edwardian Opulence' but is now categorised as Federation Free Classical. Due to economic constraints, some of the

design features were not present in 1911 with a clock in the front upper façade not installed until 1952 and the Joaquina St colonnaded façade not completed till 1997.

After a delicious lunch provided by York CWA, Bill Marwick gave us an insight into his ancestors William and Mary Marwick of York. Mary, born Mary Ann Taylor in Ireland, came as an economic refugee after her parents died in the famine. In researching this Irish connection, Bill went to Ireland and received a fantastic welcome, as so little is known there of what happened to individual migrants. In WA, Mary eventually became the mother of 10 children, six of whom were Marwicks. The family have continued a beneficial connection to York and the large old Marwick barn can still be seen on the east side of the Avon River in York.

The final paper of the day came from Boulder historian, Robyn Horner, who described in *Boulder Rocks* the aftermath of the Richter 5.0 earthquake in April 2010 that caused massive damage to many of the old buildings in Burt Street, Boulder, one of the most historic precincts in the mining community.

A presentation concerning the next conference at Guildford in 2012 was amusingly presented by a lady with the dress, voice and mannerisms of a 19th Century citizen. The theme will be *Meet the Governor* and be held at Guildford Grammar school.

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BEVERLEY PARALEGAL, COMMUNITY INFORMATION SERVICES (BCS)

BCS provided information and made referrals (written and via phone) for some Beverley residents who also needed assistance with the witnessing of both formal and informal documents. These matters relate to:

<u>Fines:</u> Infringement Notice (Traffic). When one receives the paperwork...act asap as to mode of payment. In hardship cases get documents witnessed by a JP or other authorised person.

Bailiff Involvement: To seize property prior to the court involvement, one normally receives two notices of intention to recover monies owed. Act asap, once again - discuss your problem with the institution and the Clerk of Courts re monies owed and seek to work out an arrangement to pay off the debt. Don't wait for the dreaded knock on the door to receive a summons or re-possession order.

Probate and Estate Matters: These are usually very complex and traumatic. Seek advice from either a solicitor, Public Trustee or the Citizens Advice Bureau. The application for a Grant of Probate must be lodged with the Supreme Court.

<u>Superannuation:</u> If you are semi retired, retired or facing hardship, seek help/advice from your Fund manager. Centrelink/proof of income plus proof of invoices etc (witnessed by a qualified person) must support application.

Firearms-Curio License-Police: Purchase and transfer applications need to be processed through the internet (on-line), Post Office and Police Permits etc. Both police officers, Darrell and Kerry and Post Office are very helpful. Many thanks.

<u>Tax Returns:</u> for retirees and other pensioners who fall into the tax bracket, seek and provide a statement of income from Centerlink and phone the Australian Tax Office as soon as possible.

Revenue Department: Summons to

recover money. Please take matter seriously asap and declare your intention. Swear an affidavit if necessary before a JP or other qualified person.

Nursing Homes: Aged care. Once a choice is made, (1) Seek financial assessment from Centrelink and a medical team. (2) You can request the CEO of the home to stay one day to get an idea of conditions. (3) You can also request to stay for a further four weeks to enable you to sell unwanted goods or other moving arrangements. (4) take witnesses and/or other family members at all times before you talk to nursing home management or sign any legal documents. Ask questions from both Centrelink and the CEO or Manager. Seek legal advice when in doubt.

Defamation/Slander Malicious Gossip: These matters and law are very complex and arduous. information is basic I am led to believe where there is proven evidence in the form of a witness and on supporting written slanderous material being distributed; this behaviour attracts huge sums of monies (when proven) for legal costs and also when proven, the damages are also hefty and it is not uncommon where parties have had to sell properties to meet damages, court and legal costs. Be very mindful of these outcomes. Always seek legal advice as to your rights and responsibilities. This is very serious business.

Dentist/Dental Clinic: During my time on Council, I have had many talks with our Beverley Shire. The Shire is willing to do its bit i.e. be supportive of this project; but more must be done by both State and Federal Governments. For some years now I have written to both State and Federal Health Ministers and Judi Moylan (MP). I have received many two page replies and matters are still dormant. The York dentist has closed his doors, the nearest dentist who works in with government subsidies are in Northam. For urgent dental problems, see your GP first and get a referral to the Dentist.

Asbestosis (Plural Plaque Disease): There is a case in Beverley that has been going on for some twenty plus years and no final outcome; to short circuit the process I am now requesting Mr Grylls MP for ex gratia

payments. This has also become a slow process, as it involves the Attorney General's Office and other lawyers who follow the due process in law.

<u>Christmas Hampers 2011:</u> For some sixteen years, Share and Care at Northam have been assisting the not so fortunate in our community at the festive season. We thank Carol, their CEO and their helpful staff for the kind gesture and support for Beverley.

CRANA ABORIGINAL CORPORATION INC.

UPDATE

Reserve: From current experience it is getting more and more difficult to conform with criteria and guidelines in seeking funding for this project. Crana in the last 23 years, since its foundation, has not received one cent or any money for the Reserve or the wellbeing of its members, or any financial support towards their day to day running costs.

Plans have been received to construct the building in kit form. Planning applications have also been received and will be submitted to the Shire, which have to conform

with Local Government by-laws.

Once the Crana building is sold, then site and construction work will proceed once approval has been granted by the local Shire.

When we seek funding for this project for building and costs etc, Crana intends to match it dollar for dollar and Crana will be offering labour to construct/erect the kit home, under the supervision of a builder.

<u>Crana as an organisation:</u> The following information should be placed on record:

The Westpac Bank building was sold to Crana in around 1994. The Com-

monwealth Department of Employment was using their office. Indigenous members (who were not employed) had to work 20 hours or so per week to receive Dole benefits. The work included mowing lawns, cleaning back yards, cutting and delivering wood. Some jobs were done free. Eg 4 men would work for 4 hours, rake up yards, take rubbish to the tip and charge \$40/-. Timesheets had to be kept and sent to Northam Aboriginal Wheatbelt Development Corporation for payment. The CDEP program was closed down after a few years. During these years the Aboriginal Wheatbelt Development Corporation collected rent from CDEP and it is alleged they never paid Crana any money. Similarly in 2006 to 2009, the AWDC collected the rent from the Telecentre and once again, Crana did not receive any monies and could not make a claim or take legal action as the AWCD went into liquidation. During these later years the water and Shire rates had not been paid. Mal Roberts gave an undertaking on Crana's behalf to pay off these debts to each party on a fortnightly basis. For over 3 years we have made regular payments to both Shire and Water Corporation and have earned a good credit rating with them.

It should be noted here, that when it comes to applying for a grant for office equipment or building construction—an indigenous organisation has to meet the same criteria like any other applicant. In spite of the fact that Crana is a charitable entity, neither have they collected or received any donations. In this context they have been self sufficient.






