Further, that the Shire of Brookton had been invited to attend, with the need for Brookton to confirm their membership of the Group.

In addition, the Shire of Beverley were in attendance as a member of the Group, with the need to discuss processes, regional projects, and whether Beverley wished to remain with this Group given the present funding allocations.

6. REPORTS OF THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER

SE-001-12 STATUS REPORT – OUTSTANDING BUSINESS FROM EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

(File: serpt001-12)

The Executive Officer drew attention to this item of business, providing comment on the following:

- Report deals with outstanding matters, namely preparation of Asset Management Plans and Local Law Review.
- Updates detailed within the report.
- Projects nearing completion.
- Asset Management Plans are complete with the exception of Tammin.
- Local Laws Waste and Health Local Laws cannot be progressed as the Review Committee had raised concerns in this regard.

The Chairman drew attention to discussions at the SEARTG Board Meeting earlier, querying the ability to repeal and replace the local laws, with Mr D Long providing comment on the following points:

- Issues exist with both Local Laws.
- The Waste Local Law is currently with the Crown Solicitor's Office for legal advice.
- The Waste Local Law is ultra-varies, as it goes beyond the power of the legislation set down.
- The Crown Solicitor is looking at the current model for this Law.
- Inherent problems with the way the Law has been drafted, and the power of the legislation.
- Until these issues can be resolved, the Waste Local Law cannot be addressed.

- The Joint Standing Committee is sitting on all other Waste Local Laws for this reason.
- Issues with the Waste Local Law have a flow on affect with the Health Local Law, as the provisions under this Law control the handling and disposal of waste.
- Repeal and amendments are not able to be progressed with the Health Local Law until matters are resolved with the Waste Local Law.
- WALGA has been in discussion with the Department on timing of the Crown Solicitor's advice.
- No estimated date at this point.
- The model local law for Waste was drafted by WALGA, with advice and input from the Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC), and the Department for Local Government.
- Issues were not flagged until the draft Local Law was tested in 2011, some two years after development.

There being no further discussion, it was:

SE-002-12 MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

(File: serpt002-12)

1. Membership of SEAVROC

The Chairman drew attention to matters for discussion, namely membership of SEAVROC, and in particular the Shire of Brookton's membership.

Mr R Hooper provided comment on Max Trenorden's subsidiary legislation being lost, and queried the status of Minister Castrilli's subsidiary legislation. The Chairman advised that his understanding was that Minister Castrilli's legislation was yet to be presented.

Cr S Uppill advised that communication had been received advising that the government had voted against bringing the motion forward, with Cr P Hooper providing comment in relation to the status of each piece of legislation, namely that both technically "remained on the books".

The Chairman drew attention to the Shire of Brookton's membership of SEAVROC, seeking the Group's direction in this regard.

Cr P Hooper suggested that correspondence be forwarded to Brookton requesting advice within one month on whether they wished to continue membership or not.

General discussion followed, covering:

Chairman: Request for letter from Brookton confirming membership.

Cr S Uppill Queried wording of the Memorandum of Understanding

(MOU) in relation to membership.

Cr P Hooper: Understands there is inability to resign unless all members

are in agreement.

Executive Officer: Does not concur with Cr P Hooper's comment.

Cr S Uppill: Advises that WEROC requirement is for written advice by

31 December, advising of withdrawal on 30 June the

following year.

Chairman: Advises that full consensus is required for new members.

Does not recall anything specific for withdrawal from the

group, however wording will be checked.

Correspondence to Brookton seeking their advice.

It was then:

MOVED Cr P Hooper, Seconded Cr S Uppill, that the Executive Officer forward correspondence to the Shire of Brookton seeking advice within one month of the Shire's

intention to continue membership of the South East Avon Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

With the agreement of Members, discussion on Items 2, 3 and 4 were held over until the arrival of Ms W Newman, Chief Executive Officer, Wheatbelt Development Commission.

Mr R Hooper queried allocation of funds within the 10 Year Financial Plan for provision of services to SEAVROC by the Executive Officer. The Chairman suggested that the Executive Officer prepare a budget estimate for the next twelve months for each Member Local Government to give consideration to. Further, that this was dependent on amalgamation.

A query followed, with the Chairman confirming that matters to be dealt with by SEAVROC are dependent on the decision to proceed to amalgamation in 2014. It is understood that under such circumstances, SEAVROC would cease to exist, and a new agreement required for any regional activity. Further, confirming that the Executive Officer will prepare an 18 month budget estimate for the provision of services in this regard.

Following a query from the floor, the Chairman further advised that the Group may wish to elect a Chairperson at this meeting, which had not been done at this point given the Group had not met for twelve months.

There being no further comment, the Chairman invited Chief Executive Officers to provide comment in relation to Item 5.

5. Regional Projects and the New Competitive Process in Relation to Royalties for Regions CLG Funding

Mr R Hooper

- Agreement is in place on how funds were to be shared for the 2010/2011, 2011/2012 and 2012/2013 Financial Years.
- Review of the Local Government Regional Funding indicates the 2013/2014 will be on an allocated basis for the same grouping.
- Quairading put forward their case for power connection, given the fact that the town is completely without power.
- Western Power costing \$4.8M; with \$1.6M from the local government and Auspower.
- More than providing power to the industrial area, it is upgrading power to the town site.
- Considered a regional project.
- Tammin's project being caravan park and workers' accommodation, put forward two years ago, which has been confirmed.
- York Town Hall has been listed.
- Airfield or aged housing for Cunderdin dependent on grants.
- Avondale project for Beverley has been flagged for upgrading.
- Aged housing as a service to the community, with associated loss of rating income.
- Chief Executive Officers have agreed on regional projects as detailed.
- Projects have not been based on population, area, or finances.

- Given the unknowns for 2014/2015 or 2015/2016, not game to go beyond the third and fourth year of the current four year cycle.
- Equity to improve.

Mr P Naylor

- Residue from the \$900,000 allocated for Quairading's power upgrade was to be redirected to the caravan park project.
- York's issue of non-rateability from aged housing.
- Other Local Governments would be happy to take 10-12 aged units and not worry about the rating.

Chairman

 Queried if Mr S Gollan participated in discussions at the Chief Executive Officers' meeting.

Mr R Hooper

Confirmed Beverley's participation.

Chairman

- Projects agreed in principle to be part of the equity distribution through SEAVROC for regional projects.
- To be successful, projects needed to be part of the planning process or regional planning strategy.
- Success of two recreational projects.
- Move to competitive applications on a state wide basis.
- Need to pursue regional allocation within competitive aspect.
- · Guidelines unknown at this point.
- Planning to be well prepared in relation to applications for funding.

Mr P Naylor

- Business plans to be presented by August 2013 in relation to funding.
- Plans required six months earlier than anticipated.

Cr P Hooper

- Speaks in support of Quairading's power project.
- Comments on accommodation required for the 100 Auspower employees for the project.

Chairman

- Believes the power project would also sit well with the Wheatbelt Development Commission blueprint being developed.
- Unsure of funding sources available in this area.
- Confirms the Quairading power project to be a good fit as suggested.
- Projects have spin off of job creation and employment.
- Cr G Anderson Cr D Richards and Mr G Fardon met with Brendon Grylls recently, who is fully supportive of the power project.

• Meeting to be held 12 December 2012 with Western Power and other parties.

Ms W Newman entered the meeting at 2:14pm, with the Chairman offering the Group's welcome. The Chairman then advised on discussion to this point, namely support for Quairading's power upgrade, caravan park and workers' accommodation at Tammin, and three other projects for the future.

Following the Chairman's invitation, Ms W Newman offered comment on the following points:

- Increased emphasis based on population and economic drivers.
- Avon Sub Regional Economic Planning complete and will provide litmus test on what is regional.
- Mr S Hicks will chair the review of the Country Local Government Fund.
- Funding looks set to become state wide competitive, and aligned with Royalties for Regions, the Regional Trust, and Regional Development Council.
- Looking at the individual projects, unless they are part of a bigger strategy such as tourism, it will be difficult to support funding in 2013/2014.
- · Good evidence required to support proposed projects.
- Competition with such projects as Exmouth Boat Harbour, supported by four Gascoyne Local Governments, and Bunbury Inner Harbour.

Cr S Uppill queried Cunderdin airfield and aged housing, with Ms W Newman suggesting that if aged housing was part of a sub-regional strategy and a population driver due to the lack of quality housing, this would be supported.

The Chairman suggested the Group had some work to do, however were committed to the projects agreed to.

Ms W Newman suggested that there was a theme with Avondale and the York Town Hall, advising that Avon Tourism will be developing a strategic plan in the New Year. Further, advising that these projects can be justified through that process, and suggesting that the Group link its projects to the bigger picture and strategies.

Mr R Hooper raised concerns with linkage to population, providing percentage ratio examples of 1 person from a town of 300, versus 30 people in a town of 10,000.

Ms W Newman then provided comment on the following:

- Not necessarily looking at a net gain in anything.
- In the Central East, a population is leakage of people from communities due to lack of quality aged housing is a justification.
- Not about specific numbers, about being strategic and understanding the economic drivers.

There being no further comment, the Chairman sought endorsement of the projects report in principle, as presented, and taking on board Ms W Newman's comments.

It was then:

MOVED Cr P Hooper, Seconded Cr T Boyle, that the Regional Projects report be accepted in principle, as presented, whilst taking on board Ms W Newman's comments.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY .

Mr G Fardon entered the meeting at 2:27pm and was welcomed by the Chairman, who then drew attention to Item 2, with discussion summarised as follows:

2. Aged Care Planning and Wheatbelt Development Commission Model – Participation and Contribution

Chairman

- Aged care planning and the model rolled out by the Wheatbelt Development Commission.
- Request for SEAVROC's involvement, and what this entails.

Ms W Newman provided a printed copy of her slide presentation to the Group, commenting on the following areas:

- Aged care has been identified across the Group's Country Local Government Regional Infrastructure Planning Forums.
- Aged care identified as the top two priorities for the last three years.
- Commissioner has committed some resources over time.
- · Better understanding of where aged care is at.
- In a good place in terms of national aged care reform, in particular with the Southern Inland Health Initiative (SIHI); and review coming up in 2013.
- Good research and modelling anticipated which suits the dispersed population content of the Wheatbelt.
- Eleven local governments, NEWROC and WEROC, in the process of signing off on their reports.
- Rollout of the Integrated Aged Care Solutions for the whole of the Wheatbelt, with State and Federal interest.
- Tender has been awarded to Verso Consulting who has undertaken work in the Central East region.
- Aims of the process are to identify aged care services, accommodation, and governance models, for a highly dispersed population setting.
- Focus on accommodation which is rightfully the domain of local government, however there is a need to look at all elements together.
- Build on existing community assets.
- Solutions to guide sound investment.
- Moving away from the market incentive to attract private providers as this has proven unsuccessful in the Wheatbelt.
- Services to enable ageing in place, as outlined in the National Aged Care Reform Package.

- Page 3 of document provided to Members details approach successfully used in the Central East, including information collection, review of services in place, demographic review, etc.
- Model options.
- Recommendations and actions.
- Importance of place, community life, sense of ownership, focus on the person, and choice.
- · Equity of access, practicality and viability.
- Planning for aged care precincts.
- · Local government investment in aged care.
- · Central East assessment details, packages, and service levels provided.
- Working at a sub-regional 'ROC' level which is going well.
- Separate indigenous needs study.
- Investment of \$5,000 per local government, participation in five meetings, with Chief Executive Officers overseeing the process.
- Roles and responsibilities included in draft report.
- Anticipated completion prior to State election.
- Each Member of the Group will have a 'Shire' report, along with a regional and whole of region report.

Discussion followed, covering the following:

Chairman

- State and Federal Governments are happy with what is happening in this area.
- Strong initiative shown.
- Speaks in support of the process.
- Urges the Group to take advantage of the process, expertise and staff, and to have interaction with the main players in the health area, as this will open opportunities.
- Unsure of York's progress in this area.
- Suggests the moving of a recommendation for consideration by each respective Member Local Government.

Mr R Hooper

- Most Councils have independently resolved to allocate the \$5,000.
- York has resolved in this regard.
- Advised that Housing and Works and joint venture housing has provided almost all aged accommodation in the Wheatbelt over the last 30 years.

Ms W Newman

Housing and Works sit at the next stakeholder level.

Mr R Hooper

York does not have a problem with joint venture or Housing and Works projects.

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• Issues arise from private industry who charges a high fee whilst being eligible for rating exemptions.

Ms W Newman

Central East have identified these issues, along with the pros and cons.

Chairman

• Queries if any of the Group are yet to allocate the required \$5,000, with all Member Local Governments confirming this allocation.

Ms W Newman

· Will negotiate and advise timeframes.

Mr G Fardon

· Queried grouping.

Ms W Newman

SEAVROC grouping to remain.

Mr G Fardon •

Two to three Wheatbelt Councils who are yet to commit funding for this purpose.

Cr P Hooper

 Queried the ultimate picture of what this will look like, will it stay sub regional, or will it become a Wheatbelt Aged Care Policy.

Ms W Newman

- There will be a Wheatbelt Aged Care Plan, with the need to look at it sub regionally to relate to regional services.
- Important that each community has something to retain their aged community, equating to approximately 9% for high care residential.
- Central East model indicates that independent living and aged care packages cover the greater percentage of aged community needs.
- Independent living, universal design, quality and ownership models.
- Strong lobbying and interest in the outcomes to improve match between population and home care packages.

Cr P Hooper

- Concept is great.
- Concern on who will do the work.

Ms W Newman

- Workforce is a recognised issue.
- Training and qualifications in aged care.

Chairman

Queries the need for a resolution and coordinated approach.

Mr G Fardon

- Considers that there is a need to record support and participation of this Group in the Wheatbelt Aged Care Planning process.
- Invite the Wheatbelt Development Commission and Verso Consulting to work with SEAVROC in this regard.

It was then:

MOVED Mr G Fardon, Seconded Cr P Hooper, that the South East Avon Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (SEAVROC) support and participate in the Wheatbelt Aged Care Planning process, and invite the Wheatbelt Development Commission and Verso Consulting to work with SEAVROC in this regard.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

The Chairman drew attention to Item 3, with discussion following:

3. Regional Trust Investment and Options as per the Wheatbelt Development Commission Presentation in Northam

Chairman

- Queried attendance at this presentation.
- Invited Ms W Newman to provide comment.

Ms W Newman

- Forum held as a result of Country Local Government Planning Sessions.
- Level of frustration on lack of funds to undertake desired developments.
- Interest in setting up a trust for this purpose.
- Discussion held with Bendigo Bank, who wishes to invest and share profits with the community.
- Forum held to float this idea, with relevant information distributed.
- Taken up by local government groups keen to pursue the idea.
- Meetings to be scheduled.
- If interested, the Development Commission would be happy to work with the Group in this regard.

Chairman

- Queried legality of local government being involved in such structures.
- Opinion provided that involvement is legal.
- Needs purpose and objective, along with affordable commitment.
- Infill sewerage may be a possible project.

Mr R Hooper

- Raises concern with shortfall of 76% in asset funding, what scope is available to participate.
- Supportive of trust development.
- Queried capacity, given current position, and move to amalgamation.

Chairman

- Dependent on innovations and funds required.
- Attracting private investment.
- Suggests allocation of \$10,000 by each Member Local Government per year does not amount to much, however will build over time and attract investment.
- Give consideration to sufficient allocations to be effective in goals and outcomes.

Mr R Hooper

• Discussed example of Auspower versus Western Power, and the scope and costs of such projects.

Chairman

• Suggested that Members look at the option of participating, and advise accordingly.

Mr R Hooper

- Provided comment on strategic planning provided by the Executive Officer in order to allocate sufficient funds for various projects.
- Precedence provided to projects.
- Cannot be written into 10 Year Financial Plan or Forward Capital Plan with any degree of certainty.

Mr G Fardon

 Suggests the matter remain on the table, with Members to view additional information.

Ms W Newman

- When you have a project, this will emerge as the right idea.
- Increased cost pressure will not change; doing things differently will help remove the pressure.

The Chairman then drew attention to Item 4, with discussion following.

4. Funding Provided by the Wheatbelt Development Commission to Develop Regional Projects

Chairman

Funding allocations for business planning.

Mr R Hooper

• Provided comment on submission of invoices in relation to relevant projects, and Business Plans being required by February 2013.

Ms W Newman

Confirms that Business Plans are required by February 2013.

Mr R Hooper

• Two months to complete Tammin and Quairading's business plans.

Mr G Fardon

· Business Plan under control.

Mr G Stanley

Tammin's Business Plan is in process.

Chairman

Confirms that these Plans will be completed by February 2013.

Mr W Newman

• Reiterated the need for these plans to be submitted as early as possible.

Chairman

• Provides comment on funds yet to be dealt with, and acquittal in relation to the Reserve fund.

Mr R Hooper

- Provides comment on the Planning Strategy, and need to merge four Town Planning Schemes.
- Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) decisions affecting local planning matters.
- Queries work being done in this regard, along with development contributions.

Ms W Newman

- Not a priority for the Commission, however can assist with coordination.
- Urge the Group to seek input from WAPC to visit and provide clarity now that changes have occurred in relation to various positions.
- Needs to be streamlined.

Ms W Newman concluded her presentation, seeking support for the Avon Sub Regional initiatives, suggesting that this would prove exciting and positive outcomes for the region. Further, urging the submission of Business Plans by February 2013. In addition, the Commission looked forward to working with the Group to provide investment opportunities for the region, with the need to "get clever" and act regionally to secure projects.

SUMMARY

An application for subdivision had been received from Ian Ross Surveyors for Lot 2 Fisher Road, Morbinning. The application will be recommended for approval.

BACKGROUND

An application has been received to subdivide lot 2 Fisher Road, Morbinning as described in the accompanying subdivision plans.

The application had previously served before Council (26 July 2011), where it was recommended for refusal to the WAPC on the following grounds:

- "1. The application cannot be supported under the provisions of the Shire of Beverley's Town Planning Scheme No. 2;
- 2. The dwellings are derelict, abandoned and uninhabitable, therefore continued occupation as a Homestead is not possible;
- 3. The proposal would result in unplanned, ad-hoc fragmentation of Farming zoned land;
- 4. The proposal would create a lot that is physically divided."

Subsequent to the above application, an application served before Council on 25 September 2012 for inclusion of the farm homestead into the Shire of Beverley Municipal Heritage Inventory. During this meeting Council resolved as follows:

"That Council resolve to: -

1. Agree to the inclusion of the farm homestead located on Lot 5042 Ewert Road, Morbinning, Beverley into the Municipal Heritage Inventory of the Shire of Beverley..."

Given the outcome of the inclusion of the homestead in the Municipal Heritage Inventory the WAPC approach the Shire to revisit its decision on the subdivision application as previously submitted.

COMMENT

The properties are zoned 'Farming' and contains agricultural related infrastructure and land uses.

Given the fact that the homestead is now included in the Municipal Heritage Inventory (MHI), the proposed subdivision meets the requirements of Development

Control Policy 3.4, clause 4.7 Conservation of heritage buildings and places, which states that:

"Lots may be created to facilitate the conservation of a heritage building or place provided that:

(a) the building, object or place is listed in the state register of heritage places, on the heritage list in the local planning scheme, or has been assessed by a recognised heritage consultant as warranting heritage protection..."

In terms of the latter it is worthy to note that the application for the inclusion of the farm homestead into the MHI was done by a recognised heritage consultant. Should Council resolve to support the recommendation for subdivision, a condition will be proposed to ensure the actual restoration of the homestead building, and bringing it up to a habitable standard, prior to subdivision commencing.

The subdivision layout proposal results in a fall-out piece of land severed from its parent lot by the proposed battleaxe leg of the homestead subdivision. The fall-out land referred to is located to the south of proposed lot 712 and to the west of lot 4571 (kindly refer to the attached maps).

Should Council resolve to recommend this application favourably, it will be recommended that this piece of fall-out land be amalgamated with the proposed lot 712 to the immediate north of this land, as a condition of approval.

SUMMARY

It is proposed to construct an Outbuilding (Farm Storage Shed) at Lot 20 Edison Mill Road that will require a variation of the relevant Council Policy and Setback Requirements as per Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2). It will be recommended the application be approved.

BACKGROUND

The subject site is approximately 61.2ha in extent, zoned 'Farming' and contains a single dwelling with various agricultural related sheds. The proposal is to construct an additional Farm Storage shed with a footprint area in excess of the maximum permitted in Council's Outbuilding Policy. The maximum permissible area for any individual shed in this zone, according to the policy, is 400 m². The proposed shed will have an area of 630 m².

Furthermore, a variation is proposed to the setback from the side/rear boundary. The Shire of Beverley Town Planning Scheme No. 2 (TPS 2) requires a setback distance of 15 meters from side/rear boundaries in Table 2 of the TPS 2, whereas the applicant is proposing a setback of 0.3 meters.

COMMENT

(Kindly consider this section by referring to the attached Locality Map, proposed shed elevation view and Site Plans).

The application is being referred to Council as an element of the design, as well as a setback distance, as described above, are beyond the parameters as permitted under Council's Outbuilding Policy in the Farming Zone, and Table 2 in TPS 2.

The proposed Farm Storage shed/outbuilding is to be used in conjunction with ongoing existing farming operations.

The proposed siting of the outbuilding on the lot is done for practical purposes. As can be seen on the attached aerial photography of the subject site, it is proposed to replace an existing shed, also located virtually on the cadastral boundary, with the new shed. It can be argued that the new development will be a continuation of an already existing situation, albeit with a bigger footprint.

In terms of clause 4.2.2 of TPS 2: -

"...if a development the subject of an application for planning consent does not comply with a standard prescribed by the Scheme with respect to minimum lot sizes, building height, setbacks, site coverage, car parking, and landscaping, the

Council may, notwithstanding that non-compliance, approve the application unconditionally or subject to such conditions as the Council thinks fit. The power conferred by this clause may only be exercised if the Council is satisfied that:

- i) approval of the proposed development would be consistent with the orderly and proper planning of the locality and the preservation of the amenities of the locality;
- ii) the non-compliance will not have any adverse effect upon the occupiers or users of the development or the inhabitants of the locality or upon the likely future development of the locality."

It is submitted that the proposed siting of the new outbuilding on the lot will not negatively influence the amenity of the area. It is considered to be in pace with the character and planning intent for the area and will therefore be recommended for approval.







St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct, comprising St Mary's Anglican Church (1892), St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall (1889, 1957), a Memorial Lychgate (1956) and a mature Eucalyptus citriodora (Lemon Scented Gum) (c.1892), has cultural heritage significance for the following reasons:

11. 1 AESTHETIC VALUE*

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is a medium sized collection of Ecclesiastical buildings located within their original semi-rural churchyard setting. (Criterion 1.2)

St Mary's Anglican Church is a <u>good</u> simple example of a Federation Gothic style church, which, despite some modifications, retains much of its original form. (Criterion 1.2)

The original 1889 fabric of St Mary's Anglican Rectory provides stylistic evidence of a medium sized Victorian Regency residence. (Criterion 1.2)

St Mary's Anglican Church, prominently situated on the corner of Husking and John Streets, is a local landmark, marking the northern entry to the town of Beverley. (Criterion 1.3)

The mature *Eucalyptus citriodora* (Lemon Scented Gum) has landmark quality, due to its size, characteristic striking white trunk, and its physical relationship to St Mary's Anglican Rectory. (Criterion 1.3)

11. 2. HISTORIC VALUE

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is indicative of the centralisation of the Parish of Beverley following the arrival of the railway to the town in 1886. (Criterion 2.1 & 2.2)

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is representative of the growth and optimism of the region and State following of the construction of the Great Southern Railway through Beverley, which, when opened in 1889, designated the town as the rail terminus for both Government and private trains as well as the overnight stopping point on the journey from Albany to Perth. (Criterion 2.2)

The extension to St Mary's Anglican Rectory in 1957 to incorporate a Church Hall is evidence of the continued growth of the Beverley Parish, and the increasing requirement for space for Ecclesiastical meetings. (Criterion 2.2)

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is associated with the architect Howard Evans, who was responsible for the design of St Mary's Church and St Mary's Anglican Rectory.

11. 3. SCIENTIFIC VALUE

11. 4. SOCIAL VALUE

St Mary's Anglican Church is valued by the Anglican community of Beverley, as the principle place of Anglican worship in the Parish since 1892. (Criterion 4.1)

St Mary's Anglican Church, prominently situated on the corner of Husking and John Streets, is considered to be a local landmark, and contributes to the community's sense of place. (Criterion 4.2)

12. DEGREE OF SIGNIFICANCE

12. 1. RARITY

St Mary's Anglican Rectory is the earliest known example of architecture designed by the architect Howard Evans. (Criterion 5.1)

The Memorial Lychgate is the only known war memorial Lynch Gate in Western Australia. (Criterion 5.1)

12. 2 REPRESENTATIVENESS

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is representative of the centralisation of the Parish of Beverley following the arrival of the railway in 1886, and the Parish's continued growth from the last decade of the Nineteenth Century into the Twentieth Century. (Criterion 6.2)

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is representative of the growth and optimism of the region and the State following of the construction of the Great Southern Railway through Beverley, which opened in 1889. (Criterion 6.2)

12.3 CONDITION

St Mary's Anglican Church is in fair condition.

St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall is in fair condition.

The Memorial Lychgate and its wing walls are in good condition.

The Eucalyptus citriodora has been maintained with pruning.

12. 4 INTEGRITY

St Mary's Anglican Church has a high degree of integrity as it has been in continuous use as the Parish Church of Beverley since its construction in 1892.

St Mary's Anglican Rectory retains a high degree of integrity for its continued use as a residence since its construction in 1889 (although it is no longer used as the place of residence of the local priest).

St Mary's Parish Hall retains a high degree of integrity for its continuous use as a church hall since 1957.

12. 5 AUTHENTICITY

St Mary's Anglican Church has a moderate to high degree of authenticity. Despite several modifications, including the addition (in 1914) and removal (in 1926) of the Chancel tower, the rending of the church exterior c.1939, and the replacement of the original timber porch in 1963, the church retains its original form and much of its original fabric.

St Mary's Anglican Rectory has moderate authenticity. Major changes have included the extension to the east wing in 1957 to incorporate a church hall. alterations to the roof form and cladding, and replacement of the original timber windows with powder-coated aluminium sashes. Internally the Rectory retains much of its original form and fabric.

St Mary's Parish Hall has a high degree of authenticity.

The Memorial Lychgate and its wing walls retain a high degree of authenticity.

13. SUPPORTING EVIDENCE

The documentary and physical evidence is based on 'St Mary's Church & Rectory Beverley, Conservation Plan', prepared by Hocking Planning and Architecture in January 2005.

The physical evidence for St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall, Memorial Lynch Gate and Eucalyptus citriodora (Lemon Scented Gum) has been compiled by Greenward Consulting in September 2012.

Amendments and/or additions have been carried out by State Heritage Office staff and the Register Committee.

13. 1 **DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE**

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct comprises St Mary's Anglican Church (1892), St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall (1889, 1957), a Memorial Lychgate (1956) and Eucalyptus citriodora (Lemon Scented Gum) (c.1892).

The first Anglican Church for the Beverly district, St Paul's Anglican Church (P144 St Paul's Anglican Church & Graveyard, Edwards Crossing), was constructed in 1859 about four kilometres to the north of the present townsite of Beverley, where a small trading settlement had existed since the 1830s.1

In 1867 the Surveyor George Roe (son of Surveyor-General John Septimus Roe) was sent to the township of Edward Crossing to formally survey the land, as the settlement had neither been surveyed nor formally gazetted. However, shortly after, upon discovering that the chosen site was poorly drained and deemed unsuitable, another surveyor, John Forrest (later to become Sir John Forrest, Premier of Western Australia), determined a more suitable site to the south, where the current townsite is located.2

Despite the town's relocation, St Paul's Anglican Church remained as Beverly's Parish for the following thirty years, during which time the Parish incorporated another two churches, St Peter's in Gilgering (1858) (P2817 St Peter's Church), and St Patrick's in Mourambine (1872) (P2258 St Patrick's Anglican Church & Rectory (fmr)). The Rector of Beverley (initially the Colonial Chaplain of Beverley District) shared his time between the three churches.

In the early 1880s, as the State Government was in the process of extending the Eastern District Railway (Fremantle to Guildford) to York, a rail route linking Perth and Albany was mapped out, which would link the Eastern District Railway at York to the port at Albany.3 The rail line, to be known as the Great Southern Railway, was to be constructed in part by Government and in part by a private company - Western Australian Land Company Line, and Beverley was chosen to be the rail terminus for both operators as well as the overnight stopping point on

the journey from Albany to Perth. The York to Beverley section was opened in 1886, and the Beverley to Albany section was completed and opened in 1889.5

The route of the railway line through the Great Southern, and elsewhere through Western Australia, heavily impacted on the development of the State, and particularly those areas through which the railway ran.6 Beverley townsite developed rapidly with the arrival of the railway, benefitting from the disembarking passengers, and a number of new hotels, boarding houses and dining rooms were constructed, as well as stores and residences.7

The growth of the town and its population led to the Parish deciding to move to a more centralised location, closer to the new rail line. By mid-1888, the Beverley Vestry had started raising money for the erection of a new Anglican Rectory, and a site was chosen to the north of the Railway Station, on John Street. The Rectory was built to a design by the architect Howard Evans, and construction was completed by 1889

Howard Evans arrived in Western Australia with his family in June 1887, and was quick to seek employment, being appointed to supervise the construction of the first purpose-built bank in the north-west region, which was completed in 1888 at Roebourne (P2335 Roebourne Public Library, formerly Union Bank).8 While in Roebourne, Evans became friendly with the local Anglican Minister Cannon E Groser, who in 1888 moved to Beverley to become its second Rector, and engaged Evans in 1889 to design the Rectory, and again in 1892 for the design of the Parish Church.9

Reverend Groser was the first Anglican Rector to live in the new residence, and is thought to have planted the Eucalyptus Citriodora. 10 Records indicate that the rectory was also used for some time as a school room.11

In early 1892, construction began on St Mary's Anglican Church, which was also designed by the architect Howard Evans. The foundation stone of the new building was laid by Dean Goldsmith in March 1892. Construction of the Church was completed in November 1892 and was consecrated by the Bishop of the Diocese, the Right Reverend Henry Hutton Parry D.D. on 30 November 1892.

In c.1914 a fibro cement clad tower was built over the Chancel of St Mary's Church as a memorial to Wm. H. De Lisle, a local farmer. 12 The tower was later

condemned as unsafe, and demolished in 1926. By 1939 the exterior of the Church had been rendered.

On Remembrance Day in 1956 a memorial Lych Gate was dedicated by the Venerable Archdeacon L. Bothomley in memory of those members of the local community who had died during World Wars One and Two. The gate, constructed of stone and timber with a tiled roof, was erected at the southern boundary of the Church site.

The east wing of the Rectory was extended in 1957.13 The extension was used thereafter as a Parish Hall.

In 1962 the timber porch entrance which stood to the south side of St Mary's Anglican Church was demolished and in 1963 was replaced by an enclosed masonry porch.

For a further discussion of the documentary evidence, refer to 'St Mary's Church & Rectory Beverley, Conservation Plan', prepared by Hocking Planning and Architecture in January 2005.

13. 2 PHYSICAL EVIDENCE

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct comprises St Mary's Anglican Church (1892). St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall (1889, 1957), a Memorial Lychgate (1956) and a mature Eucalyptus citriodora (Lemon Scented Gum) (c.1892). For the purpose of this assessment the Rectory (1889) and the Parish Hall wing (1957) have been described separately.

Siting

St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct is located immediately north east of the intersection of the Great Southern Highway with John Street and Husking Street. The Church, Rectory & Parish Hall and associated grounds are located within a clearly defined fenced area on the south-eastern portion of the lot. The larger, north-western portion of the lot presents as a separate open paddock (flanked by the railway line and low density residential development).

The Church, which has a set back of approximately 17m from John Street and 6m from Husking Street, is the prominent landmark element at the intersection. although views of the lower walls are partly screened by informal landscaping. This building is accessed from John Street through the Lychgate, which is flanked by short wing walls constructed of local stone. The remainder of the main frontages are bounded by a pipe rail and wire mesh fence.

St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall is located north-north-east of the Church, with a setback of approximately 42m from John Street. In public views the main element is the original 1889 Rectory, which faces John Street across a gravel entrance drive and turning circle. At the turning circle the driveway branches off to a small, informal gravel parking area at the north-eastern end of the Church and to another informal parking area and rear garage on the northeastern side of the Rectory & Parish Hall. The Parish Hall was constructed as a rear extension of the north-eastern wing of the Rectory, and is not clearly visible from the street. The only other buildings on the site are a small, modern garden

shed north-west of the Rectory, and garage and shed north-east of the Parish Hall. The garage is constructed of lightly rendered brick, with a corrugated iron gable roof, and fibrous cement gable panel (possibly built in the inter-war years). This has been extended with an open-fronted corrugated iron, lean-to shed on the north eastern side.

The large grounds (which are approximately 90m wide and 80m deep) are laid out with informal plantings of low-maintenance, drought tolerant, trees and shrubs (primarily native, but also including a sentinel palm tree on the north eastern side of the turning circle). The Eucalyptus citriodora that is reputed to have been planted by Canon Groser in c.1892, is located between St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall and the north-eastern boundary of the site. There are no flower beds, but perennial daisies are scattered across the site. The only formal element of the grounds is a sundial at the centre of the oval shaped lawn bounded by the turning circle. This brass sundial is set on a sandstone plinth, and is dedicated to the memory of Canon Henry Tassell, Rector of the Parish of Beverley-Brookton, 1965-1978.

St Mary's Anglican Church (1892)

St Mary's Anglican Church is a Federation Gothic style church located on the corner of Husking and John Streets in Beverley. The single-storey, double volume building is constructed of local stone which has been rendered with cement and painted white, and topped with a steeply pitched roof clad with ridged, flat-pan roof sheeting.

The church is orientated slightly off the traditional east to west alignment of church planning, as the central nave is aligned north-east to south-west. It is possible that this slight deviation may be due to the church being aligned with where the sun rose on the morning of the day of its Patron Saint, although this has not been confirmed.

The south-east elevation incorporates the enclosed entrance porch which faces the 1956 Lychgate, and Vestry. The south-west elevation, facing Husking Street. contains a rose window above two pairs of gothic headed windows and is topped with a small cross. The buttressed side walls comprise five bays that contain alternating paired and single windows.

The interior space has an open trussed roof with white painted plastered walls. The flooring is timber. The pews are not original, and are mid-twentieth century in design. The north east end of the central nave incorporates three stained-glass windows.

St Mary's Memorial Lychgate

The base of the Lychgate consists of coursed local-stone walls on either side of the pedestrian pathway that links John Street with the entrance porch of the Church. On the internal face, each of these walls has a timber bench mounted on solid curved brackets, above which is a rectangular niche. The tops of the walls are capped by timber planks which support the large square timber posts and

open curved brackets of the porch. The hipped roof is clad with lichen-encrusted terracotta tiles.

Above the stone walls and between the posts there is a timber panel to either side, each bearing a brass plaque, one a memorial to church members who died in World War One, the other to those who died in World War Two. The first of these plagues also records the dedication of the Lychgate by the Venerable Archdeacon L Bothomely on Remembrance Day 1956.

At the front of the structure (along the John Street boundary) the Lychgate is flanked by short, low stone walls, constructed of random stone with ruled joints. At the rear of the structure there is a double gate of wrought iron, each panel framed with vertical and diagonal bars in a stylised image of a gabled building.

St Mary's Anglican Rectory (1889)

St Mary's Anglican Rectory is a Victorian Regency style residence constructed of local stone, in random rubble with ruled joints. The corners of the building and the openings are defined with face brick quoins, and the openings capped with shallow-arched voussoirs. The hipped roof, which was reclad in the mid-late twentieth century, has ridged, flat-pan roof sheeting (pre-finished in an olive colour), with matching flat faced guttering and white, square profile down-pipes. To the north-eastern wing the eaves have been extended as a wide overhang (as part of the construction of the 1957 Hall extension), with a flush panel soffit concealing the heads of the original windows.

The main façade features a central verandah, flanked by a bow-shaped bay window on the south-western side and a square-faced wing on the north-eastern side. The floor of the verandah, which was re-finished in concrete in the twentieth century, is built up around the chamfered square posts and partly covers the adjacent wall vents. It is accessed by a set of central, splayed concrete steps. above which the raked verandah roof is broken by an open gable, with a simple white finial cross. The entrance to the house is at the south-western end of the verandah, while at the north-eastern end, there is a separate door into the parish office.

A second, separate verandah is located along the south-western side of the house under a continuous broken-back roofline. This has modern square posts and a brick-paved floor and is accessed from the house by the external doors from the dining room. Documentary and physical evidence indicates that this was a later addition (possibly dating from the mid-twentieth century). The central doors leading from the dining room were created within an original window opening, providing the only direct access from the rectory to the verandah.

Changes in the stonework along the south-western and north-eastern facades indicate that the building originally had a simple rectangular form, but was extended to the rear using matching detailing at a very early date. These additions created a recessed entry area at the centre of the rear (north-western) facade, which was covered in the mid-twentieth century with a shallow-pitched metal-deck roof. Given the layout and form of the addition on the north-eastern side (now adapted as the Parish Hall kitchen and supper room) it is possible (but not confirmed) that this was the 'rectory schoolroom' referred to in a report on the laying of the foundation stone for the Church in 1892.14

The stone walls are generally intact but the rear wall of the laundry/bathroom wing has been fully rendered. A cement render finish has also been applied below the window sill level to the rear entry porch, to the lower section of several of the brick quoins and to some sections of the mortar joints (presumably to conceal/patch fretting or other damage). All of the external windows were replaced in the mid-late twentieth century with powder-coated aluminium sash windows, but the openings retain the outer timber framing and the plain rendered. projecting sills. The only surviving timber sash window is located along the internal passage (opening into the Hall kitchen).

The layout of the building includes a living and dining room off the south-western side of the entrance hall. At the north western end of the entrance hall an original eternal doorway now opens into the enclosed rear porch. This provides access to the bathroom and kitchen, the latter leading through to the laundry (which retains an early-mid twentieth century fibrous cement pantry).

The north western end of the entrance hall also returns as a passage along what was originally the back of the building. Windows along the north western side of this passage now open onto the rear undercover area and into the Hall kitchen. while a door opens directly into the Hall supper room. Along the south-eastern side of the passage there are three bedrooms that have windows opening onto the front verandah. At the end of the passage there is a small parlour (described as the office retreat), which is the only main room without skirtings. This in turn opens into the office which has external access onto the front verandah.

Internally the Rectory has retained much of its original detailing (with the exception of the kitchen, laundry and bathroom fittings and fixtures) although in the mid-late twentieth century most of the ceilings were replaced in flush plasterboard with new cornices; the window to the dining room was replaced with half-glazed flush-panel doors; and a small serving hatch was constructed between the kitchen and dining room. Earlier ceilings remain in the dining room (an early twentieth century panel and batten ceiling) and laundry (which has a raked ceiling clad with beaded-edged timber boards).

Original detailing includes the fireplace surrounds to the living room, bedroom 1 and the office; timber fireplace mantle to the dining room; flat-faced, raked-edged plaster skirtings; moulded timber architraves; four panel internal doors with traditional Vaughan rim-locks; and decorative wall vents (some replaced with modern arid vents in the mid-twentieth century).

The condition of the Rectory is generally sound, but the timber floors have slumped in places and require restumping; there are localised problems with rising damp; and there is some cracking to the walls (particularly to the living room, which requires underpinning). For further discussion of the physical condition refer to the St Mary's Anglican Church & Rectory Structural Report, prepared by Maitland Consulting Structural Engineering, September 2011.

St Mary's Parish Hall (1957)

St Mary's Parish Hall was constructed as a rear extension of the north-eastern wing of the Rectory, and comprises a kitchen and supper room (housed within the stone walled early rear addition), the main hall and external toilets. The new section was constructed with a dappled-red face-brick with fine vertical scoring to the face (a popular material of the 1950s), and was housed under a continuous extension of the existing hipped roof, with the addition of new, wide boxed eaves. The new work featured double, boarded-timber doors to the main entrance and paired, double hung, timber framed windows to the north-east and south-west facades.

Internally, the rooms have exposed timber floors and flush panel ceilings with coved cornices. The walls of the kitchen and supper room are plastered, while the hall has face brick to just above window height, with plain plaster over. There is a face brick fireplace to the corner of the supper room and another mid-way along the side wall of the hall. Other 1950s detailing includes the flush panel sliding doors between the hall and the supper room, the picture rail in the supper room and the benches in the kitchen.

The condition of this extension is good.

Eucalyptus citriodora (c.1892)

A very large Eucalyptus citriodora (Lemon Scented Gum) is located between St Mary's Anglican Rectory & Parish Hall and the north-eastern boundary of the site. The trunk of this tree has a circumference of approximately 4.3m (measured at approximately 1 metre above ground), while the canopy has a spread of approximately 20m. The size of this tree by comparison with other vegetation on the site, its characteristic and striking white trunk, and its recorded age, provides it with a landmark quality in views of the Rectory.

13. 3 COMPARATIVE INFORMATION

Of the 249 places associated with the Anglican Church in the State Heritage Office database, 50 are entered on to the State Register of Heritage Places, six of which are located in the Avon Arc region. These six places are:

- P3213 Holy Trinity Church, Hall and Rectory, York comprising Holy Trinity Church (1856, 1907, 1985), attached Hall (former church of St John) (built 1861, relocated 1905), Rectory (1875) with attached kitchen (1853).
- P144 St Paul's Anglican Church & Graveyard, Edward Crossing (1859). Beverley – a simple single storey rendered mud-brick church with corrugated iron roof, and graveyard.
- P1085 St Luke's Anglican Church, Cemetery and Belfry, Gingin comprising Church of St Luke (1861), Cemetery (c.1853-1903), and Belfry (1969).
- P3722 St Luke's (Anglican) Church Rectory (1898), Gingin a singlestorey stone residence.
- P1891 St John's Anglican Church & Parish Hall, Northam comprising St John's Church (1890) with Vestry (1971) and Parish Hall (1897, 1957)

 P2821 St Andrew's Anglican Church & Cemetery, Greenhills (1912) – a single-storey timber weatherboard Federation Carpenter Gothic style church and associated cemetery.

Beverley's St Mary's Church is most comparable to Holy Trinity Church in York and St John's in Northam for size and scale. However, aesthetically, St Mary's is strikingly similar to the Parish Hall in Northam. The two buildings were constructed five years apart by the same architect, Howard Evans, St Mary's being the earlier of the two.

Other places designed by the architect Howard Evans are:

- Mission Church, Beaconsfield (1891) included as part of P1030 St Paul's Anglican Church, Presbytery & Hall – a limestone and brick Federation style building.
- P1917 St Alban's Church & Marradong Graveyard, Boddington (1894-95)
 a single-storey, three bay Church with jarrah floors.
- P7030 Wandering Shire Hall (formerly Agricultural Hall) (1896) the rectangular hall was built with face-faced brickwork, which has now been rendered. Originally, the hall's facade featured a central portico with gabled roof flanked on either side by semi-circular arched windows. Alterations were made to the building in 1962.¹⁵
- P1369 Agricultural Hall (fmr), Kellerberrin (1898) A single-storey stone building with brick quoining and a corrugated iron gable roof.
- P1169 Walkaway Public Hall (1901) a large rectangular building of local stone with a corrugated iron gable roof. The building appears to now be utilised as a private residence.
- P1899 St James Anglican Church, Northam (1911) A simple red brick building set on random rubble foundations of local stone.

It is likely that a number of other places associated with Howard Evans exist, however they have not been added to local heritage inventories, and therefore have not been entered into the State Heritage Office database.

It should also be noted that Howard Evans's son Howard Hasler Evans was also an architect during the same period, and histories often confuse the work of the two. Howard Hasler Evans was responsible for P1134 *Corringle* (c.1897) in Greenough.

Evans' Church and hall buildings are comparable in their architectural style and design, sharing similar characteristics, such as gabled roofs, gothic arches, triple windows, and the use of local stone. St Mary's Church in Beverley is typical of his ecclesiastical work.

Of those places known to be associated with Evans, St Mary's Anglican Rectory (1889) is the earliest known example of his work. In addition, the Rectory appears to be one of the few examples of his residential work, and possibly the only surviving example of his residential architecture. Evans is known to have

designed a set of four villas on Quarry Street in Fremantle in 1895, 16 however research has been unable to determine whether they are still extant.

While there are a number of places associated with the Anglican Church entered onto the State Register, including some located in the Avon Arc region, *St Mary's Anglican Church Precinct* is unusual for its association with the architect Howard Evans, and for its role in the centralisation of the Parish of Beverley.

War Memorials

In the post-World War One and World War Two periods, War memorials were erected to provide a focus for the grief and loss felt by relatives for those who had died, to stand for the bodies of men and women that had not returned home, and to symbolise the values of citizen and sacrifice.¹⁷

In Western Australia, War memorials erected following World War One and Two differed. World War One memorials 'had more symbolic complexity' than those commemorating World War II.¹⁸

World War One memorials took a number of forms, ranging from a traditional monuments, statues and obelisks, to parks, tree plantings and honour avenues, 19 such as those at King's Park and Balingup. Memorials at this time were monumental and permanent, with the argument that utilitarian memorials — such as memorial halls — were unable to effectively symbolise the notion of sacrifice. 20

Fewer monumental memorials were built in Western Australia after World War Two, probably because so many memorials already existed.²¹ Memorials were typically 'simpler in form, plain monoliths or feature walls reflecting a modern aesthetic and the symbolic references were more fundamental', other forms of memorial included not only halls but also swimming pools and other community facilities.²²

There are 418 places in the HCWA database listed with the specific use of 'memorial', however separating war memorials from these is difficult because 'war' does not always form part of the name of the place, e.g. Burt Memorial Hall, and the relevant war is not always listed as an association. One hundred and twenty (120) of the memorials in the database were constructed after 1945 during the same period as the Memorial Lychgate in Beverley.

Research indicates that the Lynch Gate is possibly the only war memorial Lynch Gate in Western Australia.²³

each of whom is to sign the document to attest that the common seal was so affixed.

(4) A local government may, by resolution, authorise the chief executive officer, another employee or an agent of the local government to sign

- documents on behalf of the local government, either generally or subject to conditions or restrictions specified in the authorisation.
- (5) A document executed by a person under an authority under subsection (4) is not to be regarded as a deed unless the person executes it as a deed and is permitted to do so by the authorisation.
- (6) A document purporting to be executed in accordance with this section is to be presumed to be duly executed unless the contrary is shown.
- (7) When a document is produced bearing a seal purporting to be the common seal of the local government, it is to be presumed that the seal is the common seal of the local government unless the contrary is shown.

Council to considering accepting a tender submission for the construction of two netball courts at the Recreation Ground.

BACKGROUND

ADC Projects were employed to conduct the tender process for the construction of two netball courts at the Recreation Ground adjacent to the new Recreation and Function Centre.

Tenders were advertised in the West Australian Newspaper and Avon Advocate on Wednesday 16 January 2013. Documents were provided or sent out to all tenderers between Wednesday 16 January and Friday 18 January 2013.

The Tendered Contract time to complete the works was 6 weeks. The highest priced tenderer, Northerly Property Services, was the only tender to note non-compliance with this condition providing a time frame of 9 weeks to complete.

STATUTORY ENVIRONMENT

Section 11(1) of the *Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 1996* prescribes the following in regards to the procurement of goods and services:

11. When tenders have to be publicly invited

(1) Tenders are to be publicly invited according to the requirements of this Division before a local government enters into a contract for another person to supply goods or services if the consideration under the contract is, or is expected to be, more, or worth more, than \$100 000 unless subregulation (2) states otherwise.

Sections 14, 15 and 16 of the Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations 1996 outline the advertising and opening requirements of going to tender:

14. Publicly inviting tenders, requirements for

- (1) When regulation 11(1), 12 or 13 requires tenders to be publicly invited, Statewide public notice of the invitation is to be given.
- (2) If the CEO has, under regulation 23(4), prepared a list of acceptable tenderers, instead of giving Statewide public notice the CEO is required to give notice of the invitation to each acceptable tenderer listed.

(2a)If a local government —

- (a) is required to invite a tender; or
- (b) not being required to invite a tender, decides to invite a tender, the local government must, before tenders are publicly invited, determine in writing the criteria for deciding which tender should be accepted.
- (3) The notice, whether under subregulation (1) or (2), is required to include
 - (a) a brief description of the goods or services required; and
 - (b) particulars identifying a person from whom more detailed information as to tendering may be obtained; and
 - (c) information as to where and how tenders may be submitted; and
 - (d) the date and time after which tenders cannot be submitted.
- (4) In subregulation (3)(b) a reference to detailed information includes a reference to
 - (a) such information as the local government decides should be disclosed to those interested in submitting a tender; and
 - (b) detailed specifications of the goods or services required; and
 - (c) the criteria for deciding which tender should be accepted; and
 - (d) whether or not the local government has decided to submit a tender; and
 - (e) whether or not the CEO has decided to allow tenders to be submitted by facsimile or other electronic means, and if so, how tenders may so be submitted.
- (5) After a notice has been given under subregulation (1) or (2), a local government may vary the information referred to in subregulation (3) by taking reasonable steps to give each person who has sought copies of the tender documents or each acceptable tenderer, as the case may be, notice of the variation.

15. Minimum time to be allowed for submitting tenders

- (1) If the notice is published in the newspaper as part of giving Statewide public notice, the time specified in the notice as the time after which tenders cannot be submitted has to be at least 14 days after the notice is first published in the newspaper as part of giving Statewide public notice.
- (2) If the notice is given to a person listed as an acceptable tenderer, the time specified in the notice as the time after which tenders cannot be submitted has to be at least 14 days after the notice is given.

16. Receiving and opening tenders, procedure for

- (1) The CEO is responsible for keeping any tender submitted including a tender submitted by facsimile or other electronic means in safe custody, and for ensuring that it remains confidential.
- (2) Tenders are not to be opened, examined, or assessed until the time after which further tenders cannot be submitted.
- (3) When tenders are opened
 - (a) at least one and, if practicable, more than one employee of the local government or one person authorised by the CEO to open tenders and, if practicable, one or more other persons, is required to be present; and
 - (b) members of the public are entitled to be present; and
 - (c) details of the tenders (other than the consideration sought in the tender) are to be immediately recorded in a register to be known as the tenders register.

Section 18 and 19 of the *Local Government (Functions and General) Regulations* 1996 prescribes the following in regards to the acceptance or rejection of tenders and the notification of outcome to tenderers:

18. Rejecting and accepting tenders

- (1) A tender is required to be rejected unless it is submitted at a place, and within the time, specified in the invitation for tenders.
- (2) A tender that is submitted at a place, and within the time, specified in the invitation for tenders but that fails to comply with any other requirement specified in the invitation may be rejected without considering the merits of the tender.
- (3) If, under regulation 23(4), the CEO has prepared a list of acceptable tenderers for the supply of goods or services, a tender submitted by a person who is not listed as an acceptable tenderer is to be rejected.
- (4) Tenders that have not been rejected under subregulation (1), (2), or (3) are to be assessed by the local government by means of a written evaluation of the extent to which each tender satisfies the criteria for deciding which tender to accept and it is to decide which of them it thinks it would be most advantageous to the local government to accept.
- (4a) To assist the local government in deciding which tender would be the most advantageous to it to accept, a tenderer may be requested to clarify the information provided in the tender.
- (5) The local government may decline to accept any tender.

- (6) If a local government has accepted a tender but acceptance of the tender does not create a contract and within 6 months of the day on which the tender was accepted the local government and the successful tenderer agree not to enter into a contract in relation to the tender, the local government may accept from the other tenders the tender which it thinks it would be most advantageous to the local government to accept.
- (7) If a local government has accepted a tender and acceptance of the tender creates a contract and within 6 months of the day on which the tender was accepted the local government and the successful tenderer agree to terminate the contract, the local government may accept from the other tenders the tender which it thinks it would be most advantageous to the local government to accept.

19. Tenderers to be notified of outcome

The CEO is to give each tenderer notice in writing containing particulars of the successful tender or advising that no tender was accepted.
