Shire of Beverley **President Report**

2015/2016 Budget

Council has adopted the 2015/2016 budget with an overall increase in rate revenue of 4%. This will assist existing service levels to continue and a number of new initiatives to be funded. It also includes the continuing allocation of funds for renewal of Shire infrastructure.

Please note that the percentage increase in total rate A draft concept plan has been developed by the Shire revenue may not translate to the same percentage change to individual notices, which may have been affected by changes to UV and GRV valuations by the Valuer General (Landate). Council continues to support a 10% discount for rates paid in full by the due date, which is Tuesday 8th September 2015.

The schedule of Fees and Charges for non-regulatory charges has in most cases been increased by 5%. Regulated fees such as planning and development applications, building licences and animal registrations are set by the state government.

Beverley Tourism Steering Committee

Residents are reminded that the Tourism Steering Committee is investigating the development of a Beverley Tourism Planning Framework to guide economically sustainable tourism in our Shire. A community survey has been developed as part of the consultation process, to be distributed with Shire rate notices. A visitor survey has also been developed which will be available through local tourist related businesses. Copies of both surveys will be available from a display in the Shire marquee at the Beverley Show. Reponses can be returned there if you wish. A drawing competition (page 7) with the theme of tourism has been arranged for the younger members of our community (with cash prizes!).

Maintenance Grading

The Shire's Acting Manager of Works (Ian Moulton) has advised that maintenance grading has occurred on the following roads:- Edison Mill, Dobaderry, Kokendin, Kiera, Caroling-Bally Bally, Qualandry, Barrington, Lennard, Spring Hill, Corberding and York-Williams.

Telecommunications

Council had favourable discussions with Telstra representatives prior to the June Council meeting which has resulted in various sites in the district and town being

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tested for coverage by a technician, demonstrations of the Telstra Smart Antenna, some interim upgrades to the 3G tower and reporting of transmission capacity issues to Mia Davies' office. This is by no means a final outcome of what is required to remediate the problems community members have been subjected to, however it has assisted in highlighting the issues, escalated the area for longer term solutions and provided evidence to support future funding programmes.

Main Street Revitalisation Project

Planner to initiate discussion regarding potential revitalisation of the Vincent St shopping precinct. An informal dialogue will be held with business owners following which the concept will be available at the Shire office and website seeking wider comment.

Visitor Information Bay

The new Visitor Information Bay signage and structure has been installed.

Beverley Show – Saturday 22st August 2015

The dedicated Agricultural Society Committee (who are the annual show for our community and visitors to enjoy. The show regularly attracts between 3,000 and 4,000 patrons and an enormous amount of work occurs before. during and after the event, so if you can help out in any way please put your foot forward and your hand up!

The Shire of Beverley will again have a marquee at the show where staff and Councillors will be on hand to provide information and receive your enquiries. The Tourism Steering Committee, currently investigating the potential for a Beverley Tourism Planning Framework to guide the economic and sustainable development of tourism will be seeking comment and feedback regarding this project.

Local Government Elections October 2015

WA Local Government elections are due to be held in October. Nominations are open from Wednesday 3rd September 2015 to Thursday 10th September 2015. If you are a rate payer however do not reside in Beverley (ie you are recorded on the state electoral role at a different location) you will need to ensure you are registered with the Shire in order to vote. This is the first year the Shire of Beverley will not have ward boundaries restricting which candidates you are able to vote for.

RATES

Within the next month property owners will receive their Annual Rates Notice. This explains there are two options to paying your rates.

Option 1 is to pay **in full** by the due date and receive a <u>10% discount</u>. The Early Payment Incentive cannot be granted after the due date of 08 September 2015.

Option 2 is to pay in four instalments, with the first payment due as above. This option attracts several additional charges which are explained on your rates notice.

Due by the following dates:

1st Instalment	08 September 2015
2nd Instalment	10 November 2015
3rd Instalment	12 January 2016
4th Instalment	14 March 2016

If the 1st Instalment is not paid by the due date you cannot join the Instalment Plan. THERE ARE NO **EXCEPTIONS.** An interest component of 5.5% is charged on the second, third and fourth instalments to cover loss of investment income and extra administration to the Shire of Beverley. Instalments not received by the due dates listed above will incur 11% interest penalty for each day the instalment is late.

Please note that, as a last resort, any outstanding rate balances will be handed to a debt collection agency to recover the amount owing.

In certain circumstances a special payment arrangement can be entered into inline with council's policy. If you are having **problems paying your rates**, please contact the Rates Officer on 08 9646 1200 to explore your options.

SHIRE OF BEVERLEY LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS

Election Date

In accordance with the Local Government Act 1995 (and regulations), an Ordinary Election is held every two years on the third Saturday in October.

The Local Government Ordinary Election will be held on Saturday 17 October 2015.

Eligibility to Enrol and Vote

You are eligible to enrol if you are:

- 18 years of age or older;
- An Australian Citizen;
- Correctly enrolled on a State or Commonwealth electoral roll; and
- A resident or a non-resident owner of rateable property or land within the Shire of Beverley.

As of 17 October 2015 there will no longer be wards in Beverley. There for everyone who is eligible (as above) is entitled to vote once.

Enrolments close at 4:00pm Friday 28 August 2015.

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COMPULSORY MICROCHIPPING FOR ALL DOGS AS OF 1 NOVEMBER 2015

The Shire of Beverley has received notice from the Department of Local Government and Communities that from 1 November 2015 it is compulsory for all dogs to be microchipped.

Amendments to the *Dog Act 1976* made in November 2013 provided that from 1 November 2015 the owner of a dog that has reached 3 months of age must ensure the dog is microchipped.

A dog is exempt from the microchipping requirement if a veterinarian issues a certificate stating that the implantation of a microchip may adversely affect the health and welfare of the dog. The certificate cannot apply in respect of a dog that is under three months of age.

When a person registers their dog, they will be required to provide proof that the dog has been microchipped by providing their local government with the microchip number.

If you lose your microchipped dog, it will make it easier for you to be reunited. The dog's microchip can be scanned by the ranger or a vet, which will reveal the owner's contact details.

If your dog is impounded and it is discovered that it has not been microchipped, you may be liable for a fine. As a result, it is in your best interests to ensure your dog is microchipped.

A person who fails to ensure their dog is microchipped on and after 1 November 2015 is liable for a fine of up to \$5,000.

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THE JUDGES HANDY HINTS

For would be winners in the next Act – Belong - Commit Beverley show.

These tips were given by Aileen Hickey from the CWA who was a well known instructor and show judge.

Schedule: Check the rules the judge has to judge according to the schedule, so you must enter according to the schedule e.g. 3 distinct varieties means 3 different varieties.

Collection: 2 or more is a collection.

Preserves: No manufacturers' names, trademarks, etc. on jars and lids. If painting lids, do so well ahead, say 12 months, to prevent paint smell. No rust inside lids. Clean and dust jars. To present for judging, do not use wet cloth to clean jars, use paper towel. The best thing for polishing jars is an old stocking.

Jam: Must be properly set. The jam must not move if you tip the jar of jam upside down. No bubbles in the jam. Labels should be in proportion to the jar, not wrapped around the whole jar. Place label 2/3 to 3/4 up jar, not at the bottom of the jar.

Cakes: Line tins properly. Prevent bubbles in the cake by mixing smoothly. No rack marks on top or bottom of cakes - this will lose points. If your cake cracks across the top it is usually because he mixture is too dry or oven temperature is not correct.

Scones: Scones should be uniform in size with even colour and no sogginess. Dust those scones – no remains of raw flour allowed.

Flowers: Specimen: One only, no buds. Remove buds carefully. Bowl: Width is 1½ times height. Opening is half the width. A container is anything that is not a bowl.

Arrangements: Height - 1½ times above the vase. Present on a mat, doyley, etc.

SUCCESSION PLANNING - A SERIES OF COMMENTARIES [4]

In my previous commentaries on succession planning, I have addressed some of the issues surrounding succession, the importance of using your accountant to assist achieving the family's succession planning goals and the impact of the *Duties Act 2008* (WA) on the transactions that arise from the succession planning process.

In this commentary, I will draw your attention to some of the matters you will need to address during the process.

Our experience has shown that the most difficult and challenging task in the succession planning process is to clearly set out and establish the goal or goals you wish to achieve through the succession plan. Accordingly, we recommend you carefully consider and evaluate the goals you wish to achieve by the succession plan before you start the succession planning process.

The following are some of the important matters that you will need to consider, namely:

- What goals do you want to achieve by the succession plan? What do you want the situation to
 look like at the conclusion of the implementation of the succession plan?
- What is the structure through which the family operates the farming business? Your accountant's
 assistance in answering the question is paramount.
- If a partnership agreement has been entered into, what does the partnership agreement say about
 retirement and succession? If the partnership agreement addresses the issue of retirement, which
 it is likely to do, the partners are legally bound to follow the procedure for retirement and
 succession set out in the partnership agreement.
- Is the entity that owns and operates the farming business different from the entity that owns the land upon which the farming business operates? If so, you must clarify the details of the legal entities that own the farming assets.
- If any of the farming assets are owned by a company, who are the directors, secretary and shareholders and who will be the directors, secretary and shareholders? Will there be a need to resign directorships and appoint new directors? Will there be a need to transfer shares? Are the shares in the company of the same class? If not, what rights and powers are attached to the respective class of shares?
- If the farming assets are owned by a discretionary trust, who is the current appointor and guardian and who will be the future appointor and guardian and trustee? Is there a need to change the trustee or appointor or guardian? If so, how is that to be done and who is take on the offices?
- If the farming assets are held by a unit trust, who is the trustee and who owns the units? Is it
 necessary to change the trustee or to transfer units? If so, how is that to be done?
- Do your current Wills reflect past circumstances or the changes proposed by the succession plan? If your current Wills do not reflect the succession plan, your Wills will need to be changed to align with the succession plan.
- Do you have an Enduring Power of Attorney? If so, who is the attorney and is that attorney to remain your attorney. Also, is the power lodged at Landgate so that your attorney can transact on land that you own?

Beverley in early 1890s From Memoirs of Frank Lodge written in 1947

What is now the main street of Beverley was occupied by the Freemasons Hotel, the Railway Station, the old school and schoolmaster's cottage on the one side; on the other Pat Whitely's store opposite the present Coop stores, the single storied Beverley Hotel owned by old Royce, and Ephy Fairhead's new house where his son lives today. In Hunt Road there was, I think, one house on the York side of the Church and Rectory, an old brick house near where Mr N Brody now lives, Langsford's small brick smithy, the Settler's Arms Hotel kept by old Feeney, nearly opposite was the dwelling house and stores of Mr Horace Smith and behind it the cottage which still stands then occupied by Mr R.J. Edwards and family. Nearby was the old brick farmhouse of Mr Thomas Edwards (Policeman Edwards) which still stands. In front of it on the other side of the road was the Beverley Pound yard with a thatched shed in it, and the Beverley Show Ground on the corner. On the top of the hill a ¼ mile away was the Post Office and Police Station. The two mounted policemen were Corporal Doherty and Trooper Jack Walsh, who many years afterwards as Detective Inspector Walsh was murdered by Coulter and Treffene in the bush outside Kalgoorlie, when he and another detective discovered them smelting stolen gold. Coulter and Treffene were hanged.



Edward Langsford lived in the cottage near railway line now occupied by his son Harold, and Mr Joe Wansborough and family lived in what is now Forrest Street. With exception of one or two other cottages near the Railway Line the ones mentioned was all of Beverley on West side of the River. There was no bank in Beverley. Later the West Australian Bank opened one day a week, the York manager driving from York. Mr Adam Johnston, I think, was the first to do so.

Canon Groser was the Rector of the Parish, Mr James Drake-Brockman stationmaster of the Government Railway and William Higgins stationmaster of the Great Southern Railway Co owning the line to Albany. Some of the landholders around the district were William, Horace, Hubert and Sam Smith; Edward, Jesse, Joe and Henry Blechynden; Henry Lukin; William, Andrew and Bob Robins, James Broun, Darlot Bros of Yangedine, Thomas Edwards of Mt Pleasant, Charles Edwards of Speldhurst, James Bartram, Andrew Strange, J. Moulton, Eddie Lennard, Earnest Lennard of Wannering, John Fleay of Talbot, Jenkin Thomas, Smith of Dongadilly, C and Gr Heal, David Kilpatrick, W.H. de Lisle, J Potts, Alfred and Charlie Draper, J.P. Dempster of Addington, Edward Doncon of Boyadine, Harry Sewell, Bevan Hamersley, Aubrey and Everitt Hancock, Thomas Willy, Charles Chance, Thomas Jackson; Curtis, Edward and John Powell of Severn Grove, Richard Clayton, Henry Millington, John McGrath.

A number of these left worthy descendants, many of whom still live in the Beverley district.

Dr Fred House was the first doctor to reside in Beverley (1891 – 1892). After him came Dr E.H. Schaffer (not fully qualified), Dr S.B. Davies, Dr Blanchard, Dr House a 2nd time, Dr Butler, Dr Richards, Dr Hodgson.

Tom Davy was an early builder and contractor. He and his sons built many farm houses, homes and other buildings.

Three of the settlers mentioned Messrs William Smith, Horace Smith and David Kilpatrick assisted the police sergeant McKenna from York in finding the murderers of Police Trooper Hackett of Beverley, Carbury, Miller and Brown in 1884. The two latter were shot somewhere on the Dale River, after many shots had been fired on both sides from shotgun, rifle and revolvers. Carbury escaped to be captured some days later at the Lakes and afterwards hanged.

Horace Smith, Storekeeper and Butcher, was the best known man in Beverley town and gave friendly and kindly help to many struggling settlers and others. He represented Beverley in the Legislative Assembly for some years. A townsman and landholder of later date was Richard Bowyer Smith, known as Stump Jump Smith, the licensee of Railway Refreshment Rooms and Freemasons Hotel. He claimed to be, and probably was, the inventor of the Stump Jump Plough in South Australia, an implement that did so much towards the cultivation of newly cleared forests in Australia. He was no relation to any of the numerous early Smiths of Beverley.

The most esteemed and liked by all classes of the community was Edward Langsford the blacksmith who with his son Jack worked in the little smithy near Anglican Church and shod practically all of the horses of the district. 4/6 was his price for light horses more for heavier ones. "Surely, Ted" someone said to him, "You were not fool enough to shoe that horse without cash payment for that man who has owed you so much for years?" He replied, "I did refuse to do it, but I looked at the poor horse's feet, and did it for his sake." Good old Ted. It would be good to know that we should meet him and may other friends in "that undiscovered country".

😂 Still awaiting movement at the station regarding restoration but it will happen!

As was reported in last month's Blarney, Beverley Station Arts was a fortunate recipient of the recently announce Royalties for Regions' Creative Regions Program which will see the State Government invest \$24 million dollars in the arts and culture in regional Western Australia over four years. Country Arts is overseeing part of this programme and has requested a profile of our organisation and information about what the CRP Funds are earmarked for. I thought as some readers might be new to town and are unaware of just what happens at the Station Gallery and Platform Theatre, I would include the report sent to Country Arts WA:

Beverley Station Arts (BSA) is responsible for the Beverley Station Gallery and Platform Theatre which is a multi-purpose cultural precinct in the centre of the wheat-belt town adjacent to the railway. The association has the added benefit of being affiliated with Country Arts WA which initiated negotiations for the recently announced Royalties for Regions' Creative Regions Programme of which BSA is fortunate to be a recipient.

The intended long term benefits for Beverley Station Arts is the continuation of "arts in the regions", and for the continuing promotion of the Station Gallery and Platform Theatre as the arts and cultural centre for the community. From this community, BSA offers a variety of cultural activities and functions by way of exhibitions, residencies, learning, music, drama and multicultural events. We are especially dedicated to nurturing and supporting our local talent, both young and old, as well as bringing innovative and inspiring artists to our doorstep by providing a residence and studio space from which to live and work, production support and an audience to reflect on the work.

The station building itself houses the gallery and residency providing a diverse and accessible visual arts programme to the community through its artists-in-residence. Unfortunately, the building has been closed since last October due to structural restoration requirements, but the local Shire has been diligent in getting the necessary approval through the State Heritage Council and works should be commencing in the near future.

In the meantime, BSA has still been able to present monthly outdoor events at the Platform Theatre during the summer, and also continue as best we can to maintain the Artist-in-Residency programme with artists residing in Shire accommodation (although at some cost to the our association). However, with the surprise allocation of \$10,000 from Royalties for Regions' Creative Regions Programme, this rental will now be covered with ease. The Creative Regions Funding will provide not only operational support to BSA, but will be used to employ the expertise of private contractors (in collaboration with BSA executive) to develop both a web page and a professional business plan which will double as skills development for our wholly volunteer committee. Hopefully any remaining funding, can provide some remuneration for event management and artistic programme development. As a launch pad for continuing growth, the funding will ensure the long term future of Beverley Station Arts.

Furthermore, it is worth noting that a group of writers and another 6 individual visual artists cancelled their residencies due to not being able to reside and work at the Station, however, most of them have booked for 2016. And also, until such time as the Station Gallery is restored, the BSA committee monthly meetings are being held in the Platform Theatre greenroom,

as is 2-4 weekly choir practice for "Station Singers".

It has become customary that at the end of the season's events, usually April/May, the hardworking Station Gallery and Platform Theatre team get together for a party. Well, along with the seasonal weather, we were a little late this year, but at the end of June on a sunny afternoon we did just that - got together at 'Southbourne' for a relaxing luncheon.

Lyme disease is preventable

Tick encounters are more likely to occur when bushwalking, mountain biking or gardening in tick-infested areas. Tick bites may go unnoticed as larvae and nymphs are difficult to detect and their bites are painless. Below are eleven tips to help prevent tick encounters.



I Always use insect repellent ::

Use a product with a minimum of 20% DEET. Apply to skin and clothing. Use pyrethrin products on children. Reapply as required.



2 Tuck in your clothes ::

Tuck the legs of your pants into your socks or boots and keep your shirt tucked into your waistband. Wear a wide-brimmed hat.



Wear light-coloured clothes and limit exposed skin :: Ticks are easily seen on light-coloured clothing, allowing for detection and quick removal. Wear long-sleeved shirts and wear long pants.

Always walk on the track ::

Ticks wait on long grass for a passer-by, Staying on the track will decrease the chance of brushing past plants where ticks may be found.



Be tick aware ::

After being outdoors, check for ticks on your clothes and body. Check children and pets. If you find an attached tick remove immediately.



6 Place your clothes in the dryer on high heat :: Put all clothing into a dryer for 30 minutes to kill ticks. Ticks can make it through the washing machine, but most will die during a dryer cycle.



Keep your backyard tidy ::

Regularly remove plant debris and undergrowth. Ticks thrive in moist vegetation. Lower humidity and higher temperatures are detrimental to ticks.

⁸ Mow lawns regularly ::

Ticks like to live in tall grass as it allows easier access. Mow your lawns to less than 5cm tall. Trim trees so that sunlight saturates lawn.



A simple measure to repelling ticks is to use garden-friendly herbs. Grow chrysanthemums, citronella, lavender, sage or garlic in your garden.

Keep firewood dry ::

Store firewood in a sunny/dry place away from vegetation to discourage ticks from living there. It should be covered and raised off the ground.

Don't encourage native wildlife :: This includes animals such as bandicoots, possums, wallabies and lizards.

With spring only a month away August is the calm before the plants and animals spring into life. The days are getting longer and the day time temperatures will soon start lift in anticipation for warmer weather.

Plants which have been dormant during winter will be starting to look for nutrients to aid them in growing new leaves and produce flowers. Use a 'complete fertiliser' with trace elements following instructed application rates. If relying on rain to incorporate fertiliser into the soil apply in late August and avoid fertilising before heavy rain. Do not rely solely on animal fertiliser as they will be deficient in some nutrients.

First plantings of brown onions and zucchini seeds can be undertaken now. Also monitor your soil moisture as rainfall may not be sufficient to prevent crop stress. If you have an irrigation system take some time to check to see if the system is operating correctly, so you are able to use it when needed.

Continue to monitor weeds on your property and undertake any spot spraying of weeds missed in earlier pasture spraying. Weeds growing in pastures which are allowed to grow unchecked will compete with pasture plants for moisture and nutrients.

Is your property up to scratch for safety? Having first aid kits in your vehicles, shed and house can save valuable time in the event of an accident. If they are easy to locate, well stocked and nearby treating an injury can be undertaken quickly. Are there fire extinguishers readily available on the property? Fires can move quickly so being able to locate and use an extinguisher within minutes could save lives, valuable infrastructure or vehicles.

Western Australian pig owners now have a one-stop shop for all their pig information needs with the launch of the PigCentral website by the Department of Agriculture and Food this week. The website provides biosecurity, general health and management information for small-scale pig farmers and owners of pet pigs.

If you own chickens or any other animals it is important to know what is healthy and normal. Chickens should have bright, shiny and wide open eyes. Their feathers should be glossy and lie flat again their bodies. A healthy chicken's comb will be vivid red and their dropping will be slightly moist and dark brown with a white tip. Check your animals regularly and always investigate unusual behavior.

Maintenance funding for schools in Central Wheatbelt

Local Member Hon Mia Davies MLA has welcomed the announcement of maintenance funding for fourteen schools in the electorate of Central Wheatbelt.

The cash injection has been allocated for projects like new paint, carpets, classroom refurbishments, gutter replacements, repair of uneven paving and replacement of air-conditioning units.

"Maintenance funding for schools has been an ongoing issue across the electorate, we have ageing infrastructure, much of which could do with a spruce up," Ms Davies said.

Ms Davies said the fourteen schools had been identified to receive between \$20,000 and \$70,000 toward priority projects:

- Corrigin District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- Dowerin District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- Kellerberrin District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- Mukinbudin District High School, \$70,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting, repair uneven paving
- Narembeen District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- Northam Primary School, \$70,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting, replace 4 evaporative units and painting
- Northam Senior High School, \$20,000 to replace roof gutters
- Quairading District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- Wongan Hills District High School, \$70,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting, repair uneven paving
- Wyalkatchem District High School, \$50,000 to refurbish classrooms, replace carpets and internal painting
- York District High School, \$40,000 to repair uneven paving and replace roof gutters

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It gives me great pleasure in presenting my report to this, the 71st Annual General Meeting of The Beverley Hospital Auxiliary.

The past year 2014 - 2015 has seen several changes.

It was with great regret that we said goodbye in December to our President Vicki Glassby, who took the helm in 2013 but was preparing to relocate to Queensland in December 2014. Vicki lead the committee through the challenges of another relocation for the Opportunity Shop, as well as working with the Shire to resolve the issue of rent payment. We thank her for her two years of service and several years as a committee person. Also farewelled was Maxine Watts who contributed to decision making at meetings and of course, happily sorted sold items at the Op Shop.

And, as mentioned, with the closure of the Child Health Centre building, our biggest hurdle was to find new premises for our Opportunity Shop. The shop was in recess from June 2014 until February 2015 resulting in a stalling of funds being raised. After inspecting various locations, we accepted the offer from the Beverley Shire Council to use the room previously used by the Naturalists Club next to the Lesser Hall. We are grateful to the Toy Library and the Naturalists Club for vacating the rooms for our use.

We are now for the first time in 70 years required to pay a weekly rent, the amount being \$50. Much decision ensued at our meetings and within the community, but our duty of our not for profit business is to raise money for the benefit of the community's health in Beverley, we have moved on, resumed trading and have consolidated our financial position. Thankyou to the community members who offered their support during this difficult time. And thank you committee person Val Moad who coordinated the transfer of goods to "across the road" and creatively arranged the layout of our new shop. With the hours of work done by Val and the supportive effort of the entire committee, the transition has been smooth.

Anxieties about the new cost structure were relieved temporarily with the anonymous donation from a generous Beverley couple who reimbursed the Auxiliary for the rent for the first 6 months of 2015. We were thrilled to receive their pledge and thank them sincerely for their contribution and support.

The Auxiliary has made several donations of items to the Hospital and the Alex Miles Lodge during the past year. New dining room tables for the Lodge as well as a new bird bath for the gardens have been purchased. Requests from the Health Service Manager for 2 shower chairs values at \$1,000 each, a wall mounted flat screen TV with a built in DVD player for the hospital day room and various craft items and pamper have been approved.

As well, substantial funds have been made available to the Primary Health Services in Beverley to purchase teleconferencing equipment to benefit our local services. This equipment will always remain the property of the Primary Health Services in Beverley, even when the service relocate to the Hospital in future years.

The efforts of the Beverley Hospital Auxiliary committee and volunteers to purchase goods for the local Health Service are rewarded by the continuing support we receive from people of the district. 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Be SunSmart during winter

With cloudy skies and cooler days many people think they won't get sunburnt. Sunburn is caused by UV radiation not temperature therefore even on a cooler cloudy day the UV level can be intense. You can get sunburnt on cloudy days, as UV radiation can penetrate some clouds, and may even be more intense due to the reflection from the bottom of the clouds. Outdoor workers have a higher than average risk of skin cancers because they spend long periods of time working in the sun, all year round, over many years of working life.

So it's important to remember that even on cloudy days we need to be mindful of the UV index forecast for that day and protect ourselves as necessary. When the UV index is 3 and above it is time to be SunSmart

- Slip on protective clothing
- Slop on SPF 30 or higher sunscreen
- Slap on a hat (broad brimmed)
- Seek shade
- Slide on some sunglasses

A really great website for learning about the UV Index, including finding out what the UV is right now and the **SunSmart app**, is <u>www.myuv.com.au</u>. While you are there **Download the SunSmart app** to your phone and use it daily. It is free and fun and can be tailored to your location – The app lets you know when you need sun protection, the daily UV level, the weather forecast, and lets you set a reminder for putting on sunscreen and how much (it has a sunscreen calculator!) – check it out on **myUV.com.au**

Remember UV3 is the key!

At UV3+, cover up.

Below UV 3, no sun protection is required.

Warriors Wellbeing Walking up to 20 kms a day Our ancestors and exercise.

Our ancestors were used to walking up to 20 kilometres per day, they had to, to survive on the Savannah Plains and the Serengeti's or they would end up as someone's lunch. We are not designed for sitting around and not exercising. The human body has not had millions of years to adapt to our sedentary lifestyle and we need to If you are limited in how you can exercise you can still change our habits before it is too late.

Blokes, in particular, have had a significant change because many of the work tasks that have always been manually done are now obsolete and/or automated.

Exercise is essential for our brain, mind, body and our cardiovascular health. I have just finished reading a book titled "Brain Rules" by John Medina and rule 1 (out of 12 brain rules) is exercise boosts brain power. enlightening read.

There are a lot variables, from nurture to nature, that help Don't let it stop you exercising - get moving. how we age but one of the greatest predictors of successful ageing is the absence of a sedentary lifestyle. Owen and the Team Civilisation has given us many benefits but it has also meant, that for the majority of us, we have gradually quit moving. The result of this is more and more Australians are being classified as being overweight, with the biggest physical health epidemic in Australia in 2015 being Type 2 Diabetes.

There is a lot of current research that suggests exercise www.regionalmenshealth.com.au can:-

- 1. help prevent Type 2 Diabetes (by up to 60%);
- 2. improve our cardiovascular health thus decreasing the risk of strokes and heart attacks;
- 3. affect the outcome of both anxiety and depression. The fact that exercise helps regulate the release of chemicals (serotonin, dopamine, and norepinephrine) into our bodies makes it an important element in maintaining the right balance;

4. aerobic exercise, just twice a week, halves the risk of general dementia. It also cuts the risk of Alzheimer's by 60%.

So what does this all mean for our exercise regime?

There is a lot of advice around with different suggestions on exercise requirements. This varies from 5 minutes high intensity, to 30 minutes per day, to 1 hour a day every second day. We are the only one that knows our body's physiology and what will ultimately work for us.

make a difference. If you can physically walk only 50 metres a day, double it! Walking 100 metres per day compared to 50 metres does make a huge difference. The improvement in your body's physiology will be profound and the positive effect is that starting with a little bit of exercise will make you want to move more.

Exercise options are endless, swimming, hydrotherapy, light gym work, walking groups, sporting groups, An volunteering; although in regional WA sometimes these options can be problematic for people to access.
