Riders tribute to 120 years of bike riding.



Following in the footsteps of WA's oldest cycling race the "Beverley Heroic" paid tribute to the 120 year history on Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 October 2017.

Over 600 rider's, friends and family visited Beverley and got involved.

Saturday's 114km Road Race through beautiful state forest challenged with its uphill ride to the turn around. But a fantastic downhill race set the fastest time of 2:36:16 by Logan Calder. Competitor numbers doubled from last year's race. Being a handicap in the style of 1897 the over the line winner was Roger Blow.

A balmy evening at the Beverley Lawn Tennis Club made a great viewing platform for the Cyclocross. Cyclocross or CX is like mountain biking over sand and gravel, on a 1km circuit. Local children rode and their smiles were as big as the adults. This is destined to be a favourite with its simple fun format.

For the bike lovers the Retro Bike Show filled the Town Hall with over 25 bikes. Our oldest a 1947 Malvern Star was a delight. The beautiful craftsmanship of many others shined all afternoon. The people's choice winner was Tony Cooper's green Cinelli. Everybody was impressed with its beautiful paint work and simplicity from another time.

Inside our printed program was the Beverley Heroic Town Ride. A chance to explore and draw Beverley by bike. Sunday morning a gang of people took to the streets looking for clues, sketching and colouring their way around town.

It was a different world back at the turn of the last century. So in tribute the 130 Sunday morning riders took to the 50 or 100 mile route over bitumen and gravel. Thankyou to all candidates who nominated in the Beverley Local Government elections. There was sound interest, both from the candidates contesting the election and from the almost 30% of residents and rate-payers who participated by voting. Whilst Peter McKenna, Bill Thompson, Shane Negus and former Councillor Tom Buckland were unsuccessful in the election, their preparedness to make themselves available to represent our community is appreciated.

Thankyou also goes to former Councillors Jim Alexander and Keith "Jundy" Murray. Jim did not re-nominate for the election after having been a Shire Councillor for 12 years 2005 - 2017, including Shire President 2007 – 2009; Jundy resigned mid-term after serving as a Shire Councillor for 10 years 2007 – 2017, including as a very supportive Deputy Shire President 2015 -2017.

CEO Contract Extension

Council is pleased to announce that contract negotiations with current Chief Executive Officer Stephen Gollan have been finalised to secure his services with the Shire of Beverley for a further three years commencing January 2018.

2016/2017 Annual Report and 2017 Annual Electors Meeting

The 2016/2017 Annual Report has been approved by Council and is now publicly available. The Annual Electors Meeting to receive the report will be held on Wednesday 15th November commencing 6pm at the Lessor hall.

Cornerstone

Whilst work has been underway on the corner of Vincent and Dawson streets to clear the site and install a retaining wall in readiness for construction of the Beverley Cornerstone there are many of us in the community who would have had some sadness at seeing the old buildings removed. The demolished buildings are to be recognized within the new universally accessible centre, where a range of facilities and services will be available for current and future community, business, visitors and tourists; in a building with contemporary art deco external features.

Silver Centenary and Aeronautical History

Interpretative panels are being developed for installation in the Vampire shelter on Hunt road which will recognise aeronautical history in the region. A model replica of the Silver Centenary is currently being built by Deiter Prussner for display in the new Cornerstone Museum and Visitor Centre. Deiter has provided regular updates to Council and it is interesting to see the detail of this project.

Roadworks

Bituminizing is due to commence on sections of Westdale road and Mawson road. Nicholas street (rubbish tip) the gravel section will be the next road to be sealed.

Water Re-use

The waste water re-use system is now operational. The water is mixed with water from the dam before it is used on the oval and is regularly checked as required by the Department of Health.

This year's Beverley Heroic proved to be another great weekend in Beverley with many visitors and cycling enthusiasts enjoying a wide range of cycling activity which included "The Beverley Road Race", cyclocross racing, The Heroic and Brevet Populaire, town heritage ride and an interesting display of bikes and cycling history. Several locals participated in the various activities over the weekend including Nigel Bailey who raced in the road race on Saturday and then rode the Heroic 100 miles on Sunday and Dean Aynsley who raced the cyclocross on Saturday and then completed the Heroic on Sunday. The cyclocross was introduced to the weekend activities for the first time this year. It was located near the tennis club and proved very popular with spectators.

Vincent Street Banner Poles

Beverley water supply improvements – progress update

Water Corporation is currently undertaking water supply improvements in the Shire of Beverley. This work includes the construction of a four million litre water storage tank and 3.9 kilometres of water supply main to connect this tank to the town's water supply scheme.

In October, we completed construction of the concrete walls of the tank. In November, construction of the tank roof, and supporting columns and beams will commence.

Vincent St has been reinstated following construction of the new town water supply main and traffic management is no longer in place. Water pipeline works in Sewell St and Hutchinson St will proceed in the coming months.

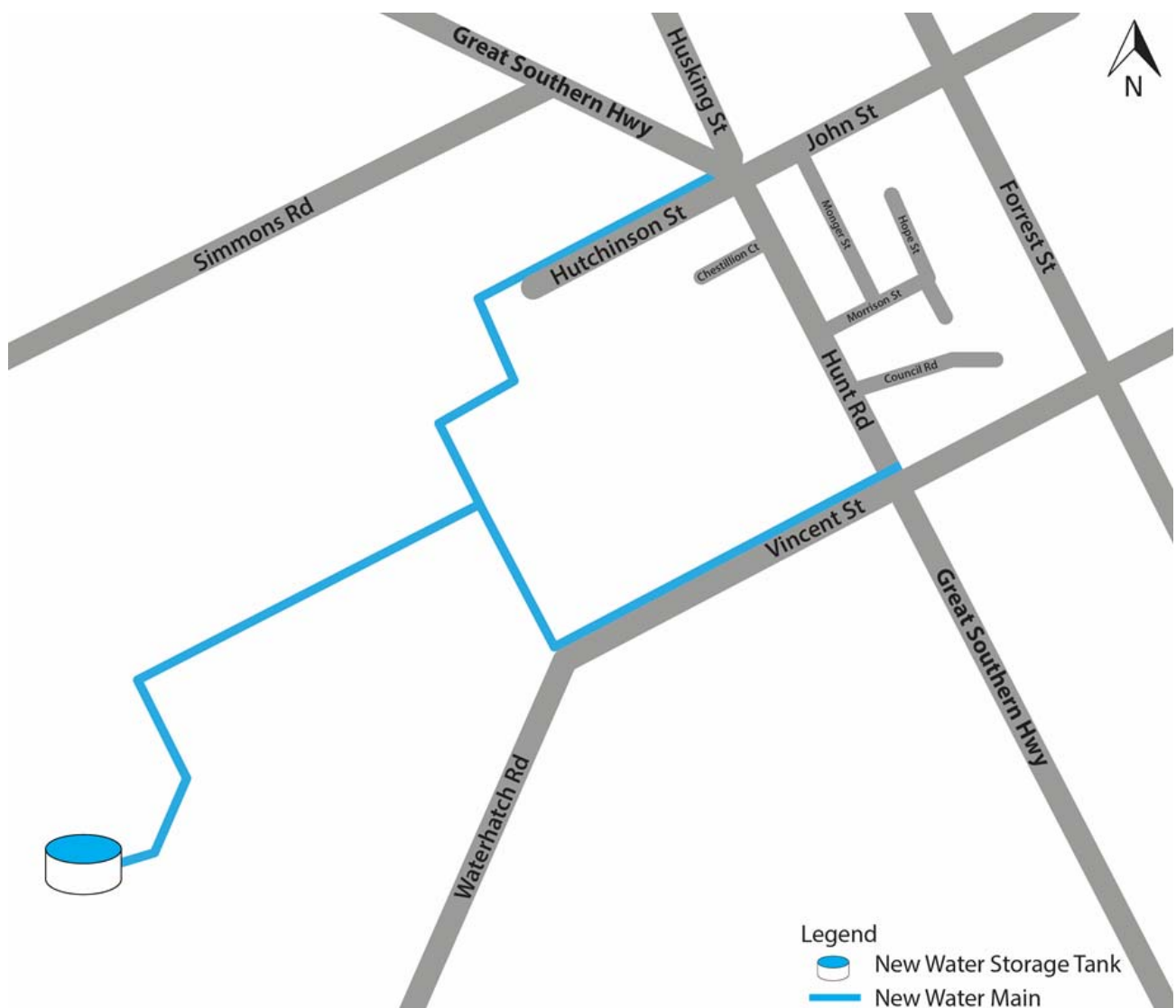
We are just over half way through this project and are still on track to have the overall project completed in June 2018.

FIRE CONTROL NOTICE

Prohibited Burning begins midnight 14 November until the 14 February 2018 (unless extended).
No fires are allowed during this period.

Firebreaks cleared of all inflammable materials need to be installed by 01 November and maintained until 15 April 2018.

All rural properties equal to or less than 100 hectares in size are required to have constructed and maintained a 2.2 metre firebreak clear of all flammable material along all external boundaries or provision on the property of an operational independent mobile water filled fire-fighting unit with a water capacity of not less than 600 litres to be at the ready throughout the Prohibited and Restricted burning period.

Note: An exemption applies when the small landholding is managed by a neighbouring / adjoining landholder for agricultural purposes and this information is to be provided to the Shire in writing by the landowner

Putting safety first in bushfire season

For communities supplied by powerlines that travel through high and extreme bushfire risk zones



We all love summer but high temperatures and low rainfall can lead to conditions where fires are easily ignited, spread quickly and are difficult to control.

Your electricity supply is fed by powerlines that travel through areas susceptible to bushfire and our safety commitment to you, your community, our crews, the environment and our network means we need to do things a little differently during bushfire season.

These changes may result in more outages and due to limitations on our response when bushfire weather escalates, it may take longer to restore your power.

To minimise the impact on you, we take a number of steps before the bushfire season starts to help keep the network running safely.

How we prepare for bushfire season

We make a big investment every year to prepare our network for bushfire season. To help prioritise our prevention, maintenance and emergency activities at this time of year, we have classified our maintenance zones according to their bushfire risk, ranging from low and moderate to high and extreme.

As bushfire season approaches, our attention is most heavily focused on high and extreme bushfire risk maintenance zones. The powerlines that supply your electricity travel through at least one of these zones.

Some activities we undertake to reduce the potential for bushfire ignition include:

- clearing naturally occurring plants and trees away from poles and powerlines
- ongoing inspection and maintenance programs for powerlines, poles and equipment
- coating insulators with protective silicone
- operating the network more conservatively when the risk of bushfire is greatest
- training our crews in fire precautions for fieldwork in areas prone to bushfires

Why outages happen more often and take longer to resolve during bushfire season

As part of our commitment to safety and reducing bushfire risk, we modify settings that monitor the electricity network to make them more sensitive during bushfire season. These changes have the greatest impact on customers in regional communities where electricity is supplied by powerlines that travel through high and extreme bushfire risk areas, often over long distances.

Most faults on the Western Power network are temporary, a bird or falling branch strikes a powerline for example, and although it affects the network momentarily there is often no permanent damage. However, about 30 per cent of faults are more significant and supply is interrupted until the cause can be found and addressed.

Our electricity network is designed with equipment to automatically detect and isolate these faults. Even though attempting to re-energise the network may create a spark, in normal conditions the risk of starting a fire in doing so is very low.

When there is a fault or other interference in bushfire season, the more sensitive settings ensure that power is interrupted faster than usual and the power will remain off instead of being automatically restored. This reduces the likelihood of starting a fire but results in more frequent outages.

For everyone's safety, we continue to operate more cautiously as bushfire weather escalates.

On a Fire Weather Day, we won't turn power back on after an outage without carefully considering any risks.



Fallen branches often cause temporary faults on powerlines

This includes not allowing the network to automatically attempt to turn the power back on until we have sent a crew to patrol the powerline and find the cause of the fault. Some regional powerlines are hundreds of kilometres long, so this can take some time.

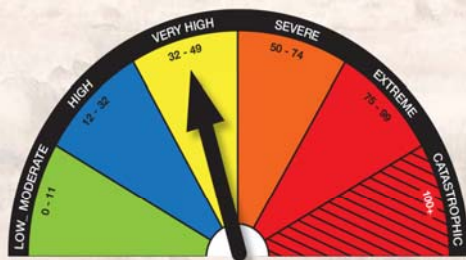
Our restoration practices to find and address the cause of outages are further restricted when Total Fire Bans and Vehicle Movement Bans are declared. In these circumstances, we usually have to wait for bushfire risk conditions to ease or the bans to be lifted before we can patrol the powerline or attempt to restore power. This means you may be without power for an extended period of time, possibly until late in the evening.

Escalating bushfire weather conditions

Fire Danger Index

The Fire Danger Index is the scale used to measure the severity of bushfire threat. A Fire Danger Rating is based on forecast weather conditions and advises the level of bushfire threat on a particular day. As the rating increases, the threat of a bushfire increases. Fire Weather Day

A Fire Weather Day is a Western Power designation when the Fire Danger Index is forecast to be 32 or greater. If a fire starts or takes hold when the threat of a bushfire becomes Very High, it may be hard for firefighters to control. On Fire Weather Days we take additional precautions to minimise the risk of our activities generating a spark which could potentially start a fire that might be difficult to control.

A Fire Weather Day is different to a Fire Weather Warning issued by the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) when the Fire Danger Rating for an area is forecast to be Severe, Extreme or Catastrophic (a Fire Danger Index of 50 or higher).

How you can help

When trees and branches come into contact with powerlines they can cause outages and even bushfires. Please keep trees on your property clear of powerlines all year round. For more information visit westernpower.com.au/treesafety

Information from the community helps us maintain a safe and reliable electricity network for everyone and can also help us to find faults faster. So if you see a fallen or damaged powerline, stay clear and **make the safe call on 13 13 51**.

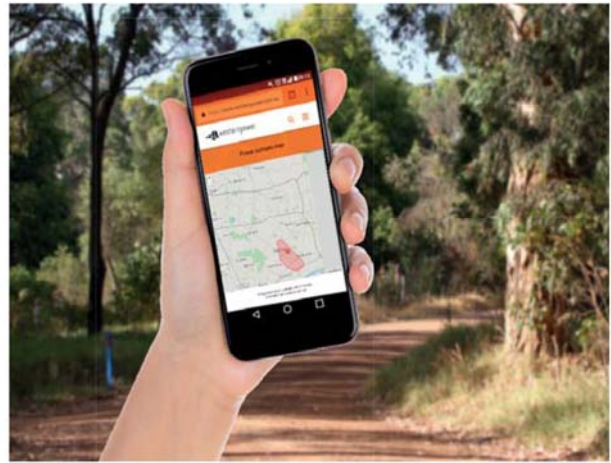
And if you do experience a power interruption during bushfire season, particularly when there is a Fire Weather Warning and Total Fire Ban in place anywhere along your powerline, please be patient. We will work as quickly as conditions allow to assess the issue, make any necessary patrols and repairs and restore power as soon as it is safe to do so.

What we can do to help

We understand long, unexpected power outages can be really inconvenient. If you are affected by an outage lasting 12 continuous hours or more, you may be eligible for an \$80 payment under the State Government's extended outage payment scheme. If you experience more extensive loss or damage that you believe has arisen from incorrect action by Western Power, or inappropriate operation of our equipment, you may be entitled to additional compensation.

Total Fire Ban

A Total Fire Ban is declared on days when fires are most likely to threaten lives and property. In Western Australia, Total Fire Bans are declared by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services following consultation with local governments based on a range of criteria including forecast weather provided by BOM, bushfire activity and availability of emergency resources.

In addition to prohibiting lighting any fires in the open air, a Total Fire Ban also extends to any other activities that may start a fire. It is generally issued from midnight to midnight but may be revoked if the forecast weather does not eventuate or if weather conditions ease.

Vehicle Movement Ban

Vehicle Movement Bans are issued by local governments and place an even stronger restriction on Western Power's activities. Local governments will impose the ban when their Bushfire Control Officer is concerned that the use of engines, vehicles, plant or machinery (including mobile generators) is likely to cause a fire or contribute to the spread of a bushfire. Vehicle Movement Bans may be imposed for any length of time but are generally imposed for the 'heat of the day' and may be extended or revoked by the local government should weather conditions change. A Total Fire Ban may be in place at the same time as a Vehicle Movement Ban but not necessarily.

How you can prepare



Despite our bushfire readiness efforts, due to practical limitations as bushfire weather escalates you may still lose power for extended periods of time during bushfire season. Without power, you may not be able to operate cordless phones, automatic doors, water pumps and other electrical devices so it is important to have a backup plan.

Ways to stay aware and prepare:

- ✓ If you care for someone who is sick or elderly, operate a business or you rely on electrical pumps for water, we recommend you maintain your own emergency electricity and water supply.
- ✓ If you have a generator, keep it fuelled and ready to operate.
- ✓ If you have automatic garage doors or gates, learn how to operate them manually before an outage occurs.
- ✓ Keep your mobile phone and other important devices charged up. Remember, you can recharge many devices in your car.
- ✓ Keep a torch and radio in an accessible place and have spare batteries on hand.
- ✓ If you don't have a surge protector, during an outage unplug sensitive appliances such as computers, TVs and sound systems to protect them when power is restored.
- ✓ Stay informed by checking for Fire Danger Ratings, Fire Weather Warnings and Total Fire Bans at dfes.wa.gov.au
- ✓ If you see a fallen powerline, stay clear and make the safe call to Western Power's 24/7 emergency line on 13 13 51.

Messages for volunteer fire fighters and fire brigades



What to do in an emergency...

When a bushfire event starts and before you hook into the water supply system, **call us on 13 13 75** (24 hours a day/7 days a week).

If we know where your crews are headed, we might be able to provide you with a better location where you can maintain pressure for longer OR we might be able to do something to our water supply system which will mean that we can keep it running for a fraction longer.

HOWEVER, there is no guarantee that we can prolong supply or pressure, and experience has shown that once the town is threatened and there is mass demand, the supply will lose pressure and may empty.

Hydrants

Location – if you are unsure where your hydrants are located, please contact DFES or our Operations Centre on 13 13 75 who will provide you with the exact geographical locations.

Testing - If you intend to test hydrants in your area, please let us know first. Often a side-effect of using the hydrants is that nearby residences receive discoloured water.

If we're aware of the exercise beforehand, we can ensure our operators are prepared and ready to respond to any complaints.

Broken hydrants

Please note – any issues with hydrants should be reported up through DFES.

DFES will contact Water Corporation and a work order will be actioned immediately.

Reminder to residents in your Shire

Help us spread the word to people that they cannot rely on mains water in a bush fire when other critical infrastructure such as power has been damaged.

Help us spread the message that could save lives this bushfire season



You **SHOULD NOT** rely on scheme water during a bushfire

Residents living in or near bushland are reminded not to rely on public water supplies if they plan to stay and defend their homes during a bushfire.

If you plan to stay and defend your home you must have an INDEPENDENT water supply and pumping capability. Scheme water may not be available due to damaged infrastructure, extreme demand depleting supply and pressure, or a cut to power which is used to pump water.

We have made our own preparations for the 2017-18 bushfire season by readying equipment and systems to cope with extreme conditions. Despite these efforts, it is likely there will be a reduction in water pressure, and scheme water supply tanks may run empty in the event of fire.

St John Ambulance WA has released a new, free smart phone app, **First Responder**. The St John First Responder app has a range of features, one being its unique first responder capability. The app allows qualified first aiders to sign up as a first responder and be notified when someone has called 000 for an ambulance within 500 metres of their current location and in a public place. If you’re not looking to sign up as a first responder yet, then that’s okay! The app also contains a number of other resources, including:



- **First aid instruction guides** – helping you to treat a range of injuries and illnesses.
- **Triple zero (000) calling with automatic GPS location** – calling 000 from the app will send your GPS coordinates direct to the St John State Operation Centre, making it easier for an ambulance to locate you.
- **Defibrillator (AED) locator** - showing all the defibrillator locations near you.
- **Upload the location of new defibrillator (AED) locations** that aren't currently appearing on the app.
- **Locate nearest medical centres and emergency departments** - including live ED waiting time information.
- **Patient transport services information.**
- **Your first aid course information** and refresher reminder notices
- **First aid tips and special offers** - keeping you up to date with handy first aid information.

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BEVERLEY NATURALISTS CLUB

Beverley Naturalists Club was formed after a meeting with the Roadside Conservation Committee and we all decided to do roadside vegetation surveys which were done by our members over several months and we discovered some truly spectacular roadside vegetation. Part of the aims of our club was to have these roadsides recognised and identified as flora roads. This is a project we will be looking at for the future. In 2005 the Roadside Vegetation Committee came up with this document based on the information we had collected. This was presented to council in 2005.

We have been doing some plantings of ground covers and small shrubs in Brooking Street Reserve to stabilise the banks along the fire break where our buffer zone burn was done.

It is so interesting to see the amount of orchids that are in this reserve. We have had the best season for many years. We have had many visitors to Brooking Street since the interview on the radio. One day there were 7 car loads of tourists that had come to see our orchids. They were very impressed and vowed to return. The other positive thing is that we have given easier access to the mature aged people and some people with disabilities. We never realised until some people from the community rang and thanked me for making it easier for them to see the orchids. Although the orchid season is nearly over there is still things to see in there.

On a negative note I would like to mention that the dumping of rubbish is illegal and anyone caught dumping rubbish in Brooking Street Reserve risks prosecution. We have spent many months cleaning things up and reducing the fire risk and it was so disappointing to find that someone had dumped a trailer load of green waste which had the potential to introduce a weed burden and also increased the fire risk in there. I had to remove it and take it to the tip where it should have gone in the first place.

2017 President`s Report.

To AGM held on Monday 09 October 2017

2017 has indeed been a very busy year for our Society and I sincerely thank all of our members and community supporters for your wonderful efforts in so many ways throughout the year. We are a small but enthusiastic group and would love to see some more people join us as there is always lots to do.

We finished 2016 with a lovely Christmas Party at the Historic Greenhills Inn in December.

We are kept on our toes with many requests each month for historical information on people, places and buildings in Beverley. Morag Whitney is our major researcher along with the wonderful knowledge and assistance of Maree, Delys, Joy and other members. Thank you all for your efforts in replying to the many requests we receive.

I am pleased to report that the restored Printing Press is now located in the Museum gardens (pictured on the right) and has some protection from the elements. Thanks to Ken Sherwood, The Men`s shed and Richard Smith with this project. We look forward to it becoming part of the planned Heritage walk in the Beverley townsite.



In December I nominated Morag in the WA Heritage Awards in the volunteer category and we were very excited that she was named a most worthy finalist. Morag had stiff competition at the final awards ceremony in Perth in May and was not the winner – but she was in our eyes. Congratulations Morag and thank you so much for your ongoing work on WWI information, The Beverley Cycle Race and many other topics. I also thank you for your other contributions throughout the year (For drawing up an induction/information sheet for new members, Blarney reports, opening the Museum on Saturdays, yr 2 visit, and for filling in for our secretary in recent months).

In March, Joy and I were involved in the Shires Interpretation meeting to develop Heritage trails in Beverley. In July we were invited & five members offered to help the Shire review the Heritage Inventory of Beverley. We have started the process with a tour of sites and buildings. This will continue into 2018 as it is a comprehensive document.

We have been able to open the Museum from March to November on Sundays and many Saturdays, and of course `at the drop of a hat ` for those who call us. I sincerely thank everyone who has manned the Museum this year. We have had a steady stream of weekend visitors plus Elite Tours, the Year 2 group and the Toodyay Trac Mac Group. (Over 200 Visitors) The Year 2 class from Beverley school always enjoy their `Olden Days ` experiences of washing day, dressing up, cleaning the silver, being in an old classroom and of course receiving a special Australian penny each – thanks to Ted and Sheila Sheehan.



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We are receiving requests from new home owners in town for history of their new purchase – so Joy Smith is now working on the Houses of Beverley project and looks forward to any input. As a follow on we are compiling a list of Beverley’s builders throughout our history and once again welcome the public’s help.

In May we had a wonderful meeting with Heather Mclean and her sister Ailsa Scott about life at the Dead Finish as their family were the last residents in the building. (Blarney report) It was pleasing that members of the Public joined in and contributed their memories of this time and of people who had resided at the Inn over the years.

In 2017 we have supported the efforts of other groups e.g. the National Trusts to restore the Houses at Avondale Research Station, the Beverley Shires application for grants for Heritage trails and interpretation, the writing of the new Be Very You Tourist booklet, FESA history of flooding in Beverley, the Beverley Agricultural Societies research of their history for the Show, The Singh family research in WA with wonderful photos we have of a bearded/turbaned Mr Singh in a covered wagon. He was a hawker in this region in the 1930’s and 40’s, and the restoration of the Gilgering Cemetery. We were represented at the Wheatbelt Chapter of WA Museums this year in Toodyay and look forward to hosting this at Beverley in 2018.

We really appreciate people donating items to the museum and this year we were excited to read a diary history of East Beverley around 1918, various artefacts of Muriel Carr, a family history book from Roma Kilpatrick, an amazing old wooden spade found at Boyadine and a WW1 diary and prayer book that belonged to a Mr W Faull to name a few. Unfortunately we sometimes decide not to accept items that repeat what we already have or we can’t safely house so we hope that the public understands this.

Some Beverley residents are upset at the loss of the Vampire Jet and Aeronautical Museum – however our research reveals that the only history Beverley has in this area is that of the Silver Centenary Bi-plane which Selby Ford constructed and flew from here. It is now with his great grandsons- but we understand it will be acknowledged in the new Cornerstone Building Project. I think it fitting that the Shire has been able to re-locate the Vampire Jet (a Beverley landmark) at the entrance to the airport.

I commend the Beverley RSL for their staging of an exhibition on the Centenary of the RSL in Australia this year.

We thank the Garden and Tree society and members for their wonderful ongoing maintenance and plantings in our Museum garden throughout the year.

I thank Glenys Petchell who reports for the Blarney, helps with archiving and has taken on organising our 40th Anniversary celebrations to be held in a few weeks. Thank you to Joy Smith for her support as Vice President and group visits, to Sue Martin for her work as secretary this year, we are sorry you aren’t able to continue in this role but hope you are able to support us in other ways in the future. Thank you to Erica Murray our ever reliable treasurer. And a big thankyou to Bill Whitney for auditing our accounts once again.

And last – but certainly not least - I sincerely thank all our member ‘fairies’ who look after this museum in so many ways. The Shire and community should be very grateful for your ongoing love and care of our districts heritage.

We have a fairly full ongoing ‘to do list’ so I hope we are able to get onto much of this in 2018.

Warrior Wellbeing Article Movember – Understanding Our Prostate

Back in 2003 a couple of mates in Melbourne discussing fashion and recurring trends joked about bringing back the Mo, they talked a few mates into joining them and chose the month of November renaming it “Movember”.

Today it has become a global movement participated in by 21 different countries, has raised \$770 million and funded 1,200 men’s health projects since 2003. This movement is motivated by reducing premature deaths in men and is making a significant contribution to **“changing the face of men’s health”**.

The 3 main areas of focus/awareness of the Movember movement are: **Prostate Cancer; Testicular Cancer; Mental Health and Suicide Prevention**. While we cannot cover all these topics in the required detail in just one article, we have chosen to focus on the Prostate, as we believe before we can address the issue of Prostate cancer, as blokes we must first understand a bit about our Prostate.



While prostate cancer kills around 3000 Aussie men each year there are approx. 2.4 million men living with a prostate problem (mostly due to enlargement).

So what is it? The prostate is an important part of our reproductive system, it is about the size of a walnut (in a young man) and makes the fluid that

protects and feeds the sperm.

This little gland is shaped like a donut and the tube we pee through goes through the centre. The problem is that as part of the ageing process the prostate keeps growing, trebling in size over our life, and as the prostate enlarges it inhibits our ability to urinate.

Most of us know that some older men have trouble emptying their bladder. Sometimes this means getting up often during the night and not being able to do anything when they do, which is a nuisance and embarrassing. Something more serious could be happening such as a blockage, which can cause repeated urinary tract infections or result in bladder or kidney problems, or it could be prostate cancer. Unfortunately, the symptoms of several Prostate conditions are similar.

As men we need to act on any prostate issue that is affecting us. We need to find out if it is part of the natural process of ageing and if you are troubled by urination problems, you should see a doctor (no matter what your age). If your doctor agrees that your symptoms need further evaluation and treatment, you may need to undergo a few tests.

Diet and exercise are important to prostate health, we know that eating 150 grams of nuts a week and incorporating natural red foods, such as beetroot, tomato and watermelon, into our diet helps keep our prostate, and the rest of our body, in good condition.

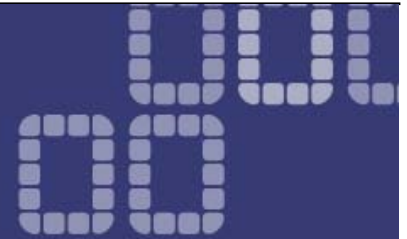

Changes to the Medical Board of Australia

Earlier this month a few minor changes were made to rules surrounding the regulation of Australia's health practitioners.

The changes will give the Medical Board of Australia new emergency powers to suspend doctors — not because they are a threat to patient safety, or could endanger life or cause serious harm — but because the board deems it 'in the public interest'.

With Lyme aware doctors often targeted by Australia's health authorities could this clause 'in the public interest' be yet another avenue for Lyme aware doctors to be singled out by health officials?

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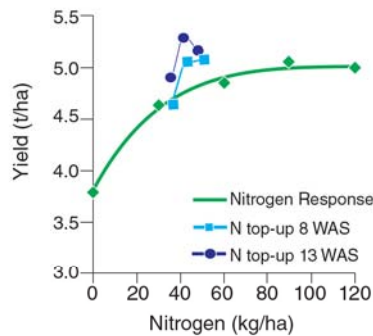

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The Trilogy of Fermentation – Part 8

Fermented foods are easier to digest!

When you ferment vegetables, you turn them into something that's easier for your body to process. In effect, the bacteria start "eating" the vegetables for you, before you even put them in your mouth. The bacteria start the process of breaking down the tough vegetable matter, so that when it lands in your digestive system, your own gut flora will have an easier time of finishing up the digestive process and extracting all of the essential vitamins and minerals. Fermented foods provide you with more of the calcium, vitamin B-complex, phosphorus, and vitamin C in many vegetables. 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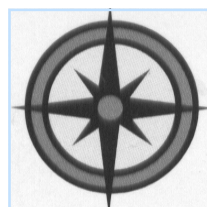
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NBN a 100 Year Project

The NBN is a major project to provide fixed internet to every home in Australia. No it will not take 100 years! It is a once in a 100 years project (like the once in 100 years flood we had earlier this year!).

Why National Broadband Network (NBN)? The existing telecommunications network has been around in Australia since 1879 providing phone services based on extending copper wires from exchanges to people's homes. This network now extends to nearly every home in Australia.

Data services have been grafted on top of the voice network from the 1970's, leading to dial-up internet services in the early 90's. However these services are very slow by today's standards. ADSL was introduced in 2000, again grafted onto the voice network. ADSL data is faster and cheaper than dial-up data, is not everywhere and has reached its technological limits. It cannot be enhanced further. The copper network is now old and dilapidated and requires a lot of expensive maintenance – it has reached the end of its economic life

The ad hoc enhancement of the copper networks and patchy mobile networks left many homes with inadequate or no internet connection. It was therefore decided to invest nationally in a modern data network. The real benefit of the NBN network is that for the first time there is a reliable and cheap internet service available to **every** home in Australia. This is a big benefit to the economy - and country WA!

NBN Services. There are 3 different services depending on where you live:

- **NBN Fibre to the Node (FTTN).** This service is a replacement for ADSL services in cities and larger towns; but much faster and will get even faster in the future. Fibre cables are extended from a central distribution point (usually the existing Telstra exchange) to a cabinet (Node) in the street. The existing telephone

wires are used to connect from the Node to your home.

- **NBN Wireless.** This service is provided in small country towns and on the fringe of towns and cities, outside the range of ADSL/Fibre. Homes will have an antenna on the roof and connect wirelessly to new NBN radio towers. Existing Telstra/Optus/Vodafone mobile towers are not used. This service is faster and cheaper than using existing mobile broadband services.
- **NBN Satellite.** This service is available to every home in Australia that does not have access to NBN Fibre or Wireless. Homes will have satellite dishes installed on the roof. The service is currently about the same speed as ADSL but faster and cheaper than using existing mobile broadband services. This service is currently more expensive than NBN Fibre or Wireless but will get faster and cheaper in the future. Satellites are very expensive to provide! Currently there are 2 satellites located centrally over Australia. A total of 7 are planned.

Can I Choose? NO! NBN decides who gets which service depending on networks provided in your area and the expected usage of the services. To check which service is designated for your home put "NBN address check" in your browser search engine (e.g. Google) or go to <https://www.nbnco.com.au/connect-home-or-business/check-your-address.html>

Notes:

- Not all ADSL connections will be replaced by Fibre, some will be replaced with Wireless or Satellite.
- If Fibre is installed in your area you have 18 months to change over your home to the NBN fibre service - after that the existing ADSL service will be disconnected.
- Although you may be in range for a Wireless connection you may be allocated a Satellite connection. Unlike the existing mobile networks the numbers of users (homes) per radio tower have been limited to maintain service quality and performance.

The closure of many district CBH Receiving Sites, together with the closure of Three Tier Rail Lines, has long been a topic of discussion among grain growers throughout WA.

Twiggy and Gina however can't hold a candle to well known farmer and CBH supporter, Beaneye and his family, they do well to put up with him, owners of McLean Siding Grain Receiving Centre, (see photo) in the district of Beverley, (Centre of the Universe).

Beaneye has built his own Three Tier Rail Line to transport grain from this new modern complex to, who knows where.

The contract to construct the line was awarded to the Beverley Men's Shed Incorporated in the face of fierce competition from both local and overseas companies.

Beaneye, like many rural residents, is extremely concerned at the damage done to our country road system by the transport of grain by road from Regional Grain Receiving Centres at harvest time, previously serviced by Three Tier Rail Lines which have now been closed, as in the case of the line from Quairading to York. If the reader hasn't heard of York, it's the northern suburb of Beverley.

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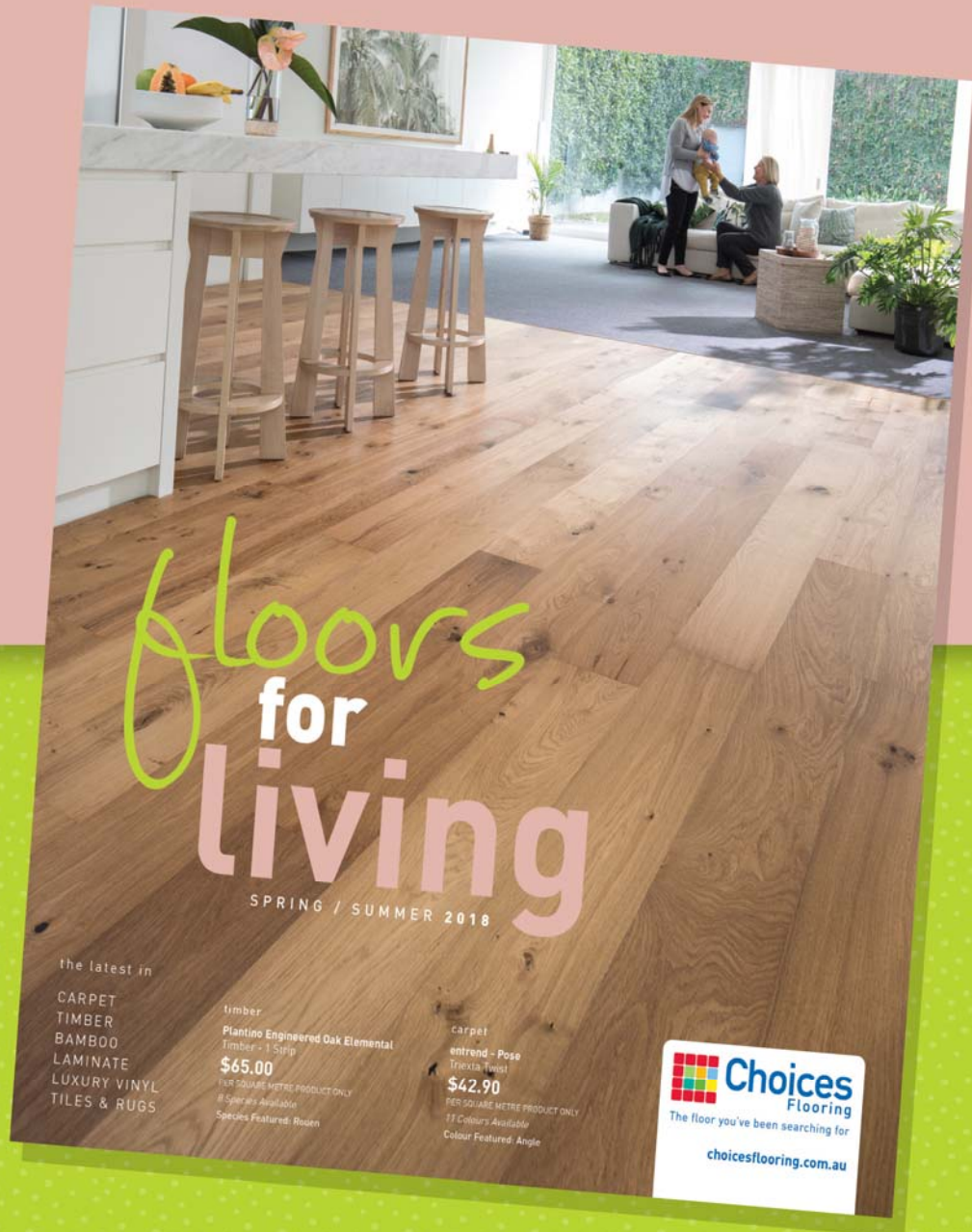
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Hello Everyone,



With Christmas fast approaching our thoughts turn to road policing. While it is very much a shared responsibility to keep everyone safe on our roads, I ask each of you to make the extra effort to remain vigilant on our roads over the Christmas and New Year period. We see a significant increase in vehicles travelling for the holidays and unfortunately, an increase in fatal and serious crashes.

This year the *Road Ribbon for Road Safety* campaign commences on Sunday 19 November 2017 coinciding with the World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims. The campaign urges people to take care on the roads, enables community collaboration and provides everyone with a means to get involved in road safety.

There will be an increased number of vehicle stops by Beverley Police over the December and January period with each driver receiving a Road Safety Ribbon and some important information about road safety and the role you can play. Road users can take responsibility for behaving safely and complying with the road rules by:-

- **Turning off your mobile phone before driving**
- **Adapting your speed for the weather, light, traffic and road conditions**
- **Ensuring you and your passengers are buckled up when travelling in your car**
- **Taking a break, having a rest or if possible swapping drivers to avoid the onset of fatigue**
- **When planning to drink, arrange a skipper, organise public transport or stay overnight.**

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They say actions speak louder than words and with this in mind December will see Beverley Police launch the *Roadwise Community Safe Speed Promise*. The Community Safe Speed Promise works like a treaty between communities; stating ‘we will act as a guest in your community if you act as a guest in ours.’ This is a new way for you and the Beverley community to take control of road safety on our local streets. Resident participation is the cornerstone of the initiative.

The initiative asks residents to sign a Safe Speed Promise and commit to driving within the speed limit and being a courteous driver. When Safe Speed Promise drivers slow down, they reduce the impact of their car use on the communities they drive through and encourage other cars to observe the speed limits. They also reduce their own stress levels, become more connected to the communities they travel through and help create a more relaxed lifestyle which enriches the entire culture of our town. People feel more comfortable walking or cycling, which reduces traffic levels, making streets even safer to walk or cycle.

So watch this space, in the next edition of the Blarney I will let you know where and when you can sign up to take the Safe Speed Promise.

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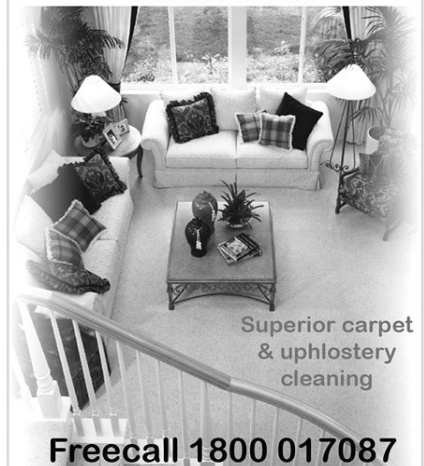
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BEVERLEY FOOTBALL CLUB

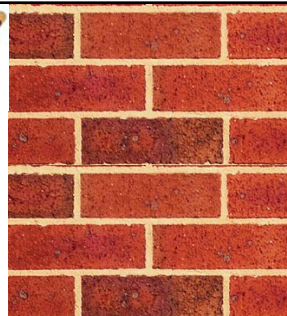
