4. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

4.1 Dead Finish Museum

Mrs Whitney enquired as to whether the old printing press located at the Dead Finish Museum site may be placed on a concrete pad and covered by a freestanding gable structure at the Dead Finish Museum Committee's expense.

The Chairperson enquired as to whether there would be interpretation signage included with the development.

Mrs Whitney responded that there would be information signage included.

Mr Hall added that Council employee, Daryl Storer, had been approached to complete the project and that he had agreed and that the project could be completed for around \$1,000.

The CEO stated that Mr Storer will be asked to fully cost the project and pass the information on to the Dead Finish Museum Committee for action.

4.2 Beverley Playgroup

The Chairperson addressed Ms Davey, Ms Loud and Ms Roques who were representing the Beverley Playgroup, advising that Councillors had seen their requests in writing as presented to the CEO and have directed the CEO to progress their relocation through discussions with the Group

Ms Loud provided a brief background of the Beverley Playgroup and raised a number of issues with the relocation, including potential insurance issues due to the playground at the Recreation Ground being accessible to the public, and enquired whether there were any other suitable Council buildings that could be utilised.

The Chairperson responded that a previous applicant had advised that there were no insurance issues with using the playground in that particular case and that there were no other Council buildings currently available.

The Chairperson encouraged the Group to progress the matter through discussion with the CEO.

4.3 Horse Owners/Representatives

Ms Forbes, Mr Martin, Mr Ee and Mr Luk discussed concerns with the proposed stocking rates policy.

Ms Forbes raised concerns regarding using Dry Sheep Equivalent (DSE) rates for Horses, as they were not an accurate measure and that there were other measures used by other organisations that better reflected the stocking rates of Horses.

Shire Planner, Mr de Beer, responded to Ms Forbes statement by saying the DSE rates had been utilised directly from the Department of Agriculture's Small Holdings Stocking Rates report and under state planning legislation, these rates were required to be used.

Mr Martin informed Council of the confusion caused in Kalgoorlie when their Stocking Rates Policy was introduced.

The Chairperson informed Mr Martin that the introduction of the Stocking Rates Policy was to assist small land holders to continue to run livestock.

Mr Ee stated that Council may find it difficult to enforce the policy and may not hold up in a tribunal hearing.

Mr de Beer responded that the Stocking Rates Policy had been formulated and developed to hold up under a challenge.

Mr Ee enquired as to the use of the non-conforming land use clause in the town planning scheme for purposes of continuing a rural pursuit land use (i.e. keeping of horses) on a property.

Mr de Beer explained that this option was entertained by both the Council and the Western Australian Planning Commission when Scheme Amendment 21 was done, and was found to be lacking in sufficient control for the purpose. To be eligible to be considered a non-conforming land use, the proponent would have to prove to Council that the land use had been continuously in operation since before the Scheme was Gazetted, which is 26 April 1993.

Mr Luk made the statement that under Council's Fire Break Order, land holders were encouraged to plough/rotatory hoe their paddocks to reduce fuel build up. Mr Luk believes this is in contradiction to the Stocking Rates Policy which concerns livestock with the production of dust, similar to what may be produced from ploughing/rotatory hoeing.

Mr de Beer informed those present that the Stocking Rates Policy would be amended to include the statement that - the Stocking Rates Policy was not intended to be applied rigidly, but each application will be examined on its merits, with the objectives and intent of the policy the key for assessment. Further, the Planner informed that all reference to a "vegetation buffer" in the Stocking Rates Policy would be removed and replaced by "firebreak".

SUMMARY

Council initiated a Stocking Rates Policy. It will be recommended the policy be granted final adoption given certain modifications.

BACKGROUND

The recently approved and Gazetted Amendment 21 to Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No 2 (TPS 2), reads as follows:

'4.16 RURAL PURSUIT

- 4.16.1 Notwithstanding anything contained in the Zoning Table, the Council may grant consent for a Rural Pursuit use within areas coded R2, R2.5 and R5 of the Residential zone.
- 4.16.2 In considering any application for planning approval for a Rural Pursuit, the Council shall have regard to any relevant livestock stocking rate guidance of the State department responsible for agriculture and any livestock stocking rate policy adopted by the Shire in order to preserve vegetation and amenity of the site and locality.
- 4.16.3 In considering any application for planning approval for a Rural Pursuit, the Council shall have regard to any relevant separation distance guidance of the State departments responsible for health and for environment in order to preserve the amenity of the locality.'

Council at its 22 July 2014 meeting resolved to initially adopt a Draft Stocking Rates Policy and gave instruction to the Shire Planner to proceed to advertising pursuant to Clause 7.6.2 of the Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No 2.

The Draft Stocking Rates Policy was subsequently advertised. This report aims to give feedback as to the outcome of this advertising and submissions received. On the grounds of these submissions, certain modifications to the policy are proposed before final adoption of the Draft Stocking Rates Policy is recommended.

COMMENT

To give effect towards the implementation of Amendment 21 as quoted above, the Draft Stocking Rates Policy was compiled.

Comprehensive consultation with the WA Department of Agriculture and Food (AGWA) was had regarding the general approach and scientific validity of the Draft Stocking Rates Policy, and its applicability to the Beverley subject area.

The basis for the policy is taken from the *Stocking Rates Guidelines for Rural Small Holdings* (WA Department of Agriculture and Food, 2000). The Draft Policy

introduces Base Stocking Rates and Animal Equivalents as quoted in Clause 5.2 of the Draft Policy.

Stocking Rates are defined as the number of stock, e.g. sheep, cattle, horses, etc. that can consistently be kept on a piece of pasture all year round with minor additional feed and without causing environmental degradation. Stocking rates are shown as Dry Sheep Equivalents (DSE) which are the number of adult sheep (wethers) that can be sustained on each hectare all year round.

In consultation with AGWA the Base Stocking Rate for the Beverley area, taking into consideration annual average rainfall and length of the growing season, was determined to be 5 DSE.

In table 1 in the Draft Policy a list is given of Animal Equivalents for the purposes of calculating the Stocking Rate.

Clause 5.3 and figure 1 proposes a method to calculate the maximum DSE for a sample property.

The Draft Policy makes provision for a Property Management Plan to be submitted as part of an Application for Planning Approval, should the Base Stocking Rate for any property be exceeded by a development proposal.

In order for the Shire to be accommodative towards the broader community when considering existing 'Rural Pursuit' land uses in the subject zones, it will be recommended the Planning Application fee be waived in these instances.

CONSULTATION

In compliance with Clause 7.6.2 of the Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 the draft Stocking Rates Policy was advertised in the West Australian for two consecutive weeks. A further notice was placed in the Beverley Blarney as well as on the Council's Website. A period of 21 days was permitted to submit responses.

A total of 5 submissions were received. The submissions and Shire Planner's responses are presented in the table below for Council's consideration. Should Councillors so wish, copies of the submissions can be made available on request.

The following conventions are used in the table:

All submissions are 'noted' however the terminology of 'Dismiss, 'Upheld' or 'Partially Upheld' is standardized. If a submission is only 'noted' it does not make it clear whether Council agrees or does not agree with the submission. If a submission is 'upheld' it means that Council agrees that the policy should be modified as a result of the submission. If a submission is 'dismissed' it means that no modifications are recommended.

- (a) presented to the Council at the next ordinary meeting of the council after the list is prepared; and
- (b) recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

The Chief Executive Officer met with members of the Beverley Hospital Auxiliary on Monday 4 August 2014 and showed the group the Old Dentist Surgery and Naturalist Club areas in the Town Hall, during this gathering a \$50.00 per week rent amount was raised as a possible charge.

SUMMARY

An opportunity to apply for a grant from the Department of Water, Community Water Supply Program 2013-2015 has been the impetus for developing a plan for the first stages of Water Harvesting within the Beverley townsite.

BACKGROUND

As reported in the Information Bulletin, dated 26th August 2014, a community committee with shire representation, in Councillor Davis, are investigating the opportunity for water harvesting with a view to achieving a more sustainable and affordable water supply for town facilities. Planning work undertaken by various committee members over several years is being reviewed and drilling for the purposes of soil sampling is taking place in the preferred locations for water catchment within the town site. These sites are located at the eastern end of Edwards Street, and the area bounded by John, Wright and George Streets, adjacent to the school.

COMMENT

In order to be eligible for grant funding of up to \$100,000 with a minimum financial commitment of 30% of the total project cost from the applicant, a Project Planning Report must be submitted with the application for the grant. This report needs to detail project management, budget estimates, and the results of site investigations, preliminary design specifications, payment schedule and long term management arrangements for infrastructure. The report will need to be presented and endorsed by Council no later than the November council meeting as the grant application is due on the 31st December 2014.

Based on a recommendation from the Department of Water, Consultant Engineer, Rod Munns of RMECS (R Munns Engineering Consulting Services), attended a site visit on the 4th September 2014. Rod was able to advise on the proposed sites and process for soil sampling which are being conducted at the sites listed above in the week ending 19th September.

A cost estimate has been provided by RMECS: approximately \$1800-2400 + GST for initial costs to develop a work plan and budget for funding application, and this would include my time spent thus far, and travelling for another visit to site, and spending most of a day at Beverley - probably when additional drilling is to be done, and additional time offsite doing calculations and drawing up plans on Arcview, obtaining quotations for works, etc.

At the July 2013 Council meeting, it was agreed to set up a Community Grants scheme to assist Not for Profit and Incorporated local organisations in the development of their respective interests.

COMMENT

The second round of Community Grants was advertised in July 2014 in the Beverley Blarney. Applications opened on 7 July and closed on 11 August 2014. A total of three (3) applications were received.

Applications, with the amount requested were received from Beverley Horse and Pony Club \$1,100.00, Beverley Playgroup \$1,000.00 and Beverley Bowling Club \$1,000.00. The grant applications were subscribed to a total of \$3,100 with \$10,000 being available for 2014/2015 with two rounds scheduled for each financial year (July and January).

The applications were considered my Stephen Gollan (CEO) and myself. Clubs had to pass the compliance criteria to be considered eligible. The compliance criteria consisted of: Incorporation, Beverley Based Group/Club, 50:50 matched funds (for grants over \$1000). All three applications met the compliance criteria.

Qualitative criteria was the base used for assessment and consisted of: membership base, benefit to community and the quality of the application.

If clubs take up the proposed grant offers, they will have to expend the money by 30 June 2015 and complete the supplied acquittal forms.
