Avondale Machinery Farm

Council are seeking public comment from the community of the future of the Avondale Farm Machinery Museum. A report and comment form is available from the Shire Office or the Shire website. Public comment will guide Council on whether to keep the Museum, move it or walk away from it. Local Government Elections - October 2021

If you are interested in becoming a Councillor and running in the local elections in October 2021 please do not hesitate to have a chat with a current Councillor. Later in the year the Shire will hold information sessions that will cover training requirements, meeting expectations and legislative requirements. The Shire will also have a tent at the Beverley Show.

Roads

Work has started on the shoulder reconstruction on Morbinning Road between East Lynne Road and Caroling Bally Bally Road. This is in preparation for the widening and sealing of this section next year.

The Shire has 34 bridges which have had their annual inspection, 26 timber and 8 large culverts (box culvert crossings are not classified as bridges). The Kokeby East bridge has had remedial props placed under it and will be further reduced in width until the bridge is eventually replaced. Please slow down and use caution when crossing.

Caravan Park Cabins

The construction of the Beverley Caravan Park cabins is now complete. The internal furnishings are being installed and the road and landscaping is underway. Council are hopeful they will be available for bookings mid-July.

Vincent Street Streetscape Project

There has been a lot of work behind the scenes trying to bring this project to fruition. One of the side-effects COVID stimulus funding and projects has been a natural increase of construction costs as companies are no longer fighting for work. Unfortunately, this has severely hampered our progress. Designs and plans have been reworked to meet our budget. Council are reviewing recent tenders and hope to move forward with the project, but most likely on a smaller scale than originally anticipated.

Spring Back to Beverley 2022

In case you are unaware, a working group of community members along with Shire staff are preparing to celebrate the 150 year anniversaries of the Beverley Road Board and the Dead Finish Museum (the oldest building in Beverley). The weekend event, 24 – 25 September 2022 is called "Spring Back to Beverley" and is now an event on Facebook. If you click 'interested' or 'going' you will be updated as information comes to hand.

A VIETNAM STORY for ANZAC DAY

Mike Collins stared down at the photo that lay there on his desk It was faded, tattered, dog eared, but that made it bother him no less He turned 71 a month ago and time was running out His peace of mind depended on removing any doubt

There were two men in the picture and one of them was him It was taken in the heat of battle in the Mekong Delta, Vietnam Fifty years of searching and he still just had a name Archie Wallace had just vanished, it seemed he'd not be seen again

There was no record of his passing in the files Mike reviewed No note of his expiry in any wartime news That was until this morning, and it happened quite by chance Mike saw the name on his TV screen, it was a momentary glance

He did not catch the story's context or any background to it But the mystery was ar last unlocked, somehow he just knew it His secretary went to work to track the story down It was news from out of Perth, the big business end of town.

Mike had colleagues over there who would know the 'how and why' Was this Archie his man? Was he in trouble? Did he die? He called his friend Al Tennison, a well respected man in law Like Mike he was a Vietnam vet, a survivor of 'that' war.

Al told him that 'this Archie bloke' lives a hermits life alone Out there in the desert on a mining lease he owns "But the corporate mob are challenging.....his lease holds so much gold

Archie's holding on for his grandkids, but he could lose it all I'm told"

"It's true he has a lease but it's validity's in doubt And the corporates are after it, they've brought their big guns out They'll fight it out in court in just a week or two Mike, I'm curious why this matter is of interest to you"

"I'm flying in tomorrow AI, I'd like an hour of your time I know that you are busy, I hope that you don't mind Could you set up a meeting between Archie and my crew? He's a fellow vet mate, we must do what we can do."

Mike now knew for sure that Archie was his man. After fifty years of searching he'd make good on his plans With a meeting set that afternoon Mike and Al put things in place And set the scene for Archie to meet them face to face

Archie walked into the room, confused about the fuss Mike and Al both shook his hand, between veterans total trust Mike took the picture from his wallet, Archie unfolded it and stared Mike said "right to this day, I thank God that you were there"

Both men were emotional , neither knew quite what to say Archie wasn't one to seek the limelight anyway But Mike at last had found him and as karma played it's hand He said to Archie, "let me help you mate, listen to my plan"

Mike then said to Archie, "if it's ok with you I'll invite the TV people in, I'd like to give an interview" "I can do the talking, just sit back and take it in We've been in fights together....and this one we can win"

When the cameras started rolling Mike introduced himself "My name is Michael Collins of Collins, Jess and Phelps We are a firm of lawyers, and although I'm from the East I'll be representing Mr. Wallace re the retention of his lease"

"There will be no fee, not a cent to pay at all Archie is a hero , he went way beyond the call" Mike held up the picture for everyone to see "That soldier there is Archie, the one he's carrying is me"

"He was already wounded when he threw me on his back The battle raged around us, we were under full attack He carried me to safety, a chopper got me back to base Until today I'd not met Archie, I'd never seen his face"

"It was only through this picture that I finally got his name After fifty years of searching I met him here today I owe this man my life, I cannot repay that debt But if the corporates want a fight, it's a bloody fight they'll get!"

"All of our resources will be put to Archie's cause We'll take them on at every turn, we'll use every corner of the law As if Vietnam was not enough, it's time he got respect Let Archie Wallace keep his mine, it's the least he should expect."

That night on the news, it was very plain to see That Archie was a hero, a complete celebrity Mike got an email next afternoon, the corporates saving face Had decided that they'd no longer be pursuing Archie's case

It was sunset there at Scarborough as they enjoyed a beer or three Archie rolled a smoke, the sun dipped into the sea He stretched his legs and put his feet up on a nearby chair He said...".I'll tell ya what I reckon Mick, I think we'll call it square."

The weather is getting colder and the days shorter but there is still plenty of gardening in June.

Vegies to plant in June Asparagus, broad beans, cabbage, celery, artichoke, lettuce, onion, peas, spinach spring onions and strawberries.

Flowers to plant in June Alyssum, calendula, pansy, dianthus, viola, primula, carnation, cornflower, poppy, snapdragon and stock.

June is a great time to attend to the following tasks in the garden:

- $\ensuremath{\boxdot}$ Ensure reticulation is turned off
- ☑ Cut back butterfly bush (Buddleja) to one third it's size to keep if compact
- $\ensuremath{\boxdot}$ Lift and divide clumps of ground covering native violet and replant them in shady areas
- ☑ Give lillypilly and Westringia hedges a light trim to tidy for winter
- ☑ Tidy up and reshape overgrown hibiscus and crepe myrtle. Plan to give them a more serious prune in August
- ☑ Put potted cyclamen outside at night to enjoy the cool air
- ☑ Don't forget to check that your potted plants and gardens under eaves are getting enough water
- $\ensuremath{\overline{\textbf{U}}}$ Once the leaves die down it is time to harvest onions, shallots and garlic
- $\ensuremath{\boxtimes}$ Don't let beets get too big as they are sweeter when small
- $\ensuremath{\boxtimes}$ Harvest spring onions and leeks as you need them as they do not store well
- ☑ Pick peas daily to encourage continuous crops. They are ready when the pods look plump
- ☑ Harvest rhubarb after the plant's first year, taking no more than half the stems. Hold stems near the base and twist
- $\ensuremath{\boxtimes}$ Collect, bag and bin diseased foliage on fruit and veggies to reduce spread

IS YOUR FIREARM LICENCE OVERDUE??

For those of you with firearm licences, it is extremely important to ensure that you have a current licence. A firearm licence is only valid for a year, so you need to make sure you know the expiry date and renew the licence before expiry.

The renewal licence will be forwarded to your last known postal address and it is up to you to ensure that police have the current address for the renewal to be posted to.

If you fail to renew your licence after 3 months of expiry then an infringement will be issued. This is personally served on you by police. The cost of the infringement is \$421.00.

If you fail to pay the infringement then you will be charged by police and have to go to court.

If you have any queries in relation to your firearm then contact Licensing Service on 1300 171 011.

If you want to know your licence expiry date then go online to <u>https://publiclicensingportal.police.wa.gov.au/home</u> and add all your details and it will give you the expiry date.

MOVEMENT OF AGRICULTURAL VEHICLES/IMPLEMENTS

It's that time of year again where there is an increase on the roads of agricultural vehicles and implements. Below is the Agricultural Pilot Requirements flow chart for when you require a pilot vehicle and what is required of a pilot vehicle and oversize vehicle. It is not exhaustive so if you require any more information then Heavy Vehicle Help Desk on 138 486 or visit the Agricultural Vehicles page of our website at <u>www.mainroads.wa.gov.au</u>

PILOT AND ESCORT VEHICLES

- A pilot vehicle must have 4 or more wheels and a GVM of:
- (a)6.5 t or less in the case of a rear pilot vehicle, if 2 pilot vehicles are required; or
- (b)4.5 t or less in any other case.
- A pilot vehicle must have a warning sign on its roof.
- A pilot vehicle must only have an amber flashing warning light:
- (a)above or below the sign; or
- (b)at each side of the sign.
- The headlights or day running lights on a pilot vehicle or escort vehicle must be switched on when it is accompanying an oversize vehicle.
- A pilot vehicle must not tow a trailer or carry a load, but it may carry tools, equipment or substances for use in connection with the oversize vehicle it is accompanying or for restraining the load on that oversize vehicle.
- When one pilot vehicle accompanies an oversize vehicle, the pilot vehicle must travel:
- (a)behind the oversize vehicle, if they are on a road with multiple lanes, in the direction of travel; or
- (b)in front of the oversize vehicle, if they are on a road that is only a single lane, in the direction of travel.
- When 2 pilot vehicles accompany an oversize vehicle, one pilot vehicle must travel in front of the oversize vehicle, and the other behind it.



- A pilot vehicle must travel far enough away from the oversize vehicle it is accompanying to give adequate warning to other road users of the presence of the oversize vehicle, taking into account the type of vehicles that use the road, traffic speed, weather, visibility and other driving conditions.
- An oversize vehicle and any accompanying pilot vehicle or escort vehicle must have an electronic device that allows the drivers to communicate effectively with each other.
- A pilot vehicle that accompanies an oversize vehicle must only be driven by a person who is the holder of a "heavy vehicle pilot licence" and is declared as an "Authorised Person", unless otherwise authorised.
- The driver of a pilot vehicle and the driver of an escort vehicle must inform themselves of the dimensions, warning devices requirements, driver requirements and relevant vehicle operational requirements including conditions of permit, prior to accompanying the oversize vehicle.
- The driver of an oversize vehicle must comply with any lawful direction or signal given by the driver of the lead pilot vehicle or, if accompanied by an escort vehicle, the Traffic Escort Warden.
- The driver of a pilot or escort vehicle must not operate any other vehicle or machinery, such as steer a platform or jinker trailer, whilst accompanying an oversize vehicle.
- To avoid unnecessary traffic build up, an oversize vehicle accompanied by a pilot vehicle must pull over on a regular basis to allow traffic to pass. This includes stopping in all parking bays that are suitable and stopping wherever it is safe to do so, with pilots or Traffic Escort Wardens providing traffic management if necessary.
- The flash of an operational amber warning light must be visible between 120 and 200 times a minute, in normal daylight, at a distance of not less than 500 metres in any direction.
- Where it is not possible to see one warning light mounted on the vehicle or load from any direction, additional amber warning light(s) must be mounted on the vehicle or load.
- A pilot vehicle travelling in front of an oversize vehicle, may place a filter behind the warning light on the pilot vehicle to reduce the intensity of the light directed to the driver of the oversize vehicle.
- Any warning light which a pilot vehicle or escort vehicle is required to have must be switched on when the vehicle is accompanying an oversize vehicle.
- If a vehicle is not required under the operating conditions to have a warning light, it must not have one that is switched on.
- Wig Wag lights must only be used where stipulated in the conditions of a permit or order. Wig Wag Lights:
- (a)Must be mounted in pairs, one on each side of the front of the vehicle;
- (b)Must flash an alternating white light;
- (c)Must not interfere with the amber warning lights or any other lights required under road law;
- (d)Must not be headlights;
- (e)May be spotlights with a maximum output of 55 watts, provided they are angle down 45degrees toward the road surface;
- (f)May be LED day running lights, provided the light emitted from each lamp does not exceed 400cd;
- (g)Must have an illuminating surface area not less than 40cm²;
- (h)Must be no less than 500mm above ground level and no more than 1000mm aboveground level.
- The face of a warning sign must have a yellow surface.
- The face of the warning sign must have a black border at least 20 mm wide. The border may be split if the sign is divided into two parts.
- The outermost edge of the border must be set at least 10 mm in from the edge of the sign unless the sign has been made with a box edge.
- The warning sign must display the manufacturer's name or logo, and the brand and class of retro





reflective material used in block letters at least 3 mm, but not more than 10 mm, high.

- The marking may appear in any visible location on the sign, except in a bottom corner of a sign used on a pilot vehicle.
- The face of the warning sign must be appropriately maintained to ensure it is clearly visible and legible to other road users.
- A warning sign must be made of either:
- (a)stiff, flat, weatherproof material, or
- (b)flexible material, provided the sign is held taut, and is clearly visible and unlikely to be come dislocated, furl or otherwise become difficult to read by other road users.
- A flexible warning sign that is in such condition or state that its message cannot be easily read by other road users is deemed not to be a warning sign for the purposes of this Section.
- A warning sign must not be displayed on a vehicle that is not an oversize vehicle or a pilot vehicle.
- A warning flag must be brightly coloured red, yellow, or red and yellow, at least 450mm long and 450mm wide.
- A warning sign on an oversize vehicle must be at least 1020 mm long and at least 250 mm high.
- The sign may be split into 2 parts, in which case the combined length of its parts must be at least 1020 mm.
- A warning sign on an oversize vehicle must show the word "OVERSIZE", in black upper-case lettering.
- The lettering must be at least 180 mm high.
- If the sign is split into 2 parts, the part mounted on the left must show the letters "OVER" and the part mounted on the right must show the letters "SIZE".
- A warning sign on an oversize vehicle must be mounted vertically.
- The lower edge of the sign must be:
- above the bottom of the bumper bar; or
- if there is no bumper bar, at least 500 mm from the ground level.
- If the sign is split into 2 parts, each part must be fitted at the same height as the other.
- A warning sign on a pilot vehicle must be at least 1200 mm long and at least 600 mm high.
- The sign may have bottom corner cut outs not more than 150 mm wide and not more than 100 mm high, if they are needed for mounting the warning lights.
- Both faces of a warning sign on a pilot vehicle must show:
- the word "OVERSIZE", in black upper case lettering at least 200 mm high, and
- (b)the words "LOAD AHEAD", in black upper case lettering at least 100 mm high.
- The bottom of the lettering of the word "OVERSIZE" must be at least 300 mm from the bottom of the sign.
- The bottom of the lettering of the words "LOAD AHEAD" must be at least 100 mm from the bottom of the sign.
- A warning sign on a pilot vehicle must not lean back so there is more than 200 mm measured horizontally from the top of the sign to a vertical line running through the bottom of the sign.

The European wasp wipe out!

After successive, challenging seasons, WA can breathe a sigh of relief and celebrate some spectacular results.

The **2020-21** European wasp (*Vespula germanica*) surveillance season has finished strongly with nest numbers plummeting to the lowest they've been in 12 years and not a whisper from the destructive pest for months!

This victory comes after three years of sustained efforts: additional resourcing, strong community reporting, multi-government departmental collaboration, and a WA-first baiting program implemented across 2,530 hectares (25.3km²) of rugged bushland in the Perth Hills. It took everything from the playbook and a few new innovative moves to detect, delineate and wipe out this pest.

Season stats:

- 68,100 ha (68.1km²) under intensive surveillance
- 3,000+ surveillance traps deployed
- 14 nests destroyed all in the Perth metro
- 4 confirmed public detections
- ALL hot spots ERADICATED!

An enviable history

European wasps have hitchhiked their way around the globe, establishing and spreading everywhere within their biological range, largely unchallenged... except in WA. Since 1977 when first evidence of this pest emerged in WA, we've mounted an attack.



European wasps have permanently established in south-east Australia (SA, NSW, ACT, VIC and TAS) but are not subject to state-wide control programs, resulting in an annual influx of wasps into WA.

So, we must not let our guard down, as **detections must be made early** to have the best chance of eradication and prevent the permanent establishment and spread of this pest. Brush up on your European wasp identification skills, consider trapping alongside us and learn more about this surveillance program at **agric.wa.gov.au/wasps** or contact our Pest and Disease Information Service. Until next season!

Warrior Wellbeing Article Passions and Interests vs Self-Sabotage

Our interests and passions are an integral part of our ongoing health. They underpin an often-neglected part of our holistic wellbeing and health, known as "*social-spiritual wellbeing*". As blokes we need to constantly challenge ourselves to experience more and engage with new opportunities. There is more to us than just our occupations and we need to explore the things that excite and interest us. These passions and interests, the things that make us tick, are where we as blokes get a sense of purpose and identity. Often however, our hardwired competitive nature, and need to win can sabotage us.

A few years ago, at age 40, I pulled on the boots to play my first ever season of AFL footy. I wanted to be involved as my eldest son was playing and I had visions of playing out the season in reserves and having some great father/ son bonding time. As it turned out, he went straight into the league team after only two reserves games and I played for a couple of seasons, having a ball with a great bunch of blokes.

Sometimes, mates with outstanding footy pedigrees would say to me "*How do you do it?*" and honestly, I couldn't understand their question. I was slow, lacking in skills and pretty unfit, but I was having fun, and getting a little bit fitter. I loved it! I only understood their plight a couple of years later when I got back into a form of motorsport that I had been reasonably competitive at in my 20's, rallying.

I was keen as mustard to get back into rallying after a 10-year hiatus, but as I progressed through the season, I realised I wasn't really enjoying it. I wasn't committing to the pace-notes; I wasn't holding it flat over the crest that my notes said I could. I knew how hard I needed to push, but the middle age me couldn't get to where the 20-year-old me had set the bar. It was getting me down, and as I drove into the midway service park (the pits) at my last event I knew it was time to finish up when I was wishing the event was over. The younger me used to wish that the rally would just keep going, there never seemed to be enough competitive k's.

My mate's question about "how could I possibly enjoy footy in my 40's?" suddenly became clear. I didn't have a younger footy-self against which to measure; my next game could still have been my best even if that best wasn't very good at all. My feelings about rallying suddenly made his feelings about footy so much clearer.

This serves as an illustration that our competitive natures can sometimes get in the way of us engaging with a new passion or interest. It might take moving out of our comfort zone to a new hobby or past-time to give us the space we need so that we are not constantly measuring ourselves against our old markers of competence or manhood.
