SUMMARY

An application has been received to construct a 'Restored Truck Observation Structure' at 146 (Lot 27) Vincent Street. It will be recommended the application be approved.

BACKGROUND

The Beverley Men's Shed intends to construct a 'Restored Truck Observation Structure' that will enable them to publicly display a restored truck.

The subject site is located at 146 Vincent Street and is Zoned 'Town Centre'. It contains the existing Men's Shed and the Heritage listed Beverley Fire Station.

COMMENT

The Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) states the following in Clause 4.8:

- '4.8.1 The land in the Town Centre Zone is hereby designated as "Town Centre Design Control Area".
- 4.8.5 In considering application for planning consent for a proposed development (including additions and alterations to existing development) in the Town Centre Design Control Area Council shall have regard to the following:
- a) The colour and texture of external building materials;
- b) For all buildings fronting Vincent Street Council may require the building facade and side walls to a building depth of 3m to be constructed in masonry;
- c) Building size, height, bulk roof pitch;
- d) Setback and location of the building on its lot;
- e) Architectural style and design details of the building;
- f) Function of the building;
- g) Relationship to surrounding development; and
- h) Other characteristics considered by the Council to be relevant.'

Taking cognisance of the significance of the locality as a result of its Heritage Listing, the application was referred to the State Heritage Office (SHO) for their consideration and advice. Their responses are listed below:

'SHO Findings:

- The place contributes to the historic streetscape and collection of interwar style buildings in Vincent Street in Beverley;
- We note that the proposed shed is a lightweight structure with mesh sides, so that it remains transparent;

• We note that the new structure is to be located on the concrete slab of the pre-painted corrugated galvanized steel shed (removed) and is of no heritage significance.

SHO Advice:

The proposed development, in accordance with the plans submitted, is supported subject to the following condition:

 The proposed structure should be set back from the street, as far as the existing concrete slab will allow.'

Taking into account the purpose, design and proposed location of the structure as well as the advice from the State Heritage Office, it is not anticipated that the proposal will have a negative impact on the amenity of the locality. As a result of the specific siting and purpose of the proposal, it is not considered appropriate to require the applicant to adhere to clause 4.8.5 b) as quoted above.

The Shire Planner is of the opinion that the proposal will add value to the tourism experience the main street has to offer and should be supported.

CONSULTATION

The State Heritage Office was consulted as described above. A copy of their response is included as an Annexure to this report.

SUMMARY

It is proposed to relocate a secondhand building (dwelling) to 57 (Lot 1652) Richardson Street. It will be recommended the application be approved.

BACKGROUND

The applicant is proposing to relocate a second hand building to 57 (Lot 1652) Richardson Street. The subject site is zoned 'Residential' and is vacant.

COMMENT

(Kindly consider this section by referring to the attached Locality Map, and other documentation).

Under Clause 4.13 of the Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) the use of second hand cladding or the relocation of a second hand building shall only be permitted at the discretion of Council. Council must consider if the building is in a satisfactory condition and will not detrimentally affect the amenity of the area. To ensure compliance with any conditions of approval Council may require a bond. Implementation of the provisions of TPS 2 is guided by Council policy.

Planning for second hand dwellings is guided by Council's Relocated Second Hand Buildings Policy. The objective of the policy is to ensure that the relocation of second hand buildings is undertaken to an approved standard which pays regard to local amenity and aesthetics.

To address any possible amenity and aesthetic concerns should Council approve the application, it will be recommended the dwelling is finished to an acceptable standard, as a condition of approval. To ensure the dwelling is finished within an acceptable timeframe it will be recommended a bond, in compliance with TPS 2 and Council's policy, is also imposed as a condition of approval.

Council's Relocated Second Hand Buildings Policy requires an inspection by the Shire's Building Surveyor of the dwelling prior to relocation into the Shire. The purpose of this requirement is to ensure the dwelling is suitable for relocation. In consultation, and with the agreement of the Shire's Building Surveyor a deviation from this policy requirement is proposed, as the applicant has submitted favourable reports from a professional consulting Civil Engineer, Architect as well as a Timber Pest Detection Report (attached hereto). All abovementioned reports are favourable as to the intended relocation action in terms of the structural integrity of the building and continued use as a dwelling unit.

The recommended conditions of approval are consistent with TPS 2 and Council policy and are anticipated to address any matters of concern. Therefore it will be recommended the application is approved.

Consultation:

As a result of the proposed site-specific location of the dwelling on the lot, in relation to neighbouring land uses, it was not considered necessary to consult with neighbouring property owners.

- 6. Prior to occupation, the exterior of the dwelling is to be finished to an acceptable standard in an approved colour which is in harmony with the amenity of the area, to the satisfaction of the Shire.
- 7. As the Water Corporation reticulated sewer is not available the premises are to be connected to an approved wastewater system, which complies with the requirements of the Treatment of Sewerage and Disposal of Effluent and Liquid Waste Regulations. The approved system is not to be used for disposal of industrial liquid waste or other non-ablution wastes (refer to advice note 3).

Advice Notes:

- 1. Nothing in the approval or these conditions shall excuse compliance with all relevant written laws in the commencement and carrying out of the development.
- 2. The applicant is advised a building permit is required prior to commencement of any building works.
- 3. With regard to condition 7, an application is to be submitted to the Council's Environmental Health Section in conjunction with the Building Permit application.
- 4. With regard to Condition 3, in compliance with Council's Relocated Second-Hand Buildings Policy, the \$5,000 bond is to be lodged with the Shire. Bank or other guarantees are not acceptable.





- 6. Prior to occupation, the exterior of the dwelling is to be finished to an acceptable standard in an approved colour which is in harmony with the amenity of the area, to the satisfaction of the Shire.
- 7. As the Water Corporation reticulated sewer is not available the premises are to be connected to an approved wastewater system, which complies with the requirements of the Treatment of Sewerage and Disposal of Effluent and Liquid Waste Regulations. The approved system is not to be used for disposal of industrial liquid waste or other non-ablution wastes (refer to advice note 3).

Advice Notes:


- 1. Nothing in the approval or these conditions shall excuse compliance with all relevant written laws in the commencement and carrying out of the development.
- 2. The applicant is advised a building permit is required prior to commencement of any building works.
- 3. With regard to condition 7, an application is to be submitted to the Council's Environmental Health Section in conjunction with the Building Permit application.

Please find plans for the proposed relocation of a single storey, framed transportable residence to the above property.

As you are aware, the relocation of existing transportable buildings that are in good condition can significantly reduce the negative environmental impacts associated with building waste being sent landfill resulting from demolition and the subsequent production of new building materials.

This residence is being relocated from the Shire of Capel and is retaining its original use and classification. Under Building Regulations 2012, parts 4&5 of Division 1 31D (pages 27 & 28), we would like to apply for an exemption from current building standards in relation to the energy efficiency requirements for new residences.

To assist with the approval process, as far as possible, I have completed the BCA Energy and Water Efficiency Verification, Deemed-to-Satisfy Solutions for Class 1 and 10 Buildings and Structures for Climate Zone 4 along with the Air movement Data Sheet, Deemed-To-Satisfy (DTS) COMPLIANCE REPORT (Class 1&10a Buildings), (BCA 2009 Volume Two Part 3.12 - Energy Efficiency and WA Additions (Hot water Systems & Water Use) and the Glazing Calculator For Use with Part 3.12.2, BCA Volume Two (Housing) to demonstrate the standard to which the building has been constructed.

If you require more information on energy efficiency exemptions for relocated dwellings, please contact Kishor at the WA Building Commission on 9476 1327.

The building will be positioned so that the main living area has a northern orientation and a large verandah along the front of the house will provide shade to all north facing windows. The building was originally constructed in 1986 by EZE Constructions in Perth and transported to its site in Capel. The type and rating of insulation in the roof is R3.5 Batts and the walls contain sisalation. The level of occupancy comfort experienced across the seasonal cycles in the building at its current location indicates that the insulation value is typical of this era of construction.

I trust that the supplied plans along with the above details provides you with sufficient information to assess the building application. Any further enquires can be directed to the applicant.

At your request we have assessed this building as to suitability for relocation. The building is a 13.2 metre long by 8.4 metre wide by 2.4 metre ceiling height transportable home. The transportable was built by EZE CONSTRUCTIONS of Kenwick and is of timber framed construction on a steel sub frame. The building is at present located on a Region A, Terrain Category 2 site as defined in the wind code AS/NZS 1170.2.

We are pleased to be able to report that we consider the building to be structurally adequate and suitable for relocation to Lot 1652 Richardson Road, Beverley, being Region A, Terrain Category 2 (AS 1170.2) and seismic (AS 1170.4), with and acceleration coefficient as defined in the Building Code of Australia.

Our assessment is supported by the following observations. The substructure, floors, walls and roof structure appear to be in reasonable condition for the age of the building, being free of noticeable termite damage, or major distortions or excessive deflections that would indicate structural fault or movement mechanisms having occurred or still occurring.

All work required in the restoration of this building is to be completed in accordance with the requirements of the Building Code of Australia and approved drawings. New stumps to be positioned at original locations. Footings have been design checked for an S class site (AS 2870), and to be at a minimum 450mm diameter by 600mm deep 20MPa strength concrete.

SUMMARY

An application has been received to subdivide Lot 2 Maitland Road, Kokeby in order to create a Homestead Lot. The application will be recommended for approval.

BACKGROUND

The property is zoned 'Farming' and contains agricultural related infrastructure and land uses, and a dwelling with outbuildings.

COMMENT

(Kindly consider this section by referring to the attached Locality Map and Subdivision Plan).

The proposal is to create a Homestead Lot around the existing house and outbuildings in order to retain them while the remaining farm portion can still be used for farming purposes.

The application was assessed against the prescriptions of the Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2), the Shire of Brookton & Beverley Local Planning Strategy (LPS), and the Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) Development Control Policy 3.4 (DC 3.4) – Subdivision of Rural Land – March 2012.

Amongst others, TPS No. 2 states that:

- 3.5 Farming Zone:
- 3.5.1 Objectives
- a) To protect the potential of agricultural land for primary production and to preserve the landscape and character of the rural areas;
- To provide for a range of rural pursuits such as broadacre and diversified farming which are compatible with the capability of the land and retain the rural character and amenity of the locality;
- c) To retain farming land in large landholdings, to support primary production and prevent the creation of additional lots;

The recently Council Adopted Shire of Brookton & Beverley Local Planning Strategy in Section 10.3 proposes as follows:

General Agricultural Subdivision

Strategy

The Council's strategy is to:

Support rural land being retained for primary production and highlight there is a general presumption against the subdivision of land designated General Agriculture, to create additional lots...

Homestead Lots

Strategy

The Council's strategy is to not support Homestead Lots, through the creation of additional titles, given the population in the municipality is growing and is expected to continue to grow in the Strategy period.

WAPC Development Control Policy 3.4 – Subdivision of Rural Land – March 2012, states as follows:

'6.6 Homestead Lots

The creation of Homestead Lots is intended to allow primary producers to continue to occupy their dwelling when they cease to farm, and provide settlement opportunities in areas where land fragmentation is limited and unlikely to increase. Homestead Lots are to be created in a manner that is consistent with the rural character and landscape of a locality. Homestead Lots may be facilitated through boundary rationalisation or the creation of a new lot.

Homestead Lots may therefore be created to enable an approved existing house on a rural lot to continue to be occupied provided that:

- a) the land is in the DC 3.4 Homestead lot policy area;
- the homestead Lot has an area between one and four hectares, or up to 20 hectares to respond to the landform and include features such as existing outbuildings, services or water sources;
- there is an adequate water supply for domestic, land management and fire management purposes;
- d) the dwelling is connected to a reticulated electricity supply or an acceptable alternative is demonstrated;
- e) the Homestead Lot has access to a constructed public road;
- f) the Homestead Lot contains an existing residence that can acheive an appropriate buffer from adjoining rural land uses;
- g) a Homestead Lot has not been excised from the farm in the past;
- h) the balance lot is suitable for the continuation of the rural land use, and generally consistent with prevailing lot sizes, where it can be shown that this is consistent with the current farming practices at the property; and
- i) the dwelling on a Homestead Lot must be of a habitable standard and may be required to be certified as habitable by the local government.'

In the opinion of staff the proposal can be regarded as consistent with the aims of the TPS 2, Clause 3.5 which objectives require the protection of agricultural land for primary production and to preserve the landscape and character of the rural areas. The proposal is also regarded as consistent with the requirements of *Development Control Policy 3.4 – Subdivision of Rural Land* (in so far as it relates specifically to Homestead Lots, as quoted above).

The proposal is at present inconsistent with the Shire of Beverley Local Planning Strategy (LPS) which states that Council's strategy is to 'not support homestead lots, through the creation of additional titles, given the population in the municipality is growing and is expected to continue to grow in the Strategy period.'

Irrespective of the inconsistency with the Shire's Local Planning Strategy it is submitted that the State's Development Control Policy 3.4 as quoted above, should prevail, also for the sake of consistency with previous decisions of Council in this regard.

CONSULTATION

No consultation was deemed required for this application.

Subdivision is determined by the Western Australian Planning Commission in compliance with state policies and the Shire of Beverley's planning framework. Council's recommendation is considered when determining the application.



SUMMARY

A request has been received to compensate a land owner for portions of land that is being used as a public road. It will be recommended that the relevant land portions be formally dedicated as Road, and the land owner be appropriately compensated.

BACKGROUND

The subject land is located on Lennard Road as shown on the attached maps. The relevant land portions to be compensated for and dedicated as Road measures 279 m² & 6803 m², totalling 7082 m².

As part of the investigation for compensation Shire Planner requested a Valuation Report from the District Valuer through the Office of Landgate. As per specific request and disclaimers from Landgate, the detailed information of the Valuation Report is treated as *Commercial in Confidence* and therefore not attached to this report.

As part of the above process it will be recommended that the relevant portions of land be dedicated as road in terms of Section 56 of the Land Administration Act, to affirm and formalize the existing situation.

COMMENT

The subject portions of land had been used as part of the physical road alignment of Lennard Road for a number of years. Subsequent to a survey performed by the applicant's surveyor, after approval had been granted for a subdivision, the subject land had been exposed as being part of Lennard road.

The recommendations of this report will aim to address these discrepancies, formalize the road dedication, and compensate for resumption of land for road widening purposes.

CONSULTATION

Consultation was had with the District Valuer through Landgate.





SUMMARY

An application for planning approval for the establishment of kennels (boarding & training facility) on 2369 (Lot 15) York-Williams Road, Dale had been received. The application will be recommended for approval.

BACKGROUND

It is proposed to construct a kennel facility (boarding & training) on 2369 (Lot 150) York Williams Road. The subject site is approximately 46 ha in area, zoned 'Farming' and contains an existing house and outbuildings.

The Development Proposal:

Applicants submitted documentation (please refer to the relevant attachments), proposing to establish the following:

- Conversion of an existing shed structure into a kennel (in extent 15m x 7m) to house applicant's own personal dogs:
- The addition of a concrete sloped floor with drainage channels into a septic tank and leach drain to enable containment of all urine;
- Solid wastes to be collected 3 times per day;
- Area to be pressure washed and disinfected regularly;
- Implementation of a sprinkler system on timers to avoid overheating in hot summer months;
- Installation of solar vents to improve air flow;
- Wall cladding to be added to three sides of the building to screen dogs from both the house & the road;
- Kennel partitioning to divide the area into 5m x 3m bays. The sleeping areas would have solid coolroom panels built, to provide sound proofing and reduce heat and cold fluctuations for each bay. These would be to a height of 1.8m x 2.4 wide. The remaining partitioning would utilize pool fencing 1200mm high;
- The open frontage of the kennel would be facing north towards the natural slope of the land in order to provide a natural sound barrier, and reduce the stresses on the dogs as they face away from the road.

New Kennel Structures, in two stages:

- Each stage consisting of 12 x kennel enclosures/structures measuring 27m x
 7.5m each as depicted on the enclosed plans;
- Drainage from kennels designed to channel effluent into a septic tank and leach drain to enable containment of all urine;
- Solid wastes to be collected 3 times per day;
- Area to be pressure washed and disinfected regularly;
- Implementation of a sprinkler system on timers to avoid overheating in hot summer months;

- A fenced-off area (50m x 50m) where agility equipment can be set up and obedience training be performed;
- A double row of olive trees to be planted next to the track, as shown on the plan;
- Screening hedges to be planted to provide natural shelter and noise reduction -2m high dense hedging around kennels;
- Flood Lighting to be installed in time as funds permit;
- Alpaca's to be resident to keep foxes away and protect livestock, which is envisaged to reduce dog barking.

COMMENT

Under the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) the proposed kennel facility is a *use not listed*. Clause 3.2.5 of TPS 2 states that where a land use is not listed Council may:

- a) Determine that the use is not consistent with the objectives and purposes of the particular zone and is therefore not permitted; or
- b) Determine by absolute majority that the proposed use may be consistent with the objectives and purpose of the zone and thereafter follow the advertising procedures of Clause 6.2 in considering an application for planning consent, following which Council may, at its discretion, permit the use.

Given that the proposed use will not preclude agricultural use of the property and will provide a much needed service to the community, it will be recommended Council determine that the proposed use may be consistent with the objectives and purpose of the Farming zone.

Consultation & Advertising

In compliance with Clause 6.2 of TPS 2 the application was advertised for a period of 21 days. A total of 4 submissions were received comprising of 3 objections. A summary of the submissions received and officer's responses are detailed in the table below.

The Department of Water had also been requested to provide comments on the application. At the time of compilation of this report, no comments have been received.



I have been a member on National Obedience Trial and National Retrieving Trial committees as well as the Retrieving Club as Treasurer and regularly trial secretary and chief steward at events.

As an accountant building a sound successful business, I have an appreciation of the need to involve all stakeholders in discussions and the need to provide a diverse range of professional services that support the local community in a respectful manner. Our aim is to do this over a period of time and build and extend our commitment both financially and in time spent on the boarding kennels and training facility and behavioural services.

Proposed Conversion

The existing shed structure measures approximately 15 meters x 7 metres.

- The addition of a concrete sloped floor with drainage channels into a septic tank and leach drain
 arrangement would enable containment of all urine, all solids would be collected three times daily.
 The area would be regularly karchered and disinfected to ensure it is kept clean.
- A sprinkler system would be constructed on timers to avoid overheating in the hot summer months.
- Solar vents would be installed to improve air flow.

- Wall cladding to be added to three sides of the building, screening the dogs from both house and road.
- Kennel partitioning to divide the area into 5 metre x 3 meter bays. The sleeping areas would have solid coolroom panels built, to provide sound proofing and reduce heat and cold fluctuations for each bay. These would be to a height of 1.8m x 2.4 wide. The remaining partitioning would utilise pool fencing 1200mm high. The open frontage of the kennel would be facing north towards the natural slope of the land which too would provide a natural sound barrier, and reduce stresses on the dogs as their sight picture is away from all road activity.

This area would only be used to house our own trained dogs that have been living in similarly constructed kennels for the last few years, never for a boarding dog. Only one dog cannot currently be housed outside in kennels as she is storm phobic and is kept in the house whilst we are not at home.

New Facility STAGE 1 12 KENNULS, STAGE 2 12 KENNELS

Please find attached the designed kennels we believe provide a safe clean stress free environment for housing both our own and boarding dogs. We envisage the facility being far enough away from Perth that it will attract more dogs from the competitive arena, through contacts we have in Perth and the surrounding areas through breeding too than the general public. With our experience we aim to give people a chance to have their dog stay, and it be trained for them. Were lain's behavioural consult services are needed, dogs can be safely housed and assessed at no risk to anyone.

Screening trees will be planted to provide natural shelter and noise reduction, providing 3m high dense hedging around the kennels

We are currently working with a number of Shires in SA and WA and the Professor of Conservation at the University of Adelaide regarding using our dogs to enable counting of remaining species after baiting or culling programs have been completed to see whether the results of the program are an environmental success. Iain is working towards providing 2 dogs for feral cat location in the Pilbara next winter.

As well as day yards and the building, there will be a fenced area that will be mown, where agility equipment can be set up and obedience can be taught.

When finance allows suitable flood lighting will be installed.




Facility Management







Original Plan





Revised Kennel Siting #2

Regulation 13 of the Local Government (Financial Management) Regulations provides that:

- (1) If the local government has delegated to the CEO the exercise of its power to make payments from the municipal fund or the trust fund, a list of accounts paid by the CEO is to be prepared each month showing for each account paid since the last such list was prepared —
 - (a) the payee's name;
 - (b) the amount of the payment;
 - (c) the date of the payment; and
 - (d) sufficient information to identify the transaction.
- (2) A list of accounts for approval to be paid is to be prepared each month showing
- (a) for each account which requires council authorisation in that month
 - (i) the payee's name;
 - (ii) the amount of the payment; and
 - (iii) sufficient information to identify the transaction;

and

(b) the date of the meeting of the Council to which the list is to be presented.

- (3) A list prepared under sub regulation (1) or (2) is to be —
- (a) presented to the Council at the next ordinary meeting of the council after the list is prepared; and
- (b) recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

In summary, it is forecast that a budget surplus of \$254,525 may be realised as at 30 June 2014.

- (3) A council is to consider a review submitted to it and is to determine* whether or not to adopt the review, any parts of the review or any recommendations made in the review.

*Absolute majority required.

(4) Within 30 days after a council has made a determination, a copy of the review and determination is to be provided to the Department.

SUMMARY

Council to consider writing off a portion of accrued interest on Assessment 1127.

BACKGROUND

The process of Debt Collection for our rates has produced a query as to the large amount owing on Assessment 1127. Rate charges on this property at 2 Seabrook Street, Beverley, have been in arrears since before 2005.

The total outstanding balance for Assessment 1127 year to date is \$19,692.66.

COMMENT

The property owner of 2 Seabrook Street, Beverley, became eligible for a Pensioner Rebate on the 29th April 2005. As there were rates in arrears on the property this application was not processed.

A requirement of receiving the rebate is that arrears are to be cleared. The outstanding arrears balance as at 1st July 2005 was \$6,423.72. The owner has been paying money towards their arrears and has now paid off \$6,950.00, effectively clearing the initial arrears amount.

The property is now eligible to be placed on the Pensioner Rebate Scheme and any future outstanding rates will be placed on the deferred payment list. The payments towards the outstanding rates from 2005 to 2012 will continue.

Penalty Interest accrued since the 1st July 2013 totals \$1,262.70. Penalty Interest accrued since the arrears balance of \$6423.72 was reached is \$416.56.

It is the opinion of Staff that the owner is genuinely trying to get the balance of their outstanding rates down.

Section 6.12 of the *Local Government Act 1995* – Power to defer, grant discounts, waive or write off debts, provides that:

- (1) Subject to subsection (2) and any other written law, a local government may
 - (a) when adopting the annual budget, grant* a discount or other incentive for the early payment of any amount of money; or
 - (b) waive or grant concessions in relation to any amount of money; or
 - (c) write off any amount of money, which is owed to the local government.
- * Absolute majority required.

- (2) Subsection (1)(a) and (b) do not apply to an amount of money owing in respect of rates and service charges.
- (3) The grant of a concession under subsection (1)(b) may be subject to any conditions determined by the local government.

BACKGROUND

The Corporate Business Plan forms part of the Shire of Beverley's integrated planning and reporting framework.

The Corporate Business Plan provides a medium term (four year) strategy to achieve:

- 1. Activation of the Strategic Community Plan;
- 2. Operations planning;
- 3. Take into account informing strategies; and
- 4. Local Government review and re-prioritisation.

The Corporate Business Plan has been produced in accordance with the *Local Government Act 1995* and *Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996.*

Darren Long Consulting was employed to assist with the development of the Plan.

The draft Corporate Business Plan 2014-2017 was considered by the Corporate Strategy Committee on 11 February 2014.


At the Corporate Strategy meeting the following resolution was carried:

"That the Corporate Strategy Committee recommend to Council that

- 1. the draft Corporate Business Plan 2014-2017 be adopted;
- 2. the availability of the Corporate Business Plan 2014-17 be advertised locally; and
- 3. a copy of the Corporate Business Plan 2014-17 be forwarded to the Department of Local Government."

COMMENT

The Shire of Beverley Corporate Business Plan 2014-17 covers a 4 year planning cycle and details what services, operations and projects the Council intends to deliver to work towards achieving the community's aspirations captured in the Strategic Community Plan (SCP).



Section 7 (pages 16 to 37) of the Corporate Business Plan breaks down the priorities of the SCP into achievable actions and includes financial cost estimates to achieve these actions.

Some of these costs are not included in the Shire of Beverley's Long Term Financial Plan (LTFP), so if these priorities/actions/costs are deemed suitable, the LTFP will require revising.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Section 5.56 of the *Local Government Act 1995* provides the following in regards to planning for the future:

- (1) A local government is to plan for the future of the district.
- (2) A local government is to ensure that plans made under subsection (1) are in accordance with any regulations made about planning for the future of the district.

Regulation 19DA of the *Local Government (Administration) Regulations 1996* provides that:

- (1) A local government is to ensure that a corporate business plan is made for its district in accordance with this regulation in respect of each financial year after the financial year ending 30 June 2013.
- (2) A corporate business plan for a district is to cover the period specified in the plan, which is to be at least 4 financial years.
- (3) A corporate business plan for a district is to
 - (a) set out, consistently with any relevant priorities set out in the strategic community plan for the district, a local government's priorities for dealing with the objectives and aspirations of the community in the district; and
 - (b) govern a local government's internal business planning by expressing a local government's priorities by reference to operations that are within the capacity of the local government's resources; and
 - (c) develop and integrate matters relating to resources, including asset management, workforce planning and long-term financial planning.
- (4) A local government is to review the current corporate business plan for its district every year.
- (5) A local government may modify a corporate business plan, including extending the period the plan is made in respect of and modifying the plan if required because of modification of the local government's strategic community plan.

- (6) A council is to consider a corporate business plan, or modifications of such a plan, submitted to it and is to determine* whether or not to adopt the plan or the modifications.
 - *Absolute majority required.
- (7) If a corporate business plan is, or modifications of a corporate business plan are, adopted by the council, the plan or modified plan applies to the district for the period specified in the plan.

SUMMARY

The Local Government Act (1995) requires all Western Australian Local Authorities to complete a Compliance Audit Return (CAR) distributed by the Department of Local Government, in relation to activities undertaken by the local authority in the preceding calendar year.

BACKGROUND

In 2006, participation in the program was made compulsory for all local authorities. In 2007, the return for 2006 was required to be completed online. Changes were made in 2009 to the structure of some of the questions to provide more clarity. The CAR is restricted to those areas considered high risk.

COMMENT

At the 11 February 2014 Audit Committee meeting, the following resolution was carried:

"That the Audit Committee recommends that Council adopt the Compliance Audit Return 2013 and authorises the Chief Executive Officer and Shire President to sign and forward the Beverley Compliance Audit Return to the Minister for Local Government."

Council must complete, adopt and forward to the Minister for Local Government a copy of the Compliance Audit Return no later than the 31st March each year. Staff positions and roles continue to change and all staff undertaking new roles within the Shire of Beverley have been made aware of the necessity to meet statutory deadlines and requirements of relevant legislation.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Local Government Act 1995 and Regulation 13 of the Local Government Audit Regulations, Clauses 14 and 15

14. Compliance audit return to be prepared

- (1) A local government is to carry out a compliance audit for the period 1 January to 31 December in each year.
- (2) After carrying out a compliance audit the local government is to prepare a compliance audit return in a form approved by the Minister.

- (3) A compliance audit return is to be
 - (a) presented to the council at a meeting of the council;
 - (b) adopted by the council; and
 - (c) recorded in the minutes of the meeting at which it is adopted.

15. Completion of compliance audit

- (1) After the compliance audit return has been presented to the council in accordance with regulation 14(3) a certified copy of the return together with:
 - (a) a copy of the relevant section of the minutes referred to in regulation14(3)(c) and
 - (b) any additional information explaining or qualifying the compliance audit

is to be submitted to the Executive Director by 31 March next following the period to which the return relates.

(2) In this regulation:

Certified in relation to compliance audit return means signed by:

- (a) the mayor or president; and
- (b) The CEO

SUMMARY

Council to consider entering into a collaboration agreement with the Shires of Brookton and Pingelly to progress Aged Support and Care Solutions.

BACKGROUND

The three Shires have had several joint discussions as part of the development of the Wheatbelt Aged Support and Care Solutions project. This project was conducted by the Wheatbelt Development Commission on a sub-regional basis, with Beverley and Brookton in the SEAVROC sub-region of Councils and Pingelly in the Dryandra sub-region.

The project has produced individual Council needs and gap analysis as well as by sub-region and culminated in the preparation of a whole of Wheatbelt Integrated Aged Care Plan with recommended actions.

COMMENT

The purpose of the three Shires collaborating on this issue, through a Letter of Agreement (attached), is to recognise an alliance formed between the Local Governments to progress sustainable Aged Care Planning, Services and Support within and between our communities.

It is believed that by working together better economies of scale will be achieved and opportunities for new or enhanced services will be easier to attract if there are three Shires lobbying for funding to improve services and infrastructure.

The letter of agreement is a means of formalising the current working groups activities, last meeting notes attached, so that when lobbying opportunities arise we can present a collaborative approach on behalf of our three communities.

Council's representatives on this group have been Councillors Ridgway and Pepper.

SUMMARY

The Wheatbelt Development Commission has coordinated the Wheatbelt Aged Support and Care Solutions Report which was provided by Verso Consulting Pty Ltd. The plan needs to be endorsed by the participating Local Governments and submitted to the Federal and State Governments for consideration and for the Plan to be used for ongoing grant fund applications associated with Aged Care in the Wheatbelt Region.

BACKGROUND

In 2012 the North East Wheatbelt Regional Organisation of Councils and Wheatbelt East Regional Organisation of Councils formed the Central East Aged Care Alliance (CEACA) to undertake a study through Verso Consulting Pty Ltd to determine Aged Care needs in the Central East Wheatbelt and a process of implementation.

The Wheatbelt Aged Support and Care Solution (WASCS) Project involved a partnership between 32 Local Governments, the Wheatbelt Development Commission, Southern Inland Health Initiative and South West Medicare Local.

The aim of the project was the development of tailored solutions and action plans that deliver improved future delivery of Aged Support and Care.

COMMENT

The WASCS project report summarises the outcomes which aimed to develop and implement a holistic regional solution to allow ageing residents to remain in their communities for as long as possible. Four main elements were developed to form part of the solutions:

- Further development of older persons housing;

- Reshaping residential aged care

SUMMARY

Council to receive "The Next Phase" Feasibility Study and undertake a Business Case for the proposed Multipurpose Community Centre.

BACKGROUND

The Beverley Community Resource Centre engaged CCS Strategic to undertake a Needs Analysis and Feasibility Study on the operations of the Resource Centre.

COMMENT

"The Next Phase" Feasibility Study was formally received and endorsed by the Beverley Community Resource Centre Management Committee at their meeting held on 9 December 2013.

Councillors were provided with the final report at the December 2013 Council Meeting.

The study was carried out in collaboration with, the assistance of the Beverley Community Resource Centre Management Committee and staff, the Shire of Beverley and the broader Beverley Community.

Running parallel and independent to this study was a Review of the Western Australian Community Resource Network (May 2013) by the Western Australian Regional Development Trust. Importantly the findings of Trust's review are consistent with the recommendations of this study for the Beverley Community Resource Centre.

Effective Community Resource Centres have been found to be important and make a valuable contribution to the communities they serve. Their need is justified and validated.

The most successful CRCs tend to:

- Be housed in a multifunctional centre
- Enjoy a strong and supportive working relationship with the local government
- Offer a diverse program of events and activities delivered at the centre

- Deliver a variety of government agency services from the centre
- Provide a series of fee for service business services at a market rate.

It was also found that many CRCs, including the Beverley CRC, are very reliant on Department of Regional Development funding through the Royalties for Regions Program. The views expressed by the Trust, and supported by this study, is that CRCs need to deliver greater services to the community with a view to increasing self-sufficiency, although it is not inferred that the CRCs should be totally self-funded.

The challenge for the BCRC in addressing its future accommodation, program and service needs is that it is heavily reliant on the good will of the Shire of Beverley. Given that this is recognised as a means to strengthening the role and function of a CRC within a community, the recommendations of this report seek to embed the operations of the BCRC within the community through an even stronger working relationship with the Shire.

The report recommends the construction of a new multipurpose facility in the Beverley town centre comprising:

- Community Resource Centre
- Public Library
- Tourist Bureau
- Tenantable Office Spaces
- Early childhood centre and playgroup
- Commercial café
- Outdoor courtyard and function space
- Car and caravan parking.

The strategy behind this co-located multipurpose facility is to address:

- The accommodation requirements of the BCRC
- The poor and failing condition of a number of Shire assets
- The need for additional Shire administrative spaces
- Opportunities for the BCRC to expand and enhance its range of services to the community
- Opportunities for the delivery of an enhanced tourist bureau service utilising the skills of the BCRC team.

The redevelopment program outlined in this report is challenging in that it will require:

- Cooperation from a variety of community and government agencies
- Relocation and alternative accommodation arrangements for a variety of community groups

- Capital raising in the vicinity of \$3.5million (including GST)
- Up-skilling and diversification of both the BCRC management committee and management team
- An aggressive approach to operational funding and program development.

In addition to establishing and justifying need for the ongoing operation and growth of the services provided by the Beverley Community Resource Centre, the report provides the following elements:

- Concept plan for the proposed multipurpose community centre
- Capital costs schedule
- Funding strategy
- Procurement and implementation plan
- Operating forecast
- Facility Renewal schedule

The report is commended to the Beverley Community Resource Centre and the Beverley Shire Council for adoption and implementation.

Recommendations from the report are;

- 1. The Beverley CRC refer this report to Council for their consideration and adoption as a guide to the future development of a multipurpose community centre to be developed within the Beverley town centre comprising:
- Community Resource Centre
- Public Library
- Tourist Bureau
- Tenantable Office Spaces
- Early Childhood Centre and Playgroup
- Commercial Cafe
- Outdoor Courtyard and Function Space
- Car and Caravan Parking
- 2. The Beverley CRC work collaboratively with the Shire to identify and secure funds for the proposed development
- 3. That the Beverley CRC enter into negotiations with the Shire to:
- Review the management of the Beverley Tourist Bureau with a view to the future operation being based in the proposed new premises
- Undertake the future operation of the public library from the proposed new premise
- Provide for the provision of archival and record management services to the Shire (and other parties)
- Provide additional administrative services from the proposed centre.

There was one further recommendation that the Beverley CRC enter into negotiations with the Department of Regional Development to:

- Secure capital funding to contribute to the construction of the new multipurpose centre
- Elevate the Beverley CRC classification from level 2 to level 3
- Secure ongoing operational funding and determine how to maximise the Beverley CRC's financial support from the Department
- Identify other government departments that may be amendable and in need of services being delivered to the Beverley community that can be achieved efficiently through contracting the Beverley CRC as provider.

The Beverley CRC Management Committee have advised that they will work with the Shire to identify and secure funding for the proposed development, and can assist with funds for the preparation of a business case and any other plans the Shire considers necessary to secure the grant funding that will be required for the project.

In relation to the Tourist Bureau management I would like to discuss this in more detail with both parties prior to any formal decision being made.

COMMENT

As some of you would know, WALGA, as the representative body for Local Government in Western Australia, has held the position for some time that some structural reform is needed.

Several years ago it commissioned a report titled "The Journey" now commonly referred to as the SSS Report.

Clause 3.3 of The Scope for Change in the SSS Report introduction says:

"The SSS Panel Report was careful to emphasise that there was no demonstrated case that amalgamations of Local Governments will deliver improved outcomes. The forced amalgamation of Local Governments without existing capability and without specific regard to the ability to deliver more sustainable arrangements offers slim prospects of improvement. The extensive work of the five working parties which have generated the Plan has confirmed this conclusion."

In 2009 the then Minister for Local Government John Castrilli MLA announced a policy to reform local government in W.A. There were few guidelines and largely a lack of direction other than to say that there are too many local governments and this should be changed.

Sustainability was used as the focus and little or no regard was given for the valuable contribution that Local Government provides for a community and the social dividend of that.

Councils and staff have invested thousands of hours and millions of dollars to comply with the Minister's regulatory requests to submit business case plans and develop strategies within those plans.

Most, if not all Local Governments fulfilled these obligations in writing direct to the Minister through the Department of Local Government.

Since then the State Government has shifted its reform focus away from the country areas towards the metropolitan area. There are concerns however, that whatever happens in the metropolitan area will be repeated in the country.

The State Government has no mandate or ethical position to accuse Local Government of being poor managers of assets and finances.

Successive State Government's, have neglected to maintain essential infrastructure such as Tier 3 railways, roads, hospitals, electricity supply grids, water supplies throughout WA. Local Governments and their communities are adversely impacted by that.

In fact there is considerable pressure on Local Governments to increase the range of services that they deliver and also to manage this within already tight budgets. Cost shifting by both State and Federal Governments has been a large part of that. Rural local governments are increasingly having to fund medical services as well as provide housing for police, teachers and doctors. There has been a steady withdrawal of state services and decline in the standards of infrastructure.

If the State and Federal governments were to resume funding tasks that are not the core function of Local Government, then the relief to the Local Government budgets would, in most cases rejuvenate their sustainability.
