7. PRESIDENT AND COUNCILLOR REPORTS

7.1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Regional Transition Group (RTG) Meeting – 14 June 2012

Councillors Pepper, White, Murray, Ridgway and the CEO attended a Regional Transition Group meeting in York on Thursday 14 June 2012 covering the topics of Rating Strategy and Operational Costs - Current vs Future State. A presentation was also made by Mr Linton Reynolds, Chairman of the WA Local Government Grants Commission, on the review of the FAGS grants and how this might impact each South East Avon Regional Transition Group (SEARTG) member local government and a proposed new local government.

Dawson Street Units

There was a great deal of interest amongst those who took advantage of looking through the Dawson Street Units at the Friday 15 June 2012 Open Day. Around 80 visited between 2:00 – 5:00pm and Councillors Pepper, White, Murray, Foster and Ridgway were in attendance to take on feedback and comments.

7. PRESIDENT AND COUNCILLOR REPORTS ITEM 7.1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT (Continued)

Northam Supertown

The next stage of funding to Supertowns is to support key projects identified through the planning phase and these were announced on 31 May 2012 in a co-ordinated release across the State.

I attended the announcement in Northam, with that town receiving \$4.8m for an upgraded health and emergency precinct near the hospital and \$3.65m for environmental work at the town pool and along the Avon River.

The final stage of the Northam Supertown Growth Plan, which includes the "hinterland" sub regional planning information, is due in September 2012.

Emergency Management Forum – 1 June 2012

A forum was held at the Burswood on 1 June 2012 which the Community Emergency Services Manager and I attended (as did York representatives). FESA Chief Executive Officer, Mr Wayne Gregson, comes across as very "matter of fact" and practical in his approach, which should be helpful as emergency management now appears to becoming a core business for local government. One segment was provided by Busselton on how they deal with compliance and planning in their Shire regarding fire hazard management and preparedness. A look at what that Shire is doing would provide relevant feedback for our own.

National General Assembly of Local Government 17 – 20 June 2012

The Chief Executive Officer and I attended the Regional Cooperation and Development Forum in Canberra on the Sunday and the National General Assembly in the following 2 ½ days. There were well over 90 in attendance at the NGA from WA, 11 being from our RTG and many others from Wheatbelt Shires. A great deal of peer interaction was evident amongst councils, both Western Australian and interstate, including several of the Councils visited during the recent South Australian Study Tour.

7. PRESIDENT AND COUNCILLOR REPORTS **ITEM 7.1** PRESIDENT'S REPORT

National General Assembly of Local Government 17 – 20 June 2012 (Continued)

Whilst the conference involved much "political and bureaucratic" speak, Regional Transition Group representatives also had an array of meetings thanks to Mr Ray Hooper, Chief Executive Officer Shire of York, which included Senators Mathias Corman and Barnaby Joyce and representatives from the National Broadband Network, Energy Efficiency and Climate Change and Simon Crean's office. The clarity provided by these one-on-one meetings was worth the effort from our end, and our delegation involving 5 Councils working together was noted favourably on several occasions.

Constitutional Recognition of Local Government

In the recent "Williams Case", the High Court found that the Commonwealth does not have the power to provide direct funding in areas and to organisations outside its constitutional responsibility, in this case, funding of a chaplaincy programme in public schools. Direct funding to local government such as Roads to Recovery could also be open to challenge. This was much talked about at the NGA in Canberra and was seen to add weight to Local Government's case for constitutional change, particularly in regard to financial recognition.

BACKGROUND

At its 27 March 2012 meeting Council resolved:

"That Council resolve to close a section of Hunt Road, a section of Mann Street and Blanchard Street Beverley, and to instruct the Shire Planner to proceed with the advertising for road closure pursuant to Section 58 of the Land Administration Act, 1997"

The proposed road closure has been advertised for 35 days in compliance with section 58 of the Land Administration Act 1997 and is being presented to Council for final consideration.

Appendix 2

BACKGROUND

The Shire has received a proposal to construct a glider hangar adjacent to the north western section of the Beverley Airfield. The proposal is an extension to an existing non-conforming use recognised by Council at its 28 October 2008 meeting.

The subject site is zoned Farming, contains buildings associated with the Beverley Soaring Society, a number of on-site caravans and existing glider hangars.

There are a number of existing hangars in the general vicinity of the proposed development. These were granted Planning Approval by Council at its 28 October 2008 meeting.

COMMENT

The proposed development is regarded as a Club Premises and as such is a land use not permitted in a Farming zone. However under Clause 5.2 of the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) Council may grant Planning Approval for the extension of a recognised non-conforming land use. Council recognised nonconforming rights for the land use Club Premises on the subject site at its 28 October 2008 meeting. Therefore Council may grant Planning Approval for the proposed development.

Comment by the Beverley Rifle Club as a result of the advertising of previous hangar applications indicates that the Club is concerned the proposed hangars may protrude into its safety zone. Should Council approve the application, it will be recommended the prohibition of hangars protruding into the safety zone, be a condition of approval.

8.1.1 TOWN PLANNING ITEMS ITEM 8.1.1.2 DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION - GLIDER HANGAR

- LOT 29705 BREMNER ROAD/LUKIN STREET, BEVERLEY (Continued)

A site inspection has revealed that a number of mature trees are located in the vicinity of the proposed development. To protect the environmental values of the area it will be recommended, should Council approve the application, that no trees be removed prior to obtaining the relevant authority's consent.

In the opinion of staff, the visual amenity of the area should be protected through the proposed hangars harmonising with the surrounding landscape. Therefore should Council approve the application it will be recommended the hangars be clad in Colorbond or similar material in a colour that is in harmony with the surrounding area, as a condition of approval.

It is considered the proposed development will be a relatively minor increase on an existing non-conforming use. It is the opinion of staff that the proposal will enhance the gliding/soaring activity that promotes a positive image of Beverley to the wider community. It will therefore be recommended Council grant Planning Approval for the application.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

The applications may be approved under Clause 5.2 of the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2.

BACKGROUND

It is proposed to conduct a natural terrain motorcycle event on Lot 81 Vallentine Road, West Dale on 21 & 22 of July 2012. The subject site is approximately 57ha in extent and zoned 'Farming'. Refer to the appendix to this item for a copy of the site locality map & event overview.

It is anticipated approximately 300 persons will attend the event.

COMMENT

Under the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) the proposed event is a use not listed. Clause 3.2.5 of TPS 2 states that where a land use is not listed Council may: -

- a) determine that the use is not consistent with the objectives and purposes of the particular zone and is therefore not permitted; or
- b) determine by absolute majority that the proposed use may be consistent with the objectives and purpose of the zone and thereafter follow the advertising procedures of Clause 6.2 in considering an application for planning consent, following which the Council may, at its discretion, permit the use.

It is perceived that the event will aid in promoting Beverley Shire in a positive light. Given that the proposed use will not preclude agricultural use of the property for the remainder of the year and provides entertainment options not normally available in Beverley, it will be recommended Council determine that the proposed use may be consistent with the objectives and purpose of the Farming zone.

Advertising

In compliance with Clause 6.2 of TPS 2 the application was advertised to neighbouring affected land owners for 21 days. On report compilation date, a total of 2 submissions were received, none comprising of objections. A summary of the submissions received and officer's responses are detailed in the table below:

It is submitted that the event will aid in economic development and economic diversification in the Shire of Beverley. Direct economic enhancement will occur due to catering for the needs of the substantial number of persons attending the event. Indirect economic benefit will come from raising the profile of Beverley throughout the state and promoting Beverley as a Shire friendly to events of this nature.

This event will provide an entertainment option comparable with those in the metropolitan area and not generally available in Beverley. As such the event will aid in enhancing the amenity of the Shire.

Event Guidelines

The application contains proposals for the effective and safe operation of the event on the day, and addresses issues pertaining to, amongst others, Fire Services, First Aid *et al.* It will be recommended that these proposals be adhered to if the application is approved.

The applicant further submitted that the event will be held under the permit regime of *Motorcycle Australia*, the regulating body for events of this nature. Shire staff considers this as confirmation that the event will be properly and professionally run.

Shiatsu therapy is a form of therapeutic massage. The proposal for this Home Occupation is that the therapy will be administered in a converted room in the present dwelling.

It is deemed this proposal will enhance the economic development through the establishment of a new business and increase service options available in the Shire. Given the relatively minor nature of the proposal and lack of external impact it will be recommended the application be approved.

Advertising

In compliance with Clause 6.2 of TPS 2, the application was advertised to neighbouring affected land owners for 21 days. On report compilation date, a total of 2 submissions were received, none comprising of objections. A summary of the submissions received and officer's responses are detailed in the table below: -

BACKGROUND

The Shire has received a proposal to construct a glider tow plane hangar adjacent to the north western section of the Beverley Airfield. The proposal is an extension to an existing non-conforming use recognised by Council at its 28 October 2008 meeting.

The subject site is zoned Farming, contains buildings associated with the Beverley Soaring Society, a number of on-site caravans and existing glider and glider tow plane hangars.

There are a number of existing hangars in the general vicinity of the proposed development. These were granted Planning Approval by Council at its 28 October 2008 meeting.

COMMENT

The proposed development is regarded as a Club Premises and as such is a land use not permitted in a Farming zone. However under Clause 5.2 of the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2), Council may grant Planning Approval for the extension of a recognised non-conforming land use. Council recognised nonconforming rights for the land use Club Premises on the subject site at its 28 October 2008 meeting. Therefore Council may grant Planning Approval for the proposed development.

Comment by the Beverley Rifle Club as a result of the advertising of previous hangar applications indicates that the club is concerned proposed hangars may protrude into its safety zone. Should Council approve the application, it will be recommended the prohibition of hangars protruding into the safety zone, be a condition of approval.

8.1.1 TOWN PLANNING ITEMS ITEM 8.1.1.6 DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION - GLIDER TOW PLANE HANGAR

A site inspection has revealed that a number of mature trees are located in the vicinity of the proposed development. To protect the environmental values of the area it will be recommended, should Council approve the application, that no trees be removed prior to obtaining the relevant authority's consent.

In the opinion of staff, the visual amenity of the area should be protected through the proposed hangars harmonising with the surrounding landscape. Therefore should Council approve the application it will be recommended the hangars be clad in Colorbond or similar material in a colour that is in harmony with the surrounding area, as a condition of approval.

It is considered the proposed development will be a relatively minor increase on an existing non-conforming use. It is the opinion of staff that the proposal will enhance the gliding/soaring activity that promotes a positive image of Beverley to the wider community. It will therefore be recommended Council grant Planning Approval for the application.

BACKGROUND

In September 2006, Council raised, on behalf of the Beverley Bowling Club, a self supporting loan of \$180,000.00 for the purpose of installing synthetic greens.

The Club has an agreement whereby biannual repayments of \$9,377.61 are paid to Council in June and December each year for a period of fifteen years.

Until the problems occurred with the synthetic greens, the Bowling Club has been diligently making the repayments on the due date. However, when the synthetic greens failed, the Club experienced a major financial setback and was forced to take legal action against the company which did not accept responsibility for the greens.

In April 2011 and as a result of an approach to Council from the Club, the Council resolved: -

"That Council extend the final date for the repayment of the Beverley Bowling Club's self supporting loan, by deferring the biannual instalments of \$9,377.61 in June and December 2011."

COMMENT

The earlier difficulties experienced with the greens was further exacerbated with the 2011 storm, which wreaked havoc throughout the town and the Shire.

This required the Club to negotiate an insurance claim, specify required work, obtain prices and begin the process of remedial work on the greens.

8.4.1 FINANCE ITEMS ITEM 8.4.1.4 SELF SUPPORTING LOAN - BEVERLEY BOWLING CLUB (Continued)

A letter from the Club advised that whilst they are very confident about their future viability, it is possible that in the short term they may experience a temporary shortfall in funding to meet the biannual payment of \$9,377.61. (It should be noted that after a lengthy legal case, the Club has been awarded a payout to help pay for the base of the greens, and the Bowling Club is also awaiting an LGIS payment for the surface.)

In order to maintain good standing with the Council, and as a contingency, the Club is requesting approval to delay, or if necessary, defer the biannual instalment of \$9,377.61 for a further two payments.

If agreed, the Club will have a total deferred liability of \$37,510.55. The initial Loan of \$180,000.00 is for a period of 15 years, maturing on 22 December 2021, with total liability of \$281,328.14, inclusive of interest.

The implications for Council's 2012 / 2013 budget, is that it will not receive \$18,755.22, should Council agree to the request, and the payment is not made.

BACKGROUND

Council currently has two separate policies which give direction on: -

- Purchasing (Procurement); and
- Authority to Purchase.
 - (Appointing personnel and stipulating limits of authority for purchasing.)

COMMENT

These two policies were last considered by Council in 2007 and 2006 respectively.

In addition to the need to review these policies from time to time, it has become apparent that a general review will assist and empower senior officers with day-to-day work and also to meet service delivery targets within clearly defined purchasing parameters. Accordingly, it is proposed to increase the purchasing authority of the Works Supervisor in recognition of the substantial cost materials used in association with the works programme. Other more modest increases are aimed at recognising procurement needs at operational level. Additionally, this review will take account of inflation during the last 5 or more years.

The appendixed policy represents an amalgamation of two existing policies. Some of the text has been simplified; however none of the core requirements have been lost. The requirements of Council, the Chief Executive Officer's management directions and the overriding Legislative obligations are preserved.

It is logical to amalgamate the Procurement and Purchasing Statements into a composite document, to ensure the Council requirements are linked and staff can obtain all information at a single reference point.

8.5.2.1 <u>Staff – Deputy Chief Executive Officer</u>

The position of Deputy Chief Executive Officer has been advertised. Applications closed at 4:00pm on Wednesday 30 May 2012.

I received six applications and will be interviewing two candidates

8.5.2.2 WA Local Government Grants Commission – Advance Payment

I have received advice from the Department of Local Government that the Commonwealth Government will be paying 50% of the 2012 / 2013 Financial Assistance Grants pool in advance.

This equates to \$565,807.00 being made up of \$330,222.00 General Purpose Grant and \$235,585.00 Local Road Grant.

There will still be four quarterly payments made to each local government in the 2012 / 2013, however the total of these payments will be reduced by the advance payment.

The WA Grants Commission is currently in the process of acquiring Ministerial approval for the 2012 / 2013 Notional Financial Assistance Grants and they will provide Council of these figures as soon as possible. Confirmation of the final grant will occur in early August 2012.

8.5.2.3 <u>Country Local Government Fund – Regional Groups of Local</u> <u>Governments</u>

I have been advised that Beverley was successful in obtaining the grant from the Country Local Government Fund 2011 / 2012 Regional Group Project for the Beverley Function and Recreation Centre.

The amount received is \$905,977.00.

The President and I have signed the Financial Assistance Agreement (FAA) along with the Regional Transition Group Chief Executive Officers and have returned the Agreement. It is anticipated that Council may receive the funds prior to 30 June 2012.

8.5.2.4 <u>Country Local Government Fund – Individual Allocations</u>

The Department of Regional Development and Lands have written acknowledging that Council's 2008 / 2009 Country Local Government Fund allocation of \$605,681.00 was spent accordingly on the Independent Living Units.

8.5.2 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT ITEM 8.5.2.4 Country Local Government Fund – Individual Allocations (Continued)

As the 2008 / 2009 allocation has been acquitted, I have received the draft Financial Assistance Agreement for Council's 2010 / 2011 individual allocation being \$381,821.00. This allocation has been committed to the Beverley Function and Recreation Centre.

I have recently finalised the insurance claims for the damage that occurred from the 2011 storms in January.

The total amount of the claims were \$350,405.00, the two large claims were for the Amenities Building and the Bowling Club.

 paddock, using the natural formations and contours of the land to create a winding and interesting

- Riders start behind a metal starting gate and are not able to enter the course until the gate is dropped.
- Riders are able to walk the track prior to racing commencing.
- Riders have a 3 lap sighting lap prior to racing commencing.
- Races are usually 3 laps in length, with places awarded to the 1st, 2nd & 3rd rider.
- Juniors (U16) are normally held on a Saturday with Seniors on Sunday.
- All races are held between the hours of 9am and 4pm.

Competitors

Saftey Procedures

- Qualified First Aid personnel in attendence with phone contact to Hospital.

- If required an Ambulance will be called to transport injured rider to Hospital.
- If First Aid is not in attendence, racing will cease.
- All competitors are required to have Ambulance cover.
- Two way radios used by all main officials.
- Flag Marshalls at all main points around track.
- Sweep Riders to signal track all clear, prior to next race commencing.
- Public warning signs are errected in area.
- The control and Pit area is a Smoke and Alcohol Free area.
- Dust is controlled by watering the track between races.
- Fire Extinguishers are placed in the Pit and Starting area.
- Parking is controlled by Parking Attendant for safe exit access.

Motorcycles

- Must be inspected by a Licenced Machine Examiner and comply with MA regulations before being permitted to race.
- Must be presented in a clean state to minimise soil borne diseases from other areas.
- They must be fitted with an approved muffler or silencer.

Evacuation Proceedure

PA System used to advise people of requirements. Flag Marshalls would assume the role of Traffic control guiding people to the exit points. Police would be called to assist with main road traffic control.

Waste

- All waste will be removed from the site.
- Recovery Equipment to be used in the event of a fuel or oil spill.
- Portable toilets to be collected and cleaned off site.
- Rubbish Bags and Bins will be collected.
- Grounds will be manually checked (walked) for any remaining rubbish at end of event.

As you aware the Beverley Bowling Club is currently undertaking work to replace their two carpet greens from the base up. We have decided to install two Dry-Max greens using the West Australian company Court Track & Field.

This is great news after several years of frustration dealing with lawyers and not having a suitable surface to play on. It is a positive move for both the club and its' members and for the town.

The club received a payout as a result of our legal action to help pay to replace the base, and is currently awaiting payment for a claim to LGIS to pay for the surface.

These two payments and an investment held by the club will pay for the greens. It may be a little 'tight' for a few months having to pay GST and wait for it to be remitted and maybe having unexpected costs along the way, but the committee is confident we will overcome any short term shortfalls in finance.

However as a precaution, and to enable the club to operate without hardship, we are again asking the Councillors to consider suspending our bi annual loan repayments for one more year.

We are confident that once the new greens are installed our financial position will improve dramatically, and over a short period of time. So we are also hopeful of being in a position to meet our obligations and to be able to resume the loan payments within the next twelve month period.

If things go as planned we will be playing on the greens by the end of August giving us the opportunity to hold Winter events and to re-coup money spent before our official season even begins.

The Beverley Bowling Club is grateful to the Shire and Councillors for their continued support of the club and it is regrettable that we have to make this request. However this time it is with a positive end in sight.

Perhaps we can just also bring to your attention that next year marks the 100th year of the Beverley Bowling Club. What a fitting time to be able to celebrate the achievement and our new greens. Things are certainly looking up for the club.

1.1 STATEMENT OF INTENT

The intent of this policy is to provide clear direction to staff when carrying out purchasing of goods and services for the Shire of Beverley and to ensure that purchasing is undertaken in an efficient, effective, economical and sustainable manner that provides transparency and accountability of the procurement process. This policy:

- Provides the Shire of Beverley with an effective way of purchasing goods and services.
- Ensures that purchasing transactions are carried out in a fair and equitable manner.
- Strengthens integrity and confidence in the purchasing system.
- Ensures that the Shire of Beverley receives value for money in its purchasing.
- Provides for the Shire of Beverley to consider the environmental impact of the procurement process across the life cycle of goods and services.
- Ensures the Shire of Beverley is compliant with all regulatory obligations.
- Promotes effective governance and definition of roles and responsibilities.
- Apply purchasing practices that withstands probity.

Procurement Policy & Authority to Purchase

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1.2 OBJECTIVES

Purchasing Procedures are to encompass the following requirements:

To provide compliance with the Local Government Act 1995 and the Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 1996.

Compliance with the guidelines contained within the Local Government Purchasing and Tender Guide published by the Western Australia Local Government Association.

To ensure consistency for all purchasing activities that integrates within all the Shire of Beverley operational areas.

1.3 ETHICS AND INTEGRITY

All officers and employees of the Shire of Beverley shall observe the highest standards of ethics and integrity in undertaking purchasing activity and act in an honest and professional manner that supports the good standing of the Shire of Beverley.

The following principles, standards and behaviours must be observed and enforced through all stages of the purchasing process to ensure the fair and equitable treatment of all parties;

- Fully accountability shall be taken for all purchasing decisions and the efficient, effective and proper expenditure of public monies based on achieving value for money;
- All purchasing practices shall comply with relevant legislation, regulations, and requirements consistent with the Shire of Beverley policies and code of conduct;
- Purchasing is to be undertaken on a competitive basis in which all potential suppliers are treated impartially, honestly and consistently;
- All processes, evaluations and decisions shall be transparent, free from bias and documented in accordance with applicable policies and audit requirements;
- Any actual or perceived conflicts of interest are to be identified, disclosed and appropriately managed; and
- Any information provided to the Shire of Beverley by a supplier shall be treated as commercial-in-confidence and should not be released unless authorised by the supplier or relevant legislation.

1.4 VALUE FOR MONEY

Value for money is an overarching principle governing purchasing that allows the best possible outcome to be achieved for the Shire of Beverley. It is important to note that compliance with the specification is more important than obtaining the lowest price, particularly taking into account user requirements, quality standards, sustainability, life cycle costing, and service benchmarks.

Procurement Policy & Authority to Purchase

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An assessment of the best value for money outcome for any purchasing should consider:

- All relevant whole-of-life costs and benefits whole of life cycle costs (for goods) and whole of contract life costs (for services) including transaction costs associated with acquisition, delivery, distribution, as well as other costs such as but not limited to holding costs, consumables, deployment, maintenance and disposal.
- The technical merits of the goods or services being offered in terms of compliance with specifications, contractual terms and conditions and any relevant methods of assuring quality;
- Financial viability and capacity to supply without risk of default. (Competency of the prospective suppliers in terms of managerial and technical capabilities and compliance history); and
- Competition in the allocation of orders or the awarding of contracts. This is achieved by obtaining a sufficient number of competitive quotations wherever practicable.

Where a higher priced conforming offer is recommended, there should be demonstrable benefits over and above the lowest total priced, conforming offer.

1.5 SUSTAINABLE PROCUREMENT

Sustainable Procurement is defined as the procurement of goods and services that have less environmental and social impacts than competing products and services.

The Shire of Beverley is committed to sustainable procurement and where appropriate shall endeavour to design quotations and tenders to provide an advantage to goods, services and/or processes that minimise environmental and negative social impacts. Sustainable considerations must be balanced against value for money outcomes in accordance with any Shire of Beverley sustainability objectives.

Procurement Policy & Authority to Purchase

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1.6 PURCHASING THRESHOLD

Where the value of procurement (excluding GST) for the value of the contract over the full contract period (including options to extend) is, or is expected to be: -

\$100,000 and above	Conduct a public tender process.

Where it is considered beneficial, tenders may be called in lieu of seeking quotations for purchases under the \$100,000 threshold (excluding GST). If a decision is made to seek public tenders for Contracts of less than \$100,000, a Request for Tender process that entails all the procedures for tendering outlined in this policy must be followed in full.

The Chief Executive Officer may, where it is not possible to obtain the minimum quotations or in any other justifiable circumstances, waive the need to seek the required number of quotations prior to undertaking a purchase.

All parties providing quotations are to be notified if they are unsuccessful (note successful parties will be notified formally by issue of a purchase order).

The Shire of Beverley will compile and maintain a preferred list of suppliers if the Chief Executive Officer believes it is warranted. Only one quote, unless considered prudent to seek more, is required for prospective purchases made from a supplier listed on the Shire's preferred list of suppliers.

1.6.1 Up to \$5,000

Where the value of procurement of goods or services does not exceed \$5,000, direct purchase from the supplier may be made. However, it is recommended to use discretion and occasionally undertake market testing with a greater number or more formal forms of quotation to ensure best value is maintained.

This purchasing method is suitable where the purchase is relatively small and low risk.

Record keeping requirements must be maintained in accordance with record keeping policies.

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1.6.2 \$5,001 to \$29,999

This category is for the procurement of goods or services where the value of such procurement ranges between \$5,001 and \$29,999.

At least two verbal or written quotations (or a combination of both) are required. Where this is not practical, e.g. due to limited suppliers it must be noted through records relating to the process.

The general principles for obtaining verbal quotations are:

- Ensure that the requirement/specification is clearly understood by the Shire of Beverley employee seeking the verbal quotations;
- Ensure that the requirement is clearly, accurately and consistently communicated to each of the suppliers being invited to quote;
- Read back the details to the Supplier contact person to confirm their accuracy; and
- Written notes detailing each verbal quotation must be recorded.

Record keeping requirements must be maintained in accordance with record keeping policies.

1.6.3 \$30,000 to \$49,999

For the procurement of goods or services where the value exceeds \$30,000 but is less than \$49,999, it is required to obtain at least two written quotes (commonly a sufficient number of quotes would be sought according to the type and nature of purchase).

The responsible officer is expected to demonstrate due diligence seeking quotes and to comply with any record keeping and audit requirements.

Record keeping requirements must be maintained in accordance with record keeping policies.

NOTES: The general principles relating to written quotations are:

- An appropriately detailed specification should communicate requirement(s) in a clear, concise and logical fashion.
- Invitations to quote should be issued simultaneously to ensure that all parties receive an equal opportunity to respond.
- Offer to all prospective suppliers at the same time any new information that is likely to change the requirements.
- Responses should be assessed for compliance, then value for money and all evaluations documented.
- Respondents should be advised as soon as possible after the final determination is made and approved.

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1.6.4 \$50,000 to \$99,999

For the procurement of goods or services where the value exceeds \$50,000 but is less than \$99,999, it is required to obtain at least three written quotations containing price and a sufficient amount of information relating to the specification of goods and services being purchased.

For this procurement range, the selection should not be based on price alone, and it is recommended to consider some of the qualitative factors such as quality, stock availability, accreditation, time for completion or delivery, warranty conditions, technology, maintenance requirements, organisation's capability, previous relevant experience and any other relevant factors as part of the assessment of the quote.

Record keeping requirements must be maintained in accordance with record keeping policies.

1.7 REGULATORY COMPLIANCE

1.7.1 Tender Exemption

In the following instances public tenders or quotation procedures are not required (regardless of the value of expenditure):

- An emergency situation as defined by the Local Government Act 1995;
- The purchase is under a contract of WALGA (Preferred Supplier Arrangements), Department of Treasury and Finance (permitted Common Use Arrangements), Regional Council, or another Local Government;
- The purchase is under auction which has been authorised by Council;
- The contract is for petrol, oil, or other liquid or gas used for internal combustion engines; or
- Any of the other exclusions under Regulation 11 of the Functions and General Regulations apply.

1.7.2 Sole Source of Supply (Monopoly Suppliers)

The procurement of goods and/or services available from only one private sector source of supply (i.e. manufacturer, supplier or agency) is permitted without the need to call competitive quotations provided that there must genuinely be only one source of supply. Every endeavour to find alternative sources must be made. Written confirmation of this must be kept on file for later audit.

Note: The application of provision "sole source of supply" should only occur in limited cases and procurement experience indicates that generally more than one supplier is able to provide the requirements.

1.7.3 Anti-Avoidance

The Shire of Beverley shall not enter two or more contracts of a similar nature for the purpose of splitting the value of the contracts to take the value of consideration below the level of \$100,000, thereby avoiding the need to publicly tender.

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1.7.4 Tender Criteria

The Shire of Beverley shall, before tenders are publicly invited, determine in writing the criteria for deciding which tender should be accepted.

An evaluation panel shall be established prior to the advertising of a tender and include a mix of skills and experience relevant to the nature of the purchase.

1.7.5 Advertising Tenders

Tenders are to be advertised in a state-wide publication e.g. "The West Australian" newspaper, Local Government Tenders section, preferably on a Wednesday or Saturday.

The tender must remain open for at least 14 days after the date the tender is advertised.

The notice must include:

- a brief description of the goods or services required;
- information as to where and how tenders may be submitted;
- the date and time after which tenders cannot be submitted;
- particulars identifying a person from who more detailed information as to tendering may be obtained;
- detailed information shall include:
 - such information as the Shire of Beverley decides should be disclosed to those interested in submitting a tender;
 - o detailed specifications of the goods or services required;
 - o the criteria for deciding which (if any) tender should be accepted;
 - whether or not the Shire of Beverley has decided to submit a tender; and
 - whether or not tenders can be submitted by facsimile or other electronic means, and if so, how tenders may so be submitted.

1.7.6 Issuing Tender Documentation

Tenders will not be made available (counter, mail, internet, referral, or other means) without a robust process to ensure the recording of details of all parties who acquire the documentation.

This is essential as if clarifications, addendums or further communication is required prior to the close of tenders, all potential tenderers must have equal access to this information.

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1.7.7 Tender Deadline

A tender that is not received in full in the required format by the advertised Tender Deadline shall be rejected.

1.7.8 Opening of Tenders

No tenders are to be removed from the tender box, or opened (read or evaluated) prior to the Tender Deadline.

Tenders are to be opened in the presence of the Chief Executive Officer's delegated nominee and preferably at least one other Council Officer. The details of all tenders received and opened shall be recorded in the Tenders Register.

Tenders are to be opened in accordance with the advertised time and place. There is no obligation to disclose or record tendered prices at the tender opening, and price information should be regarded as *commercial-in-confidence* to the Local Government. Members of the public are entitled to be present.

The Tenderer's Offer form, Price Schedule and other appropriate pages from each tender shall be date stamped and initialled by at least two Shire of Beverley Officers present at the opening of tenders.

1.7.9 No Tenders Received

Where the Shire of Beverley has invited tenders, however no compliant submissions have been received, direct purchases can be arranged on the basis of the following:

- a sufficient number of quotations are obtained;
- the process follows the guidelines for seeking quotations between \$40,000 and \$99,999 (listed above);
- the specification for goods and/or services remains unchanged; and
- purchasing is arranged within 6 months of the closing date of the lapsed tender.

1.7.10 Tender Evaluation

Tenders that have not been rejected shall be assessed by the Shire of Beverley by means of a written evaluation against the pre-determined criteria. The tender evaluation panel shall assess each tender that has not been rejected to determine which tender is most advantageous.

1.7.11 Addendum to Tender

If, after the tender has been publicly advertised, any changes, variations or adjustments to the tender document and/or the conditions of tender are required, the Shire of Beverley may vary the initial information by taking reasonable steps to give each person who has sought copies of the tender documents notice of the variation.

Procurement Policy & Authority to Purchase

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1.7.12 Minor Variation

If after the tender has been publicly advertised and a successful tenderer has been chosen but before the Shire of Beverley and tenderer have entered into a Contract, a minor variation may be made by the Shire of Beverley.

A minor variation will not alter the nature of the goods and/or services procured, nor will it materially alter the specification or structure provided for by the initial tender.

1.7.13 Notification of Outcome

Each tenderer shall be notified of the outcome of the tender following Council resolution. Notification shall include:

- The name of the successful tenderer.
- The total value of consideration of the winning offer.

The details and total value of consideration for the winning offer must also be entered into the Tenders Register at the conclusion of the tender process.

1.7.14 Records Management

All records associated with the tender process or a direct purchase process must be recorded and retained. For a tender process this includes:

- Tender documentation;
- Internal documentation;
- Evaluation documentation;
- Enquiry and response documentation;
- Notification and award documentation.

For a direct purchasing process this includes:

- Quotation documentation;
- Internal documentation;
- Order forms and requisitions.

Record retention shall be in accordance with the minimum requirements of the State Records Act, and the Shire of Beverley internal records management policy.
